

COOLIDGE AT BIRTHPLACE OF G. WASHINGTON

Washington, July 21.—Tribute to the memory of Washington was paid yesterday by President Coolidge, who interrupted his week's end cruise on the Mayflower to visit Wakefield, Va., birthplace of the first president.

The president, accompanied only by Mrs. Coolidge, his father, Colonel John Coolidge and his son, John, left the ship shortly after eight o'clock this morning, about 15 miles below Colonial Beach, Va., when a White House automobile which had been sent down from Washington drove to Wakefield a new deserted and isolated spot where only a marble shaft marks the birthplace of Washington.

Nearly an hour was spent by the president in the vicinity of the monument. Mr. Coolidge after reading the inscription of the simple shaft, stood uncovered for some time and then drove back to the little wharf to board the Mayflower.

Arrangements for the trip were completed several days ago but no announcement was made and with the exception of the secret service men no one was present during the visit of the president and his family.

Returning to the river, which is nearly eight miles wide at that point, a series of incidents began which had not been arranged. An outlying tide had made it impossible for any of the Mayflower's small boats to approach near enough to shore to take the party aboard and the president of the United States was literally left "high and dry."

The nearest landing that could be used was at Colonial Beach, a summer resort, and there the president and his family went by automobile while the Mayflower steamed up the river. The visit to the beach town was unexpected and it was not until the yacht anchored and a launch put out that those ashore realized that a solitary automobile standing near the entrance to the bathing pier contained the president.

As soon as the news was flashed about, however, Mr. Coolidge's car was surrounded and nearly a thousand persons managed to reach the pier before the party could get aboard the launch. The president received quite an ovation and stood in the small boat waving his hat as it sped out to the Mayflower.

GENERAL BUTLER FORCED TO STOP 'CLEAN UP'

Philadelphia, Pa., July 21.—General Smedley D. Butler, who was brought to Philadelphia from the United States marine corps by Mayor Kendrick to "clean up" the city, will be forced to resign as director of public safety unless he "decides to listen to reason." It was learned from officials close to the general last night. Should he decide to "go along," these officials said, he would be permitted to remain until January 5, when he leaves for the marine corps. He will be accused of being "out of harmony" with the administration, it was said.

Neither General Butler nor Mayor Kendrick would discuss the situation but other officials said he was aware of the "coming showdown" and was prepared for it.

COAL LADEN BARGE SINKS OFF BODEGA BAY

San Francisco, Cal., July 21.—The barge Isaac Reed which was being towed from here to Eureka, with coal, sank last night off Bodega bay. The eight men aboard were rescued by coast guardsmen. The barge had been leaking for some hours and an effort was made to get it into Bodega bay before it foundered but after its pumps became clogged with coal dust the tug Sea Ranger, which had the craft in tow, summoned the coast guardsmen and shortly after they had been taken off the barge went down.

TAX APPEAL BOARD ANNOUNCES REGULATIONS

Washington, July 21.—The new board of tax appeals has announced its regulations covering cases which the treasury has been unable to settle with the tax payer. The regulations include a rigid code of rules for persons admitted to practice before the board.

In regard to the admission of persons to practice before the board, a registry of those admitted would be kept although any individual tax payer of any officer of any corporation may appear in his own or corporate name.

Farm Pointers

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, July 21.—Wheat smut has yielded to control by copper carbonate dust, according to investigations by the experiment station. The cost, the labor and the risk are less than for treatment with liquid bluestone and formaldehyde. Fewer seeds are damaged by the chemicals and hence one-fourth less seed is ample for a good stand. The plants germinate better under unfavorable conditions of drought and emerge much stronger and more vigorous.

Oregon Fleeces Heavy.
The average weight of the Oregon fleece is 9 pounds, more than a pound better than the average weight for the country which was reported as 7 to 8 pounds in 1922. The national average was raised from 1.85 pounds in 1840 to its present size, and is still improving with careful selection of stock. It is significant, says the experiment station authorities, to note that many hands in Oregon average 10 pounds. Careful culling of poor fleeces has been in being conducted by different owners with a view to raise the average weight still further.

Succession vegetable crops for fall and winter use such as cabbage, cauliflower, brussels sprouts, kale, broccoli and celery can be set out on ground cleared of the early maturing crops. By making suitable plans and carrying them out promptly the garden of farm or country lot may be made to perform double duty. Provision may also be made for successive seedlings of radish and lettuce, designated by the Oregon station as important all-year vegetables.

Comparatively few Oregon produce certified potato seed. Three trips must be made by the Oregon Agricultural college extension service specialists to the farms of those who attempt it. The growers usually receive a premium for their seed, and a small fee is asked to help pay the expenses.

TRAINED HORSE STARS IN FILM
There have been many trained animals in pictures, but Hal Roach is responsible for another screen innovation through putting an untamed, unconquered, magnificent black stallion in the leading role of "The King of Wild Horses," the Pathé picture showing today and Tuesday at the Oregon theater.

Here, he has been appropriately named a "beast of Oregon" and was anything but a trained horse when Roach found him. He was an outlaw, a "killer." He was so dangerous his owners kept him chained in a stall. He needed shoes and other attention, but none could approach him.

Roach had sent Fred Jackson, his director, and "Chick" Morrison, veteran horse trainer, securing for an equine leading man. They heard of Rex and, after some telegraphic correspondence, they bought him. It took two weeks of patience and kindness for Morrison to win Rex's confidence. Then they started the picture.

Patrons of the theater will see on the screen the result of their humane treatment and their knowledge of animal psychology. Rex "acts" like a seasoned trouper. It is difficult to realize that he has not been trained for years before the camera.

Of course no spirited stallion ever becomes a gentle house pet. Rex will never be a safe horse for domestic purposes, but the Hal Roach studios have made him a useful citizen and brought him into a happier life. Edna Murphy and Leon Barry play the leading parts in the drama of romance and intrigue that is woven throughout the horse's story.

Mt. Ansel Rancher Dead.
Mt. Angel, Or., July 21.—Frank Erwert Sr., aged 64, a prominent farmer and hop grower living two miles north of town, died Saturday after a lingering illness of several months. His wife and six children, three of them being married and all living in this vicinity, survive him. The funeral was held this morning at 8 o'clock at this place.

Copper carbonate dust treatment of seed has been found by the Oregon experiment station to be effective in smut control, to aid rather than harm germination, to reduce the amount of grain seeded after liquor treatment 25 per cent, to reduce losses from holding treated grain in bad weather, and to produce good healthy plants under otherwise unfavorable conditions.

It is economy on the part of Oregon farmers who raise stock to pasture the stubble field with hogs or sheep, the experiment station finds. The grain shattered and lodged will be readily gathered up by them and converted into a marketable form. Where considerable grain has lodged, hogs are used. Sheep are a good substitute.

Contagious abortion of cattle must be checked in Oregon or it will bring financial ruin to increasing numbers of cattle owners. All forces interested must band together for the fight, says Dr. B. T. Simms of the experiment station. Investigators must push forward finding new truths and making new discoveries, and working out new methods of applying them. Dairymen and beef producers and all dairy and beef associations are urged to support the experiment station in this work.

Losses in barn yard manure may be cut down by protecting it from leaching in the rainy season, keeping it moist in the dry season and mixing with land plaster or superphosphate to prevent the escape of nitrogen in the form of ammonia, advises the Oregon Agricultural experiment station.

Bee hives well placed under Oregon conditions do not rest directly on the ground. Timbers 2 by 4 inches, brickets, or special stands are used for supports, a stand 6 inches high being the best. A sloping board is placed from the ground to the entrance to permit heavily laden bees that drop near the hive to reach the entrance.

AMERICANS WIN WATER PRIZES
Les Tourelles, France, July 21.—The distribution of prizes in the Olympic swimming competition took place immediately after the water polo match yesterday between the United States and Sweden. Count Clary, president of the French Olympic committee, and Count Jean De Castellane greeted each winner with a hearty handshake and a complimentary medal.

After handing four-fifths of the medals to the Americans, Count Clary remarked: "This looks like an American holiday."
When a non-American winner was called up to the official tribune the crowd cheered lustily, and the band ceased to play "The Star Spangled Banner," for a moment struck another national anthem. It was "God Save the King," in honor of Miss Morton, Great Britain winner of the 200-meter breast stroke.

PERSIANS TO PUNISH SLAYERS OF CONSUL
Morristown, N. J., July 21.—No mercy will be shown those responsible for the fatal beating of Vice Consul Robert Imbrie by a fanatical mob at Teheran, Persia, H. H. Topakyon, acting consul general of the Persian government in the United States, said last night at his summer home near Morristown, Tenn.

"They will be promptly executed at the place of their crime and the executions may be witnessed by the American minister and his staff," the Persian representative said.
Mr. Topakyon declared arrests already have been made in the case and trial by court martial will take place immediately.

\$15,000 BLAZE BURNS ALBANY BAKERY PLANT

Albany, Ore., July 21.—Damage amounting to nearly \$15,000 resulted from a fire that this Sunday afternoon swept through a quarter block frame building. The greatest amount of damage was done to the Albany bakery building and plant, of which F. Firschau is proprietor.

The entire stock, building and some machinery were consumed. The damage was estimated at \$10,000.
A lodging house maintained on the second floor over the bakery suffered a damage of approximately \$1,000. Apartments in the same building sustained damage amounting to about \$2,000, and a meat market and a cleaning establishment suffered damage amounting to about \$2,000.

Most of the fixtures and furnishings in the apartments and in the cleaning works were saved. Some damage was done to the property of the telephone and electric light company.
Insurance covered the loss of most of the property. Firschau was the heaviest loser, with a damage of \$10,000 and insurance over all of \$7,000. This brings the loss by fire in Albany to nearly \$25,000 during a week.

Although fire threatened nearby dwellings and buildings, quick work by the fire department saved the property.

GOVERNOR COOPERATES ON NATIONAL DEFENSE DAY
Governor Pierce, despite a large number of pacifist protests received at his department during the last few days, announced that he will do everything in his power to make National Defense day, September 12, a great success.

"I am in no sense a militarist," said Governor Pierce, "but I do believe in being prepared for defensive war. Danger of attack cannot be allayed by the methods of the pacifist."
Plans for National Defense day are being formulated under the supervision of a general committee named by Governor Pierce. Dr. W. J. Kerr, president of Oregon Agricultural college, is president of the committee. Each county in the state will join in the movement, which is sponsored by the war department.

On National Defense day all land forces will be called to the colors to test their ability to mobilize. The American Legion, Grand Army of the Republic and other veteran and patriotic organizations will be requested to participate in ceremonies to be held in connection with the mobilization programme.

DONATED LAND ACCEPTED FOR REFORESTATION

Portland, July 21.—The acceptance of donations by the government of privately owned land suitable for forest growing, is one of the important provisions of the recently enacted Clarke-McNary bill, according to C. J. Buck, assistant district forester, in charge of lands work in the North Pacific district of the forest service.

"For the past several years," said Mr. Buck, "a number of private owners interested in forestry have attempted to donate cut-over land to the forest service. Their object in doing this was to be sure that such cut-over land would be given fire protection and the proper forestry methods applied so that a second crop of timber could be produced. Strange though it may seem, there has heretofore been no method whereby the government could accept such donation. Section 7 of the new forestry act now makes this procedure possible."

Some of the outstanding features of the section, according to Mr. Buck, are that the land must be chiefly valuable for growing timber and that it be in such units of size and location as to be capable of economical and effective administration for natural forest purposes. It is not necessary that the donated land shall be within an existing national forest, nor upon the watershed of a navigable stream.
