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FOREST FIRES PRINCIPALLY DUE TO CARELESSNESS

Portland, July 28.—A total of six hundred and fifty-four forest fires have been reported so far this season on the national forests of Oregon and Washington, according to figures for the period ending July 26, just compiled in the office of the district forester.

One hundred and thirty-two of these fires were caused by smokers, and one hundred and one by campers—a total of two hundred and thirty-three from these two causes, the report states. Seventy-nine fires are attributed to brush burning and lumbering. Three hundred and ninety-eight of the fires were man caused, and therefore should have been prevented, it is said. To date fifty-seven convictions for violations of the fire laws have been reported to the district office.

Those figures are estimated to have covered a total of 15,314 acres of national forest land, 4913 acres of private land inside national forest boundaries, and 13,372 acres of private land outside and adjacent to national forest boundaries.

Forest officers point out that these figures are for national forest territory, and do not cover the state as a whole. National forests are, as a rule, in the higher mountainous country where the greatest hazards come from the camper, the smoker, and lightning fires. In the lower portions of the two states, it is said, the hazard from loggers and brush burning fires is greater, some of the more serious fires starting from these causes. Many of such fires are said to start from old smoldering stumps or slashings which are thought to be safe, and abandoned.

Instructions to forest service employees issued this year require that no fire on national forest land be abandoned until the last apparent spark is out.

MORE ALIENISTS TO AID YOUTHS

Chicago, Ill., July 28.—Dr. William J. Healy of Boston and Dr. Benjamin Glueck of New York, alienists, were added to the staff of the defense Saturday at the hearing of Nathan Leopold Jr. and Richard Loeb, confessed kidnapers and murderers of 14-year-old Robert Franks. Their presence, it was said, precluded a hard court fight for the lives of the defendants when they have their hearing this week.

Clarence S. Darrow, chief counsel for the defense, announced that Dr. Healy is director of the Baker Foundation of Boston and is a specialist in juvenile delinquency. He said Dr. Glueck, formerly was examining alienist at Sing Sing, New York, and more recently attached to the municipal courts in New York. He, too, is active in juvenile cases.

Pay Oxford Beer Debt of L. Washington

Oxford, Eng., July 28.—(By Associated Press.)—Members of the American Bar association have paid a college debt of 17 shillings 10 pence for "Battel," more specifically, bread and beer, which was left unpaid by Lawrence Washington, great uncle of George Washington, when he left Brasenose college in 1633.

After a luncheon in the hall of the college with the principal and fellows of Brasenose the visiting lawyers were shown old college records, including this unpaid bill of Washington's. Immediately afterward the Americans held a meeting and, with the amused sanction of the principal and in recognition of the hospitality they had enjoyed, but with one condition, the question of accrued interest being indefinitely waived, they subscribed the outstanding 17 shillings and 10 pence. With some ceremony they handed the money to the principal so that the Brasenose records no longer would show any blot on the escutcheon of the Washingtons.

WOMAN'S LEGS BROKEN WHEN CAR MISSES BRIDGE

Eugene, Or., July 28.—Mrs. Leonard Douglas, who with her husband and baby were motoring from California to Cottage Grove, had both legs broken Saturday night near Grants Pass, Or., when their car missed the approach to a bridge and plunged down an embankment. The infant sitting on its mother's lap was uninjured. Mr. Douglas, driving the machine, was only slightly bruised.

PIERCE-MYERS FAVOR HIGHWAY

Governor Pierce and Jefferson Myers, state treasurer, in attendance issued Saturday went on record favoring early construction of what is known as the Redwoods highway. This road would connect with the Roosevelt highway at the California line near Monumental and extend to Grants Pass, where it would intersect Pacific highway.

The announcement was made by the officials following their return from Grants Pass, where they attended a conference of prominent Oregon and California citizens. The proposed new road would be approximately 60 miles in length and according to engineer's estimates would not cost to exceed \$350,000. Completion of this highway would provide an inland route for tourists, who now travel north from California over the Roosevelt early coast highway. From Crescent City travelers could drive inland to Grants Pass, thence up to Crater Lake and over The Dalles-California highway to The Dalles. Returning the trip could be made from The Dalles to Portland over the Columbia river highway and thence south to California points over the Pacific highway. This would provide a

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AUTOS WHIRLED ABOUT ON WET TRACK IN RACES

GIRL KILLED IN AUTO CRASH

Seattle, Wash., July 28.—A five-year-old girl was hurled 20 feet through the air and killed and three other persons were seriously injured here last night when a speeding inbound Tacoma-Seattle interurban train crashed into an automobile in which they were riding in the south outskirts of the city.

The dead girl is Isabella Eisen. Her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Eisen, are suffering from internal injuries and possible skull fractures. Miss Mary Steinhoff, 21, a cousin of Mrs. Eisen, sustained a fractured hip and head injuries.

The Eisen family and Miss Steinhoff were returning to Seattle from an outing in the Duwamish valley. Eisen, who was driving, failed to notice an approaching interurban at the South Seattle grade crossing and the automobile was struck, dragged 70 feet and demolished.
