"In the efforts which have been directed to reducing public expenditures, I have been much influnced in apparent increasing state, ounty and municipal Indebtedess, and I am fearful lest this ondition may be in part attributable to the expenditures made by the government pursuant to its ederal ald laws, as many of these tate laws require state contribuions as a prerequisite to the exension of the federal aid."

Excess Anticipated.

The summary of the budget for 1924 as given to congress shows an estimated excess of receipts over expenditures next year of \$180,969,125 as compared with an stimated deficit of \$273,938,713 or this fiscal year. The president said, however, that he was hopeful that the estimated deficit for 1923 could be reduced in the renalning seven months and that he close of the year next June 30
