ROTARIANS HEAR DISTRICT CHIEF TALK ON IDEALS

The motto of the Rotary club, "He Profits Most Who Serves Best," is just as true today as it was when given by the master nearly 2000 years ago, and should be followed by every Rotarian and every other man if he wishes to reach the most desired places in this world, Miles M. Higley of Spokane, governor of district No. 1 of the Rotary International, told the Salem Rotarians this noon at their weekly luncheon. A disinterested customer is a firm's worst liability, he declared.

The Rotary club in its select membership and weekly fellowship meetings is one of the greatest developers of men of which I know," Mr. Higley said. "Fellowship is the foundation stone of Rotary and when taken away is just like any other organization."

Mr. Higley made an appeal for the club's active participation in boys' work, the individual member to take particular care in the proper raising of his own son, or own daughter. He cautioned the members of the club not to become so engrossed in their own usefulness that they could not look back into their own childhood days and remember certain little incidents which could be of use as a means of keeping close the feeling of fellowship between father and son.

WARN YOUTHS STRINGING RADIO. Salem lads who are stringing radio aerials over 2300 volt wires of the Portland Railway Light & Power company are in grave danger of death by electrocution, according to W. M. Hamilton, manager of the company. There is even danger of death from a trolley wire, he said.

"Boys get together and put up their aerials over our wires," Mr. Hamilton explained. "Should their wire drop on two of ours there will be a short circuit, arcs will form on either side and it is merely a question of which wire burns through first. Should one of our wires drop to the ground, passers by are apt to be killed. If the boys have hold of their wire, they will be electrocuted."

"Also, during a storm, the aerials may be blown across our wires, causing them to fall to the ground."

No one should attempt to string a wire over other wires before he determines from some reliable source whether or not the voltage is dangerous, Mr. Hamilton said.

COMPLETE PHONE CASE. The state public service commission Tuesday afternoon completed its deliberations in the celebrated rate case of the Pacific States Telephone & Telegraph company, ending the controversy that has strung out over three years.

A tentative opinion embracing the findings of the commission has been drawn up, but it will not be handed down formally for several days, it is said.

MYSTERY VEILS SICK WOMAN AT STATE HOSPITAL

State hospital officials and attaches of the sheriff's office were this afternoon attempting to determine the identity of a fashionably dressed woman, about 40 years of age, who today appeared at the receiving ward of the state hospital.

The woman, who appeared to be in internal physical distress, is unable to talk. Physicians were unable to get any information from her. Dr. R. E. Lee Steiner said she may have suffered injuries in some sort of accident.

Late this afternoon the woman appeared to be in a graver condition than at noon, when she appeared at the hospital. She was taken before the county court, that Judge W. H. Downing might make some disposition of her case. The woman has dark hair, and weighs about 160 pounds. She was wearing a gray beaver hat, a gray mottled coat with a fur collar, gray gloves, a one piece dress, silk hosiery and good shoes.

The woman will be given medical attention at the state hospital.

idge to demand the resignation of Secretary Denby and "every other official besmirched in the public mind."

"All of these things are floating in the room of Washington," Mr. Vanderlip continued. "What is the truth? We are entitled to know. It will demand courage in high places to find out. The president has got to say something. Silence will not answer. He must say something to make us continue to believe in his great integrity and moral courage which we all think he has."

Mr. Vanderlip said today, discussing his speech of last night that he had no proof of the rumors regarding the Marion newspaper. "My purpose," said Mr. Vanderlip, "in bringing it to public notice is to encourage an investigation of gossip concerning a dead president; gossip which is outrageous if untrue."

"I have made no formal request to President Coolidge for such an investigation. He might say it is not his business and it may not be, but it seems to me that a newspaper could best conduct the inquiry—if the publishers abandon their policy of silence toward gossip which they have heard. I have no unusual sources of news."

"But I have profound faith in the honesty and courage of President Coolidge and his ability to clean a very dirty house. We should give him our sympathy and patience and not criticize him yet. He probably felt that he came to his office by an accident of death and that he should continue the cabinet and policy to which he felt heir."
