

MYSTERY STILL VEILS SLAYING OF DR. WILKINS

Kansas City, Mo., March 21.—Seeking to pierce the veil of mystery which surrounds the slaying of Dr. Zoe Wilkins, whose gaming at love and intrigue ended in grewsome death, police today faced a number of unfolding leads.

These involved a mysterious quartet whom the man feared, an equally mysterious assemblage of "deal," and the knowledge that Dillard Davies, negro janitor, wielded an unexplained influence over Dr. Wilkins.

When, on Saturday night, Dr. Wilkins was distraught with fear that "four persons" would kill her, unless she put through a similar "deal" of which the police have been unable to learn anything, the negro ordered Dr. Wilkins to dismiss a woman who had been summoned to the house as a companion.

It was to this woman, whose name has not been divulged, that Dr. Wilkins confided her fear that she would be killed by the mysterious quartet.

"Get this woman out of the house before it is too late," the negro is said to have exclaimed. "I won't wait any longer. I can't."

The woman left and the negro remained. Arriving home the woman telephoned but was told the receiver at Dr. Wilkins' home was off the hook. The next day she called and found the house apparently deserted.

On Tuesday evening Dr. Wilkins' body was found on the floor of her parlor.

In a long grilling Davies steadfastly maintained that he had not been at Wilkins' since 5 o'clock Saturday. He denied any knowledge of the slaying.

MRS. BURNETT IS CALLED BY DEATH

After a lingering illness, Mrs. George H. Burnett, wife of Justice Burnett of the Oregon supreme court, passed away here yesterday afternoon at 5:30 o'clock.

Mrs. Burnett was born April 6, 1856, and was the daughter of Dr. and Mrs. Alfred M. Belt. On December 31, 1875, she became the wife of George H. Burnett. Three years later they established a residence at 385 north High street where she lived until her death.

Mrs. Burnett was the first matron of Chadwick chapter 37, Order of Eastern Star, which will have full charge of the funeral services to be held from the Webb funeral parlors Saturday morning at 10:30 o'clock. The remains will be sent to Portland for cremation.

At the time of her death she was worthy high priestess of Willamette shrine No. 2, White Shrine of Jerusalem.

There are no children.

TO ADMIT WOMEN TO BRITISH HOUSE OF LORDS

London, March 21.—Another attempt to obtain admission for women to membership in the house of lords is to be made next week. Frank Bryant, liberal, introduced in the commons a bill to enable peeresses in their own right to sit and vote in the upper house.

The bill is supported by many members of all parties, including Lady Astor and other women members of parliament. There are 24 peeresses in their own right in the United Kingdom.

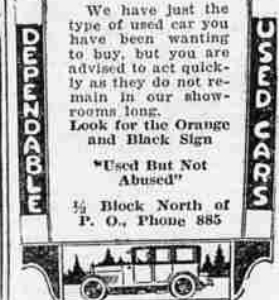
