FIRST GAMES OF STATE CONTEST OPEN TONIGHT

With all teams who are to participate present and a high pitch of interest evident, all is in readiness for the opening of the eighth annual state basketball tournament which is to begin this evening at the new Willamette gymnasium.

The opening game, which will begin at 7:30 o'clock between the representatives of the Independence and Pilot Rock schools promises to be a game, the like of which is rarely seen. The Pilot Rock team expects to send the independence five home with a defeat chalked up against them and if their size is any comparison to their playing ability their expectations will be fulfilled. The smallest man on the team is 5 feet 5 inches tall while several tower above the six foot mark. This will be the first time that the independence team has met so large a team this year and the result likely will be disastrous, not, however, without a closely contested game.

Tomorrow afternoon at 2:30 o'clock the North Bend team will meet the representatives of the McMinnville high, while the St. Helens and Eugene teams will engage immediately following. Although both games promise to be thrilling, the latter hold promise of being the most spectacular and hard fought. The strength of the Eugene team is known from the fact that they defeated the Salem high school team by a single point. The St. Helens team in winning the district championship defeated some of the best teams in the district, including the Astoria high school five, and are planning on making a hard run for the championship.

Then in the evening the La Grande and Medford teams meet at 7:30 and the winner of tonight's game with Bend in the following match.

Sale of season tickets have been heavier than in any previous year and holders of these will be providing with the best seats in the house. Those buying general admission tickets will be given the remaining seats as long as there are any left. It appears likely that the "full house" sign will likely be hung on the door each evening.

The Independence team tonight will be supported by a large number of boosters and interest is keen in the game. Although there is considerable feeling evident regarding the declaring of independence as the district representative, the matter has largely blown over and a big crowd will be on hand to see them win or lose. But those big players on the Pilot Rock team promise to be a hard combination and the dope points to the defeat of the Polk county team.

BACON MAY LIVE DOCTORS STATE

Albany, Or., Mar. 13.—(Special)—Physicians this afternoon conceded that Ralph Bacon of Salem, struck by a train at 7th and Tuesday, has a 50-50 chance to recover, despite the fact that he suffered terrible injuries. Today Mr. Bacon was able to recognize his mother and he is able to turn in his bed unaided.

Bacon, thrown 50 feet when his automobile was struck by a south bound Oregon Motor train, suffered a fracture at the base of the brain, another skull fracture, and a pierced lung. He is 34 years of age.

Smith told her, she said, "had been trying for years to get some leases through the government." The committee had subpoenaed Darden but was unable to find him.

The mysterious "little green house" on K street, which the witness said she understood was owned by Edwin B. McLean, the Washington publisher, again figured in the testimony as did the "shack" near Columbus owned by Daugherty, Smith and others.

There were meetings and "deals" in both places, Miss Stinson said, because they could be "private."

Then the witness described a conversation she said she overheard between Smith and Joe Weber, the actor. It related to getting a parole for "a Mr. Solomon," the actor's brother-in-law. The talk, she said, was "how to fix it with Daugherty."

Senator Wheeler went back to the transaction in Pacific oil stock when Miss Stinson said the proposition was that transportation of the films was a legal violation and if the films could be transported without prosecution "they" were to receive \$150,000.

"Whether that was ever consummated, I do not know," Mr. Smith told her that Daugherty would see there was no prosecution.

"That was the deal," she said.

Other Deals Bared.

Certain "picture companies," unnamed, she said, were to be in negotiation with Smith, he told her. In reply to questions she said Smith was the "go-between" for the attorney general and picture companies.

A transaction in Pacific oil stock was then brought up by Senator Wheeler, Miss Stinson said it was in the fall of 1923.

Pacific Oil, Sinclair Oil and Manhattan Shirt shares were placed with Smith's bankers and afterward taken away, she said.

Miss Stinson did not know how Smith got the stock. She thought there were 200 shares of Pacific Oil and 300 of Sinclair.

Smith withdrew the stocks "suddenly" from the brokers. She denied that Smith said the stock was given to him.

Enemies \$50,000.

Reverting to a "billed" account of Smith's with the Undersecretary of the Interior, she said, that he kept blind "because of his connections with Harry Daugherty."

Smith told her, she said, that the expenses of the Smith-Daugherty apartment in Washington were "considerably over \$50,000."

"They were intended in things jointly," she said, "but he could pay his part from the remunerations," she continued.

"In New York after the Dempsey fight," Miss Stinson said, Smith introduced her to Joe Weber, the actor.

She said she overheard a conversation between Smith and Weber relating to a Mr. Solomon, whom she believed was Weber's brother-in-law.

"Fixing Daugherty."

"There was discussion of how they could get a parole for him," she said.

Senator Wheeler asked if there was any talk of "fixing it with Daugherty."

"That was the conversation, what it was about," she said.

Smith, she said, "was afraid to talk at first—me being a third party."

There were several talks about the Solomon parole, she said.

"Was there any reference to any money transaction in it?" asked Senator Wheeler.

"He said 'he's awfully cheap,'" replied Miss Stinson. "He was something for nothing—I don't know whether he will do anything about it or not."

Withheld Papers.

The eleven thousand dollar account with Undersecretary & company which Mal Daugherty took over as executor of Smith's estate was brought in. Daugherty had told her, Miss Stinson said, that it really belonged to her. When she hired a lawyer named Bennett to take up her fight for it, she said, because she was determined to come to Washington and testify in the senate hearing.

The lawyer whom she identified as "Smith Bennett" wanted to communicate with the attorney general about it, Miss Stinson said.

SOLDIER BONUS BILL FAVORABLY REPORTED

Washington, March 13.—The new soldier bonus bill providing for paid up life insurance policies and cash payments to veterans not entitled to more than \$50, was ordered favorably reported today by the house ways and means committee.

An attempt was made by the committee to bring the measure before the house for action next Monday under suspension of the rules which would permit a vote on that day and prevent amendments.

Judge Kenyon Declines to Accept Navy Portfolio

Washington, Mar. 13.—(By the Associated Press)—Judge William S. Kenyon today declined appointment as secretary of the navy.

Chief Justice Curtis D. Wilbur of the California supreme court, probably will be tendered the post.

Judge Kenyon is understood to have informed the president that he felt his natural inclination did not lie toward administration of naval affairs and that he preferred consequently to remain on the bench.

MACDONALD GOVERNMENT DEFEATED IN COMMONS

London, Mar. 13.—(By Associated Press)—The MacDonald labor government received in the house of commons today when the proposal of J. H. Clynes, deputy leader in the house for the suspension of the eleven o'clock adjournment rule to discuss the army estimates, was defeated by a vote of 254 to 207. The government, however, does not consider this a vital defeat.

TO DEDICATE HIGHWAY BRIDGE AT WINCHESTER

Roseburg, Or., Mar. 13.—Plans are being made for the dedication of the new highway bridge at Winchester which is to be named in honor of R. A. Booth, former state highway commissioner. The exercises will probably be held on the afternoon of Sunday, April 27. Governor Pierce, Mayor Baker, Judge O. P. Coahow, R. A. Booth and Bishop Walter Sumner will be the speakers. All mayors in the state will be invited to attend as guests of honor and every chamber of commerce will receive special invitations to attend. Efforts are also being made to have all booster organizations present in costume.

SUBPOENAS ISSUED BY TEAPOT PROBERS

Washington, Mar. 13.—Rudolph Hynicka, republican national committee man from Ohio, was subpoenaed today by the oil committee.

Subpoenas also went out for Harry Mackenzie, attached to President Coolidge's Chicago campaign headquarters and for L. Gilmore, deputy secretary of state of Ohio.

Hynicka, Mackenzie and Gilmore are to be questioned in connection with the story of Leonard Wood, Jr., about an attempted oil deal at the republican national convention at Chicago in 1920.

Norman J. Gould of New York and Charles H. Garrieh of Columbus, Ohio, also were summoned.

Gould and Garrieh also will be questioned regarding the Wood story.

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WOOD DIVORCE CASE TRIED IN LOCAL COURT

The divorce proceedings of Alta E. Wood against Thomas C. Wood, instituted in Multnomah county, have been transferred to the circuit court here on motion for change of venue by the defending husband, who is a resident of this county.

The couple were married in Salem in 1919, the maiden name of the wife being Alta E. Johnson. She alleges her husband was cruel to her, that he belittled her and nagged her, and also that he used physical violence on her.

This the husband denies in an affidavit, and declared that his wife left him in June, 1923, that she endeavored to reach an agreement whereby they could secure a divorce. He states she has been employed at the Standard Oil company in Portland. He says while here she was out four or five nights a week taking music and dancing lessons and she was out with other men. This the wife denies in an affidavit of rebuttal. The wife was employed for some time in the state insurance commissioner's office.

SEVENTH DRY AGENT BONDED

Conforming with the provisions of the legislative act creating the state prohibition department, which requires that all agents and investigators of the department shall furnish bond in the sum of \$2,000, the bond of Byron L. Randall, deputy under Prohibition Commissioner Cleaver, under date of March 4 has been filed with the secretary of state.

The bond is furnished by a surety company.

Randall's bond is the seventh to be filed by employees of the prohibition department, aside from Cleaver's, although there have been several times that number of operatives employed by the department and paid out of prohibition funds. The other bonds on file are those of J. S. Culbertson, no longer an employee of the department, Willard M. Houston, Walter G. Smith, Elsie M. Elsamman, Asa C. Smith, W. M. McMills.
