Civic Club Ends Season Of Concerts

Four of Salem's musicians were chosen as artists for the final concert of the season, sponsored by the Salem Civic Music club, and the second of the two professional concerts given this year, Miss Lena Belle Tartar, Mrs. Mary Talmadge Headrick, Leon Jenkinson and Ruth Bedford were the four artists who so pleased the audience last evening at the First Congregational church.

Last week Iva Claire Love, violinist, Mrs. Nellie Mulkey Stone, pianist, and Charles Muston, tenor, presented the program in similar manner.

Much might be said of the four artists each holding an individual place in the musical circles of Salem and each having won previous recognition. Miss Tartar, president of the club is also head of the music department at the high school and has long held a prominent place on local programs. Ruth Bedford for four years accompanied for the Apollo has also given of her talent very generously to other organizations. She graduates from Willamette university in June.

Mrs. Headrick a violinist, is at present connected with one of the local theaters while Leon Jenkinson, baritone, is a well known vocalist appearing on many programs during the past few years. Playing with an ease and grace accompanied by a marked technical understanding of her numbers Ruth Bedford played two groups, first, Waltz Etude, Op. 52, No. 6, Saint-Saens; later she gave, Allegretto Scherzando, Habener and Papillons, Rosenthal.

Mrs. Headrick charmed with her numbers playing Ballade in Polonaise, Violentemps and later a group consisting of Air for the G string, Bach, and Heine Kati, Candras scene, Hukay, Mr. Jenkinson followed Miss Bedford on the program and distinguished himself as the only man on the program in his singing of Come to the Fair, Martin. He further proved his ability by singing Three and Lamb, Homer; Some-thing Worth While, Ward Stevens; A Chip of the Old Block, Squire.

Miss Tartar closed the program with her rich contralto voice, the Aria, Voce di donna (La Gioconda) Ponchielli. Her offerings earlier in the program included, Hark, Hark the Lark, Schubert; Out of My Dearest Sadness, Franz; Ridenami la Calma, Toselli.

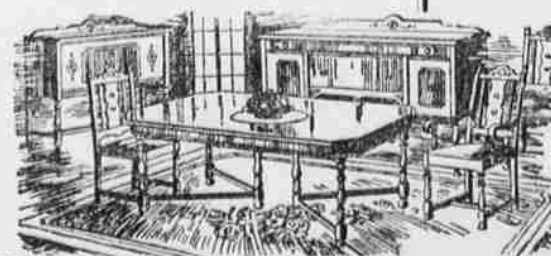
