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LAWYERS URGED TO HELP SUPPORT CONSTITUTION

Philadelphia, July 5.—A plea that the lawyers of America, "take back to the people the true conception of constitutional government" was made by Robert E. Lee Sander of Dallas, Texas, president of the American Bar association in addressing the association's annual convention.

"Lawyers are, or ought to be, familiar with the constitution and the history of government," he said. "They ought to know the responsibility which rests upon them to impart this knowledge to the people; they act, or ought to act, in political matters in conformity with the highest ideals in good government; they conceive, or ought to conceive, the true relation between the state and the nation, and the significance involved in maintaining the independence and the equality of the three departments of government."

"They apprehend or should apprehend, the function of every individual citizen in the plan of government as originally designed; they realize or should realize their obligation to the judiciary for the safety of their property; their liberty and their lives, and they recognize, or ought to recognize, their duty to cherish and preserve, and to encourage others to cherish and preserve the government as now constituted and especially the integrity of the courts of our land, and thus the lawyers may conserve the priceless heritage of constitutional government."

PROGRESSIVES PLAN CAMPAIGN

Chicago, July 5.—A militant campaign to support congressional candidates endorsed by the forces of Senator La Follette of Wisconsin with the primary effort to elect a presidential and national ticket is planned by Representative John W. Nelson of the third Wisconsin district, who has opened national headquarters here and assumed charge of the La Follette presidential campaign.

"We expect to support progressives, irrespective of parties. We intend, insofar as possible, to avoid taking on the burdens of any state, county or legislative candidates. But we are much interested in maintaining our balance of power in both houses of congress."

Selection of a vice-presidential candidate will not be settled until after the democratic convention, he said. Depending on who is nominated, the La Follette adherents would either endorse the democratic nominee or independently select a running mate for the Wisconsin senator, he asserted.

Declaring Houston Thompson of Colorado and Senator Wheeler of Montana were favored.

\$20,000 DAMAGES GIVEN FORMER POLK PEOPLE

Damages in the sum of \$20,000 have just been awarded to the widowed mother and a son of the late Harvey Scott Pentland by a Los Angeles court, according to word received here by the father, E. C. Pentland, of 703 Irving street. The tragic death of the young man occurred in Los Angeles, April 26, 1923, and was caused by a gas explosion resulting from the contact of an electric torch which Pentland was using with an oil pipe line.

Harvey Scott Pentland was born and reared in Independence, Or., and was named after Harvey Scott, then editor of the Oregonian through the action of the board of trade of Independence, who proposed the name to the father and mother of the child and it was accepted. Mr. Scott presented the family with a silver loving cup, which is still a highly treasured possession. The father, E. C. Pentland, is an ex-employee of the Oregonian, but more recently has been in the employ of the Los Angeles Times. He returned to Portland to live a few days ago.

SOCIALISTS TO HAVE NO TICKET

Cleveland, Ohio, July 5.—(By Associated Press.)—Adjustment of the affairs of the socialist party of America to the lack, for the first time in its history, of a national ticket, occupied the sessions here today of the party's 1924 convention. This condition results from the failure of the party to secure last night with the conference for progressive political action in endorsing Senator Robert M. La Follette as a presidential candidate on his own platform.

It was indicated, however, that while this action precluded nomination by the socialist party, it did not prevent it from adopting a platform just as the conference for political action voted itself a structure of economic plank after endorsing La Follette's stand.

Whether the socialists would take this action was to be decided today by the resolutions committee.

Silverton News

Since his graduation he has been with the Luther college band, which made a tour of the state. Mr. Henriksen will probably spend the summer at Silverton. He plans to return to Luther college this fall where he will be engaged in teaching. During his senior year at college he was president of the student body. Mr. Henriksen who is a son of Rev. and Mrs. George Henriksen, is well known in Silverton having attended high school here, graduating with the class of 1915.

Owing to the Luther league convention to be held in Silverton this week the regular monthly meeting of the Trinity young people's society has been postponed from next Sunday to the last Sunday in July. The society is planning an ice cream social to be held on the church lawn Tuesday night, July 8. A program is being prepared.

Parties returning from the coast report that record breaking crowds were present at all the beaches. It was said that Seaside had the largest Fourth of July crowd in the history of the city. Many Silverton people were among those who witnessed the falling of an airplane into the Neenah river Saturday evening. The cooler weather which has prevailed during the past few days was much more noticeable at the coast than in the valley according to those who spent the holidays there.

A number of improvements of houses is apparent in Silverton lately. The M. M. Sayre house on second street takes on a new appearance after having the entire front porch enclosed with windows. The home of M. L. Gottberg at 1st and A streets has been moved slightly and an addition built to it. On McClaine street the W. Bowser house has been reshingled and is now being repainted. Another small hangar on McClaine street has been shingled on the walls and a composition roofing put on the roof. The house one of the most attractive little homes on the street. A number of buildings have been moved and a small house erected on the site of the former Lala saw mill. Further out on McClaine street the new home of H. Good is being built rapidly. The old Donnelly home which formerly stood there was moved across the street to make room for the new building. Still further out the same street excavation has been begun in the side hill for the erection of a building there. When the repairs and new houses have been completed as well as the new station of the Union Oil company McClaine street will be much changed in appearance.

Little Shirley Evenson who has been under quarantine for the past four weeks for scarlet fever was allowed to rejoin her playmates Monday.

So far as is known no sickness has resulted from the use of water at Silverton. A recent test of the water indicated that the water at the intake was contaminated and boiling of drinking water was advised. It was planned to install a chlorine plant in the system on the Abiqua river and remove the plant on Silver creek. It was found, however, that the removal of the Silver creek system would lower the pressure to such an extent that not enough pressure could be obtained in case of fire. Chlorine plants on both streams have now been decided upon.

Orders calling for the second state rifle and pistol competition since the World war were issued Monday by Brigadier General White, head of the Oregon national guard. Crack shots from 17 counties in the state will participate at the shoot at Clackamas, starting August 18 and continuing seven days. Six picked shots from the 39 guard organizations will attend the shoot as competitors.

The state championship for rifle and pistol will be decided at the matches, as will be the best rifle team in Oregon. Each team will be made up of at least four enlisted men and two officers. A machine gun event will be a feature of the matches.

Sufficient funds to double the number of participants over last year's shoot were secured from the federal government by General White while he was attending the national conference of adjutant generals in Washington last spring.

The 15 best shots in the guard will be selected during the state match to represent the state in the national matches at Camp Perry, Ohio, in September. This team will leave for the east September 2, and will be absent one month at government expense.

UNITED STATES HOLDS LEAD IN OLYMPIC MEET

Paris, July 5.—(By Associated Press.)—The standings of the nations in the Olympic track and field championships at the end of the two days competition is as follows:

United States 55½; Finland 47; Sweden 15; Great Britain 14½; France 7; Hungary 7; New Zealand 4.

The French public is not turning out in large numbers for the Olympic games and only about 2000 spectators were present just before the opening of the third day's competition. The majority were foreigners. The weather today was sultry.

Finland's emblem was run up the Olympic pole as the opening ceremony of the day in honor of Lehtonen's victory in the pentathlon last night, when the games were finished after sunset, too late for the flag raising ceremony, under the Olympic rules.

800 meters, final, D. G. A. Lowe, Great Britain, first; Martin, Switzerland, second; Schuyler Buck, Pennsylvania, third; H. B. Stallard, Great Britain, fourth; Wm. B. Richardson, London, fifth; Time one minute 52.2 seconds.

William A. Connelley of Yale, one of the American broad jumpers, injured his left leg on his first jump in the running broad jump finals this afternoon. It was feared he would be unable to continue in the competition.
