

MATTHEWS' TEAM HERE TONIGHT TO PLAY BEARCATS

Tonight in the Willamette gymnasium, the Bearcats will meet Coach Matthews' University of Idaho Vandals. Although the locals are holding no hopes for a victory, the team will go into the game with the determination of making the best showing possible against the champions of the past two years.

The Idaho team lacks considerable of the cunning in which they excelled when the Fox brothers were among the players and have fared hardly as well as they did during the past two years. In fact, the champions of both conferences of the coast and northwest are safely tucked away in fifth place with little hope of bettering their standing. Willamette is three lower with Montana and Pacific ending up the column.

Numerous fairly easy shots were missed in the Whitman game Tuesday evening, any one of which if hooped would have won for the locals.

FEDERALS LAUNCH NEW OFFENSIVE

Mexico City, Feb. 21.—(By Associated Press.)—The federal advance into the state of Guerrero to finally eliminate Romulo Figueroa and checkmate a possible attempt by the rebels Estrada, Alvarez and Dieguez to join Figueroa from Michoacan, was begun yesterday when General Marcelo Garza, heading a column of 400 men reached Puente De Ixtla en route to Iguala.

Coincidentally Juan Jose Banos, it was announced, left Pinotepa Nacional en route along the Oaxaca coast to penetrate Guerrero, while forces under command of General Gonzalo Escobar started from Michoacan with Pungarabato as their destination.

The projected return of President Oregon to the western front which was scheduled for yesterday did not take place. It was understood General Oregon considered the military situation in Jalisco did not require his presence, while important matters needed his consideration here.

REST DECLARED NEEDED TO CURE TUBERCULOSIS

St. Louis, Mo., Feb. 21.—That rest is one of the greatest factors to be observed in combatting tuberculosis was the thesis advanced by Dr. P. M. Pottenger of Monrovia, Cal., in an address before members of the American Congress of International Medicine in session here today. Rest, increases the patient's body resistance to such an extent that his own defensive forces will overcome the disease, he explained.

"The explanation of it is a physiologic one," said Dr. Pottenger. "At rest man breathes in from 25 to 30 liters of air and on extreme exertion such as a 100 yard dash, as much as 150 liters per minute may be required."

"The demands upon the circulatory system likewise show the importance of rest," he continued. "When at rest, the work done by the heart is equivalent to pumping seven and one half tons of blood through the body per day, or raising of a ton of blood one hundred and twenty feet. On exercise this is greatly increased. When we realize all the blood must pass through the lungs the same as through the other tissues, we can see what extra exertion means to the pulmonary tissues."

Dr. Pottenger explained that under exercise the cells are penetrated more readily by enzymes, toxins and other substances injurious and advised physicians to give careful instructions to patients on how to rest. He added, however, that when the active disease had ceased exercise is just as valuable a rest during the active period.

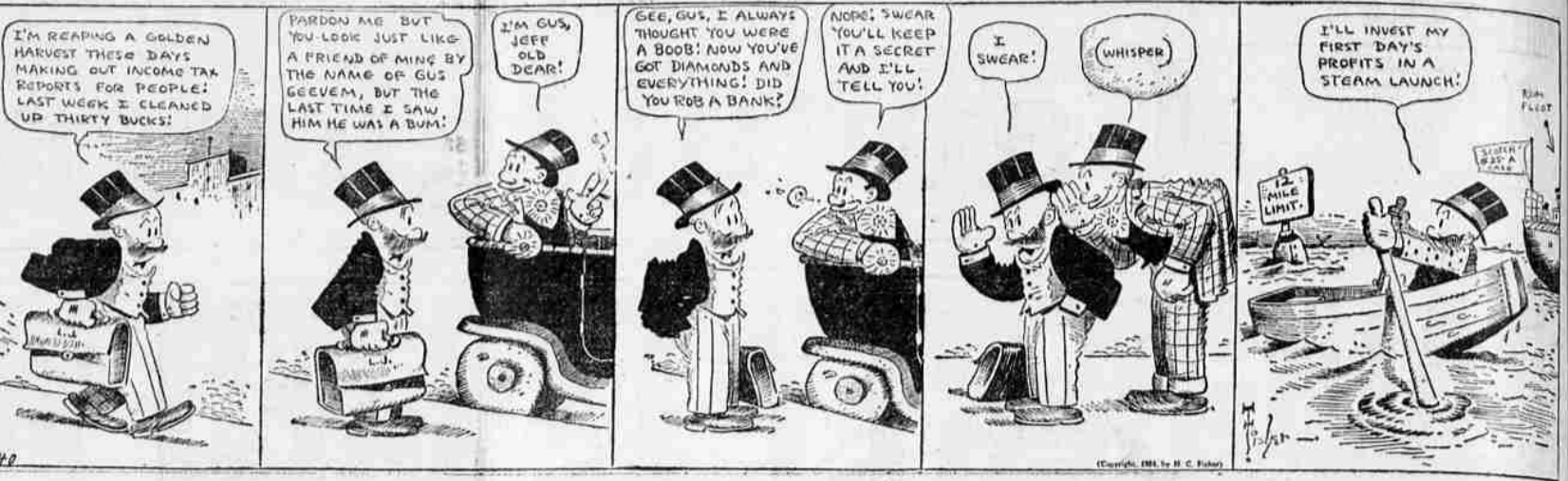

PENSIONS ASKED FOR DEPENDENTS OF INCAPACITATED

London, Feb. 21.—The proposed establishment of pensions to all widows with children or mothers whose bread winners are incapacitated received a remarkably unanimous reception in the house of commons. It was brought forward last night by the laborite, Charles Dukes, and not a hostile word was uttered by any party.

Philip Snowden, chancellor of the exchequer, said the government accepted the motion in principle. It already had instituted an inquiry into the subject and hoped to submit a feasible plan during his life of the present parliament.

"Even if our tenure of office is not long," he said, "we shall be disappointed indeed if we are unable to add to our legislative achievements a measure doing justice to those deserving people, whose claims ought long ago to have been recognized."

The minister's admission was given that such a sum as 20,000,000 pounds could not be included in the coming budget without the approval of the whole house. Several conservative and liberal members supported the motion, which was agreed to without division.

Philo, Ill.—The bodies of Joseph Whistle, 48, his wife and their 18-year-old daughter were found in the Whistle home, four miles southeast of here early today. The body of Luis Kuntz, 45, a butcher of Homer, Ill., and brother of Mrs. Whistle, was found a short distance away. Near his body was found a rifle with which police believe all were slain by Kuntz.

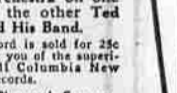
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HEARTBEATS ARE HEARD BY RADIO

St. Louis, Mo., Feb. 21.—That the beating of the human heart may be clearly audible to the ears of thousands who "listen in" to the broadcasting programs of radio stations throughout the country was demonstrated when the heart beats of Professor R. B. Abbott of Purdue university, were broadcast last night by station KSD of St. Louis.

Following a demonstration of his "microphone stethoscope," a request was made by those present that he broadcast the beats of his heart by radio, to which he consented.

In his demonstration Professor Abbott walked to and fro on the platform before the physicians and the fluctuating of his heart like the ticking of a clock, could be heard plainly, increasing or diminishing in measure as he moved rapidly or slowly.

RICKARD ACCUSED OF TICKET SPECULATION

New York, Feb. 21.—An investigation by the state boxing commission is expected to follow charges of Tom O'Rourke that Tex Rickard aided ticket speculators at the Dempsey-Firpo fight last September. Rickard flatly denied the charges, made before the boxing law repeal hearing at Albany, specifying the promoter had turned over to one broker a block of tickets worth \$135,000 which later was returned unsold.

Rickard asked the commission for an immediate investigation and reports from Albany intimated that O'Rourke's accusations would be given to a special grand jury.

New York.—Mickey Walker, welterweight title holder, and Joe Lynch, bantamweight champion, were restored to good standing and title recognition by the New York state athletic commission.
