Artist Here For Visit To Parents

Elmer Young, successful young artist, who has been in the east for the past ten or twelve years, arrived in the city yesterday for an all summer's visit with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. R. J. Young of 942 North Summer street. This is Mr. Young's first visit home in five years.

Upon his first leaving for the east Mr. Young studied for a number of years at the Chicago Art Institute, later branching out into magazine illustrating. For the past two years he has been an instructor in the department of fine arts and architecture in the University of Minnesota at Minneapolis, a department which ranks among the eight highest in the United States. He will fill the same position this coming winter.

Following that planning to go on to New York to further his study of art.

Distinctive recognition has come to Mr. Young for his work. Last year he won second place in the water color exhibit in St. Paul, open only to St. Paul and Minneapolis artists, and in which hundreds of pictures were in competition. He has been invited to participate in a similar exhibit this fall, as well as in those of the Pennsylvania Water Color society to be held in Philadelphia, the Colorado gallery exhibit in Washington, D. C.; the international Water Color society in Chicago and the New York Water Color society in New York.

According to Mr. Young each year finds more western students going east to study art, and although few of these will become artists of the first rank, many of them will, however, return to their homes with a broader understanding of art—a comprehension that will have its influence here.

He feels that a newer point of view is being reached among artists. Cults are disappearing and the big artists like Charles Hawthorne, Robert Spencer and George Bellows, the latter one of the most ardent advocates for individualism a bit ago, are becoming gradually more conservative, and among artists in the east now, the erstwhile talk of modernism is seldom heard.

Mr. Young thinks that for those who originally went in for cubism and the like were more intellectual than artistic. "They painted something and then sat down and studied it, finding in it far more than anyone else could possibly discover," said Mr. Young.

A sketching trip through the east filled last summer for Mr. Young, who anticipates similar occupation this summer, with some of the most picturesque scenes on the Pacific coast as his objective. He has with him a large collection of his pictures, which will be shipped east this fall for the various exhibitions. They are the source of much interest on the part of his friends.
