## WORLD'S AIRPLANE RECORDS BROKEN

Louisville, Ky., June 21.—Two world's records for duration flights with heavy loads are believed to have been established here today by Lieutenant John A. MacReady and Lieutenant Harold R. Harris, flying in an air carnival as part of the Kentucky homecoming celebration.

Flying an eight passenger army transport plane carrying 551 pounds, Lieutenant MacReady was still in the air three and a half hours after taking off.

Lieutenant Harris was still in the air two hours and a half after taking off with a load of 1192 pounds in a Martin bomber.

Officials, after comparing records for more than an hour, announced that both MacReady and Harris had set new records, although weight carrying duration flights themselves had not been previously held.

## RADIO PHOTO SUCCESSFULLY TRANSMITTED

Paris, June 21.—(By Associated Press.)—Telephotography by wireless will be so perfected by the time the next president of the United States is inaugurated that photographs in the next morning's editions of the Paris newspapers, in the opinion of Edouard Belin, inventor of the apparatus for transmission of pictures by radio. The inventor's new wireless process was demonstrated successfully for the first time yesterday when a photograph which had been transmitted by radio was published in the Matin.

Mr. Belin explained today that the experiments made thus far, although conclusive so far as the practicability of the invention is concerned gave imperfect results because of unfavorable conditions.

He said that the transmitting apparatus used in the transmission of the Florida picture was of feeble power and that atmospheric conditions also was far. The new experiments, the inventor said, would be made some time in August with an improved apparatus. It is intended to inaugurate the service throughout European countries generally. The inventor then declared he would turn his attention to the transmission of photographs across the Atlantic.

"I am sure of success," he said. "I am sure I can send a photograph across the Atlantic by radio with perfect detail under conditions that will permit of the clear transmission of wireless messages."

Large numbers of people were gathered at the sides of the street to see the various floats, and to be better than in any previous year.

Tacoma, Wash., June 21.—Plunging with their automobile from a viaduct 20 feet high at such a speed that their car landed fully 100 yards beyond the point where they went through the railing, Quinto Raffanelli was almost instantly killed and L. R. Cummings was taken to the hospital early this morning in a dying condition. Both men are from Tacoma and about 35 years old. Raffanelli is survived by his wife and four children.

## PHELAN BACK TO PLACE M'ADOO IN NOMINATION

New York, June 21.—Former Senator James D. Phelan of California, who will place in nomination the name of William G. McAdoo at the democratic national convention, arrived today from Europe on the steamship Itzagara. He expressed confidence that Mr. Adoo would be nominated and elected.

As a great statesman in the west said a "man must eat," Mr. Phelan said he believed Mr. McAdoo was not connected directly with the Ku Klux or indirectly with the ineligible for public office if he were as that organization is "illegal."

On the wet and dry issue, Mr. Phelan said he personally favored Phelan in congressional districts to elect men who would vote to liberalize the Volstead act to allow light beers and wines without the saloon.

Speaking of the question of abolishing the two-thirds rule in the convention, Mr. Phelan replied: "It is the general feeling to maintain the rule. It makes the nominations more impressive and satisfactory to the country."

## TO PREPARE FOR DEFENSE TEST DAY IN OREGON

Following a recent conference here between Governor Pierce and Lieutenant Colonel John R. Kelly, assistant chief of staff of the United States army for the ninth corps area, the governor and Colonel Kelly will meet again at Camp Lewis next Monday to discuss Oregon's participation in national defense test day, which will be September 12 next.

Colonel Kelly, who represents Major General Charles C. Morton, commander of the ninth corps area, has requested Governor Pierce to appoint a special committee of Oregon citizens to work up Oregon's program for the test day. A mobilization test will feature the day, but details of arrangements in each state, city and town will be left to the local committees of citizens who will be appointed by civil officials. On that day, for the first time during peace time, all units of the three components of the United States army, the regular army, the national guard and the organized reserves, will be mobilized at their home stations.

While at Camp Lewis Colonel Kelly will inspect the Oregon troops now in annual encampment there.
