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WOODBURN DROPS CAMP MEETING PAVING SCHEME TO BE HELD SOON

Woodburn, July 7.—Because of the numerous objections from property owners on East Lincoln street the city council came to the conclusion at its meeting this week that the pavement could not be extended to the Pacific highway past the high school building. A petition was presented recently to the council asking that the pavement be ordered but objections have since been filed.

Acting on the petition the council did instruct the city engineer to prepare specifications, plans and estimates from the present paving to the east line of the high school property. This is one of the most important entrance streets to the city and is badly in need of paving.

An ordinance was passed changing the width of Wilson street to 40 feet instead of the varying widths of 30 and 50 feet. Mrs. Simmons, chairman of the library board, asked the council for a small flag for the library and had her request referred to the flag committee.

The Standard Oil company asked for special sprinkling hours but no exception to the six hours a week rule was made. City Attorney Massey reported that the Oregon Electric company would take out its tracks on Main street during the summer or fall when the company is using its West Cleveland street depot, exclusively.

Woodburn, Or., July 7.—Dates for the twenty-ninth annual state camp meeting of the Church of God has been set for July 17 to 27 at the Woodburn camp grounds just south of the city. It is expected that the meeting will bring representatives from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, California and other northwest states, probably exceeding the attendance of 500 campers of last year.

The Northwest Ministerial assembly will be held at the camp grounds prior to the camp meeting and this will bring delegates from the entire northwest. D. E. Nelson of Montevideo, Minn., will assist with these meetings. The regular services will be under the direction of the devotional committee which includes Mamie Blomquist of Eugene, H. A. Schlatter of Portland and J. J. Gillespie of Salem.

There will be special meetings for the young people during the meetings and divine healing. Rev. John T. Myers of the local church is in charge of arrangements at the grounds with reports that they are in splendid condition for every accommodation for the campers and for those who care to attend the meetings.

PREMIERS WILL CONFER IN PARIS

Paris, July 7.—(By Associated Press.)—Premier MacDonald of Great Britain informed Premier Herriot today that he would arrive in Paris tomorrow afternoon to confer with him regarding the proposed inter-allied conference at London next week.

Count De St. Austre, French ambassador to Great Britain, arrived from London to enlighten Premier Herriot as to the latest British view of the situation and tomorrow the French diplomatic representatives will receive a memorandum in which the premier will define clearly the view of his government to the powers who are attending the London conference. The document, on which the foreign office chiefs worked all day Sunday, was submitted to the premier last night.

Official circles maintain optimism, confident that the divergencies between the French and British view points can be overcome. The French foreign office declined to comment on the sudden decision of the British premier to come to Paris. Officials refused to say whether it was on his own initiative or in response to an invitation from his French colleague. The latter question is regarded as the more probable, since M. Herriot is the most interested party in the incident of the memorandum which accompanied the British invitation to the conference, as that affair is likely to bring on an attack in the senate from the opposition.

Government circles have been much exercised as to what might happen in the senate. The government organs are particularly severe today in their opinion of the press, which gave publicity to the British memorandum and emphasized the contradiction with French policy thus far and with French public opinion which the memorandum embodied.

The opposition newspapers were even more violent this morning with foreign affairs.

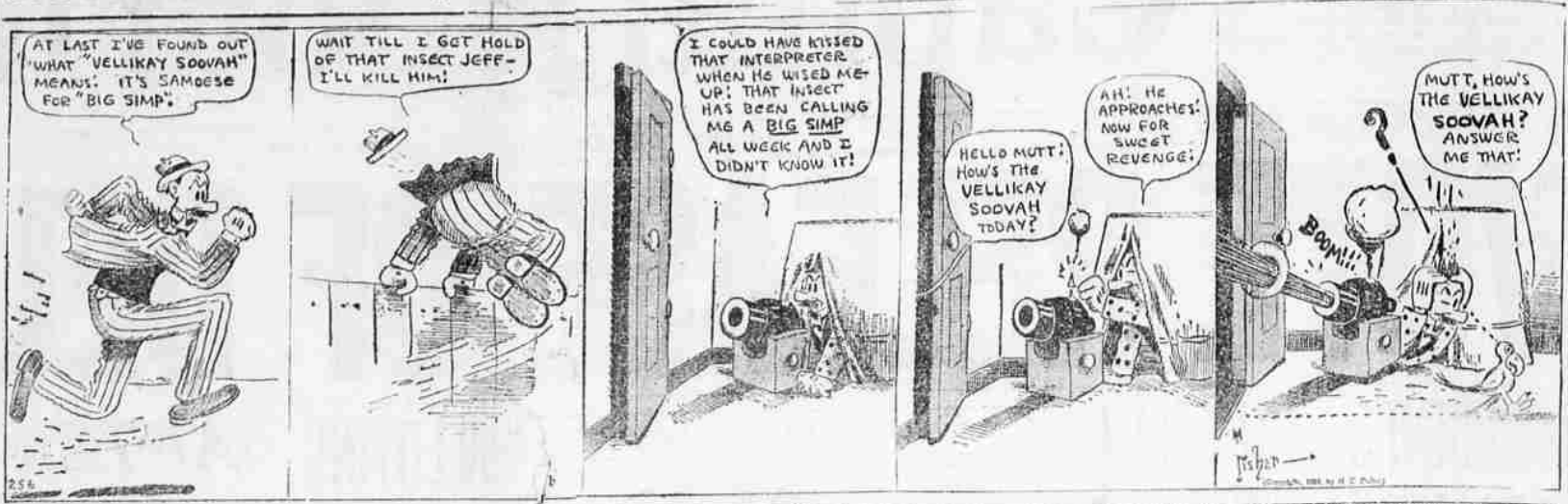

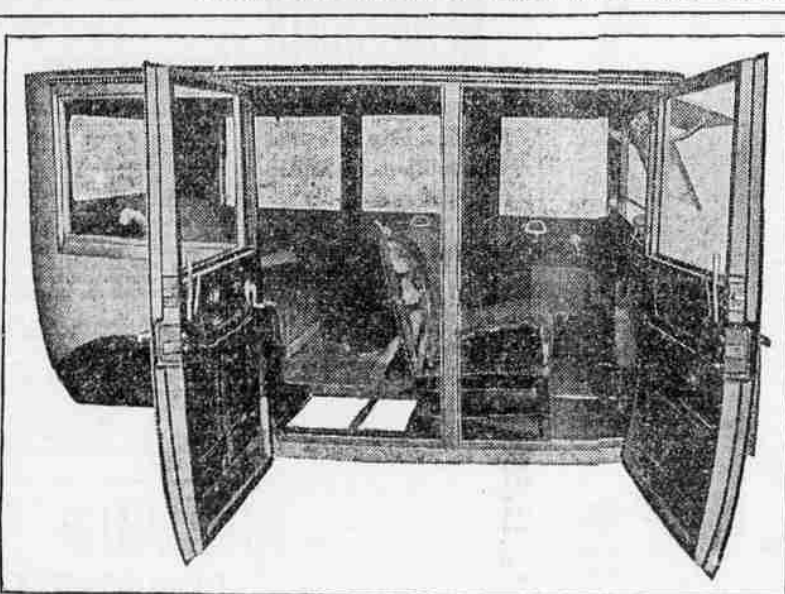
Community Club Meets

UNUSUAL DISPLAY REVEALS DODGE BODY CONSTRUCTION



The Bonesteel Motor company, local Dodge Brothers dealer, was notified today by Dodge Brothers that the half-skeleton steel body which attracted so much attention in the educational exhibit held by Dodge Brothers in connection with the New York, Chicago and San Francisco shows, will be available for display during the week of July 7-12. It is expected that the body will arrive here tomorrow, whereupon it will be given a prominent place in the Bonesteel salesrooms.

The body is unique in that one-half is enameled, trimmed, upholstered and finished like the body of a car ready for use, and the other half is entirely unfinished, showing clearly every part of the strong, light, safe, all-steel construction.

The upholstery and trimming are cut at the center line of the car showing the deep cushion springs and the genuine hair padding. The finished side of the body shows a fine, smooth, lustrous surface. The reputation for retaining newness of appearance after years of service is the result of Dodge Brothers' process of baking the enamel at high temperature.

The unfinished half shows how the frame, consisting of pressed steel parts welded and riveted together, gives maximum strength and stiffness together with light weight and freedom from warping and from squeaks and rattles. No wood whatever enters into the construction of the body except the frames for the removable cushions and the few strips to which the trimming materials are tacked. Even the moulding around the windows, which upon the closest examination looks like vanished hard wood, is of pressed steel finished in baked enamel.
