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McMINNVILLE IS
TO LOSE COLLEGE

Portland, Or., July 1.—Definite decision to move Linfield college from McMinnville, where it has been established for more than 60 years, was made yesterday by the board of trustees in a meeting at the Baptist headquarters at the Odd Fellows' building. The future site of the college was not selected, although Portland was favored over Seattle and Spokane, the other two considered.

The move has been contemplated for some time, although no definite action was taken until yesterday's meeting. The proposal at first met with opposition, but was adopted by a comfortable majority. The trustees were pressed for a decision by the fact that expansion was necessary at McMinnville, should the college remain there.

Regardless of the selection of the city, which will be either Portland, Seattle or Spokane, the college will not be moved until after the end of the coming academic year. It was expected that the transfer could be made during the summer of 1925, in order that college work could be started in the new location the following fall.

Trustees predicted yesterday that if satisfactory arrangements could be made in Portland to provide a 40-acre campus and a building fund of \$500,000 the college would move here. A committee is now at work preparing a survey of the situation for a recommendation as to location.

CARS DEMOLISHED IN
CRASH; NO ONE HURT

Dallas, Or., July 1.—Two cars were demolished Saturday night about 11 o'clock in a head-on collision on the Falls City road, but all occupants escaped with only minor injuries. The accident was the result of a driver following one of the cars to slow up. John Grant, deputy fire warden, was driving toward Dallas and Byron Ames, his wife and small child, were driving towards Falls City. Ames was blinded by a car behind Grant and as a result the machines struck head-on. The Ames baby was thrown several feet from the car. Mrs. Ames was slightly cut and Grant landed beneath his car.

At the close of the meeting a lunch was served and the members enjoyed a good time together. Since the next regular meeting of the order comes on July 4th, the meeting date has been set ahead until Friday, July 11, when installation of officers will be held.

ELKS PICNIC IS
WELL ATTENDED

Silverton, Or., July 1.—About 2600 people are estimated to have been present at the Elks picnic held in the city park at Silverton, Sunday. The picnic was under the auspices of the Elks lodge of Salem but any Elk was invited and the invitation was not limited to Elks alone. Carloads of people began coming in at an early hour, the largest number coming from Salem. Most of the picnickers brought lunches but coffee, doughnuts and "hot dogs" were served by the lodge.

The Elks band of Salem furnished music during the noon hour as did the Four-4 band of Silverton. The Salem lodge also contributed music in the form of vocal solos and quartets.

During the afternoon various water and land sports were participated in by contestants of both Salem and Silverton. Business sessions of the two cities donated substantial prizes to the winners. Judging of the events and awarding of the prizes were in the hands of a committee from the Salem lodge.

MOTORCYCLE RIDER
HURT IN COLLISION

Silverton, Or., July 1.—At a collision Sunday night between a car and a motorcycle, William Sheridan, driver of the motorcycle, was thrown to the pavement and rendered unconscious for a short time. The accident occurred at the intersection of Water and Main streets about 9 o'clock. Mr. Sheridan is said to have been traveling rapidly and to have just passed a car as he reached the intersection. A car, driven by Joe Hook, pool hall proprietor of Silverton, approached, having the right of way. Both men are said to have attempted to stop but the car struck the rear wheel of the motorcycle throwing Mr. Sheridan headlong to the pavement. Life was taken to the office of Dr. A. E. Wrightman for attention. Mr. Sheridan's home is near Salem.

PROPOSED EXTENSION
OF HIGHWAY INSPECTED

San Francisco, Cal., July 1.—The committee of nine appointed by the last legislature to survey highway needs, started Monday over the Redwood highway between Sausalito and Eureka to ascertain the feasibility of continuing this artery to meet the Roseburg highway which is being built southward along the coast of Oregon. It is planned to join the two highways near Brookings, Or.

The joined highways would provide a coast route from San Francisco to Astoria, whence the Columbia river highway could be followed into Portland.

The committee will confer with the boards of supervisors of Humboldt, Del Norte and the other counties visited, and with Oregon highway officials.

MILITARY BAND

At present there is but one military band in Oregon, and that in Portland. Unless sufficient interest is shown here, the order authorizing the forming of a band will be transferred to some other Oregon city. Marshfield is said to be particularly anxious of the opportunity of establishing such a musical organization.

Full equipment will be furnished by the government, including uniforms, instruments and a director. Rehearsals will take the place of drills, with members receiving regular pay.

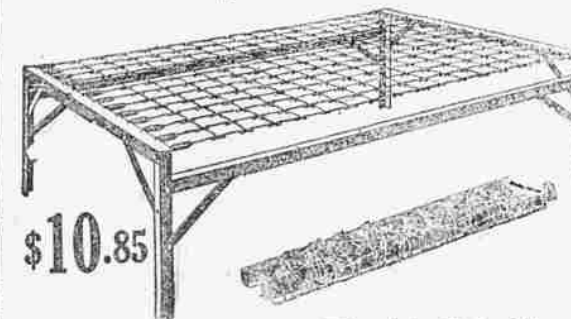

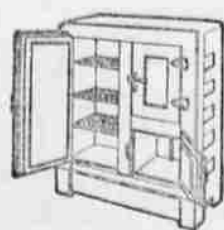
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
