

NO DELIVERY OF CHRISTMAS MAIL ON DECEMBER 24

A number of posters urging the public to "Mail early, wrap securely" were received at the local postoffice this morning and are being posted in the post-office lobby and other public buildings.

"In sending gifts the public must take into consideration that Christmas this year comes on Monday and that there will be no delivery of mail on that day or on Sunday, making it necessary for mail to arrive on time at its destination to be delivered Saturday," Postmaster Farrar said this morning.

In sending gifts it is imperative, if the full spirit of the Yuletide is to go with it, that the articles arrive before Christmas day. When the gift comes the day following the regular routine business is occupying the mind of the receiver and as a result the gift is looked on more for its intrinsic value. The Christmas spirit is gone and the full meaning is lost.

Holiday gifts for the eastern and southeastern part of the United States and foreign countries is already beginning to come in, according to Mr. Farrar. Any fragile articles should be sent early if only for a short distance or else left until after the rush season as the whole department is taxed to the limit and the mail is extremely heavy.

MORAN AWAITES GRAND JURY

ELKS SERVICES IN MEMORY OF DEAD IS HELD SUNDAY

Solemn services in memory of deceased members of the order was held Sunday afternoon at the Grand opera house by Salem lodge No. 338, Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks. Fourteen names were added to the roll of absent members during the past year.

The full ritualistic exercises of the lodge were carried out under the direction of D. G. Drager, exalted ruler. C. E. Knowland, member of the lodge, paid feeling tribute to the 14 Elks who had passed beyond during the year.

Judge John L. Rand, of the Oregon supreme court, delivered the address for the memorial exercises. He referred especially to the fact that the order of Elks taught its members patriotism and a love of country.

"It is our form of government that has made us the most contented nation on earth," Judge Rand said. "And it is our form of government that the Elks dedicate their services. As long as we stand for our principles, the order of Elks will be a mainstay to our American institutions."

With conditions as they are in the United States, Judge Rand was of the opinion there was need of loyalty and patriotism as expressed in the principles of the order of Elks. There are those who would tear down our liberty by lawlessness, and it is the duty of the Elks to oppose such disregard of the law, he said.

"The world will not be free until our form of government is adopted by the whole world," declared Judge Rand. "And it will never do to arraign one class of people against another. Our people should not be divided into religious, race or occupational classes and such a thing should not be allowed."

Referring to the dangers of large immigration, Judge Rand said that six states in the east were controlled largely by the labor vote, a majority of whom were foreigners who had not yet become familiar with the ideals of American citizenship.

TWO TRAFFIC SQUAD OFFICERS SUSPENDED

T. A. Raffety, chief of the state traffic squad, has announced the temporary suspension of H. L. Griffith and C. N. Wiles from the squad for neglect of duty. The suspensions, Raffety explained, were necessary for the good of the good of the service. Griffith and Wiles have been in the service since May, 1921. Griffiths has been on duty on the Columbia highway between Portland and Hood River, and Wiles has been covering the lower Columbia river highway from Portland to Astoria.


