

LOGAN GROWERS WILL ATTEMPT TO FIX PRICES

Delegates from the leading loganberry centers of the state, in session yesterday at the offices of the Oregon Growers Cooperative association to discuss ways and means beneficial to the loganberry interests, voted unanimously on two propositions.

The first was: "New organization of loganberry growers to offer its berries to canneries at a price to be agreed upon by a committee made up of all growers in the organization; present cooperative associations to fill their contract requirements; surplus berries to be dried and pooled from all organizations; advertising to be carried by all organizations."

Sub Unions Provided.

Combined with the above proposition was the following: "Each community of loganberry growers to organize and then come under a general organization under contracts that will hold."

The proposition that the new loganberry organization should be independent and form its own sales organization was rejected by the delegates.

A combination of all loganberry growers in the state, many acting through their own local organizations, was approved as the most likely means of placing the industry on a sure footing, all to finally act under one central organization.

Just how this is to be accomplished was left to a committee consisting of delegates from the leading loganberry centers, which will meet Wednesday morning, December 27, at the offices of the Oregon Growers Cooperative association. This committee is composed as follows:

H. H. Mumford was elected temporary chairman for the committee to meet on December 27 and E. C. Chandler, secretary. Action will be taken at the committee meeting as to the best means of handling the loganberry situation, and the committee plans will be presented to a meeting of delegates from all loganberry centers, to be called early in the year.

The object of the meeting Wednesday was stated in the minutes of the secretary as follows:

"The purpose of this meeting is to place the unorganized fruit where it can be handled with organized fruit to better the market."

Mother of 'Newsies' Of Minneapolis Now Visits Son at Turner

Mrs. Sarah Jackson Farr of Minneapolis, beloved of the newsboys and former newsboys of the twin cities, to whom she has been a mother and a friend for the past 45 years, founder of newsboy clubs at Minneapolis, Colorado Springs and other cities, has arrived to spend Christmas with her son, William Farr of Turner. Concerning her departure, the Minneapolis News says:

"Mother Farr has left Minneapolis. She started last night on the first lap of a journey that will take her half way across the continent before she returns to Minneapolis next spring. And as she speeds to Turner, Oregon, more than 4000 men in every walk of life, former Minneapolis newsboys, will wish goodspeed and bon voyage to the little woman who has been a mother and a friend to the newsboys of Minneapolis for the last 45 years.

"Until last spring her home at Franklin and Nicollet avenues had been a gathering place and club house for newsboys from every part of the city, but in May she decided that she needed a rest and the Newsboys' club house was closed.

To Visit Many Clubs.

"After visiting with relatives in Oregon until March, Mother Farr will visit the Newsboys' club in San Francisco; the newsboys' organizations in Colorado Springs and Kansas City and the Newsboys' club house in Chicago. She plans to return to Minneapolis next spring and celebrate her 81st birthday by walking to St. Paul.

"And after I return," Mrs. Farr said, "I am going to start working in earnest. I want to see a newsboys' club at Bloomington and when I get back I am going to start working for it. There are 4000 boys who belong to my club and if we all get together we can make a wonderful campaign out of it."

Expects to See Old Friends.

"All along the journey Mrs. Farr expects to meet former friends from Minneapolis, boys whom she befriended years ago, and who are now prominent business men in various parts of the west.

"I have planned this trip for many years," she said, "and I know it will give me renewed strength and courage to carry on my work."

"The Newsboys' club work has been supervised ever since its inception by Mrs. Farr, who has never received remuneration for her work and has contributed much of her own money to the club."

132 NEWSPAPERS ARE PUBLISHED IN OREGON, REPORT

University of Oregon, Eugene, Dec. 21.—(Special.)—Newspapers are published in 132 communities in Oregon, according to a newspaper directory prepared by the Oregon school of journalism. There are 28 daily papers in the state, six of which are morning papers. Portland has three evening and two morning papers. Eight cities outside of Portland have two daily newspapers each. Eight have two weekly newspapers each.

No fewer than seven newspapers have women for their editors. Two of these are full owners. One, the Long Creek Ranger, conducted by Grace Porter, is a one-woman paper, for Miss Porter does all the work herself, editorial, business and mechanical. Another one of these papers, the Maupin Times, conducted by Mrs. Jessamine E. Morrison, is an all-woman paper, with no man employed in any capacity about the place.

The number of one-man shops in the state is decreasing, with fewer than a dozen proprietors now doing their own mechanical work in addition to the editing and business managing. Nearly fifty owners, however, or one-fourth of the entire number, are combining the position of foreman of the composing room with their news gathering and advertising duties.

Forty changes of ownership out of 187 daily and weekly publications in the state are listed, since the last compilation of a newspaper directory.

Oregon has between 200 and 225 publications, if the publications of less frequent issuance are included with the daily and weekly publications.

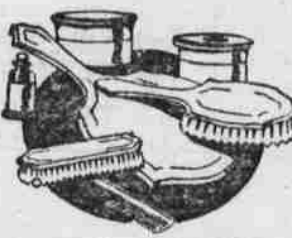
