LUNCHEON CLUB AT DALLAS WILL BOOST FOR POLK

Dallas, Or., Nov. 23.—Eighteen local business men and citizens gathered at the Gail hotel Monday noon and participated in their first weekly luncheon.

It was decided to continue the gathering from week to week in the hope that there will grow out of the movement a Polk county boosters' organization in some form that will take in farmers as well as business men. The idea is to furnish a forum where any citizen who has something to offer for the benefit of the community will have an opportunity to do so.

Rev. C. F. Trimble was elected temporary chairman and Charles B. Hodgkin temporary secretary, and these two men were authorized to formulate a program for the next meeting, which will be promptly at 12 noon next Monday at the Gail hotel. Each person present agreed to be on hand at that time and bring with him one other person.

It was decided that the new organization will send a number of representatives to the dedication of the grange and community hall at Oak Grove, Saturday evening, and to continue to send to all neighborhood affairs throughout the county men who will impress upon the farmers that Dallas is working with the agricultural element.

It was further decided at the next meeting to take up the proposal that the business men of Dallas furnish to the country people a free picture show each Saturday afternoon. The proposal was made at the meeting Monday and it was met with the approval of everyone present.
