ESPEE ASKED TO TRY MOTOR CARS ON DALLAS LINE

Dallas, Or., May 1.—Restoration of car service over the Salem-Dallas-Falls City and Black Rock line of the Portland and Pacific may be secured if efforts of a Portland concern are successful in inducing the Southern Pacific to put on a light gasoline type of car, similar to the "goose" used on some logging roads. A petition directing the notice of the public service commission to this type of car service has been circulated quite generally throughout the city and many have signed.

The move is featured by the American Railway Car company of Portland and A. C. Forrester, president of the concern. The company holds manufacturing rights on the Bowden gasoline car, a 14-on gasoline propelled machine, with standard railway trucks which they claim can be operated at a cost of not to exceed 25 cents a mile. This type of car is now in use on the Norwalk & Shelby railroad and the Pittsburg & Shawmut railroad in the east. It has a carrying capacity of 45 passengers and luggage, mail and express provisions. The motive power is furnished by a heavy truck engine and gasoline is burned as fuel.

Angel College, St. Benedict, Or., May 1.—Coach Joel Kasperger's Fighting Angel baseball machine will cross bats with the strong North Pacific Dental college outfit on college field here Saturday, May 3. The Portlanders have a strong aggregation and intend to take a win from the hilltoppers. Last year the Angels crashed out a 13-2 victory over the toothpullers in the Rose City stadium and succumbed to a 9-3 onslaught on college field breaking even for the series. So far the Angels have won two games and lost two of their schedule, and are confident of turning in another victory Saturday. 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GREATEST MILK COW CONTRACTS DREAD DISEASE

Los Angeles, May 1.—Whether it is possible to save the lives of the Alcartra, world's greatest milk cow, and other championship animals of the Hartsook Holstein dairy herd at Lankershim, near here, which contracted the foot and mouth epizootic despite all precautions was to be decided today by expert veterinarians.

The valuable animals were to have been slaughtered yesterday in accordance with quarantine regulations but in view of the extraordinary importance to the dairying industry of the country a reprieve was granted until today.

Meanwhile the fact that no new cases of the disease were reported in any part of the county yesterday was regarded as an encouraging sign, while the imposition of heavy fines on ten violators of quarantine regulations indicated that the fight to eradicate the scourge was continuing with undiminished vigor.
