PAVING WORK AT WOODBURN NEARS FINISH

Woodburn, Or., July 29.—By the end of the week all of the paving work included in the summer schedule will probably be completed with a possibility of other petitions being granted before that time, and before the county finishes work in this district. The plant at Seallard was in use until the end of the week for the work on the stretch of road between Donald and Aurora and having completed that work they have returned to complete work here that was held up earlier because of the shortage of gravel.

West Cleveland and Third street are the two stretches being worked on now. The only two left over, Third street is about completed at the south end and will be entirely done in a day or two. The Oregon Electric tracks on Main street have been torn up and the street is being filled in there also. It is quite an improvement in driving to have the surface unbroken by tracks.

RECORD LISTING OF RACE HORSES FOR STATE FAIR

With a record listing of horses for the race events at the state fair for this fall and the class of those better than ever before, the Lone Oak park will be a bigger feature of the six days' show than ever, according to Mrs. Ella Wilson, secretary of the state fair board.

The entries closed on July 15 and include some of the best trotters and pacers in the west. One reason for the high class of horses to be brought here is that the racing season in the north closes on Sept. 20 with a number of the owners bringing their horses here. A number of eastern horses will also be shown here.

Among the most popular of the trotters who were here last year and will be seen again this year are Wm. Gray, owned by George E. Munner of Seattle; F. S. Montgomery, owned by Cannon and Stewart of Pennington, Cal.; Koyanna Mac, owned by M. C. Kiefer of Pleasanton, Cal.; and Cavalier Gale, owned by E. A. White of Olympia, Wash.

Of the pacers the beautiful Barondale, owned by G. L. Parker of Portland, will have her share of followers. Mack Fitzsimmons, owned by Ed Denison of Portland; Baron C., owned by W. Williams of Lewisville, Ida.; and Princess Hal, owned by Greer and Brannetter of Eugene, are other horses well known here.

Brough, Eng., July 29.—(By Associated Press.)—The American round-the-world aviators will take off for Kirkwall at 5 o'clock tomorrow morning, according to present arrangements.

This early departure on the first stretch of the final leg of more than 7000 miles yet to be covered by the airmen and made possible by completion of the arrangements for patrolling the route and the tests made yesterday of the air planes. The machines had their first flight since the pontoons have been attached and their performance proved quite satisfactory.

UNCLE SAM TO SPEND \$385,400 ON FOREST ROADS

Expenditures totaling \$385,400 of forest highway funds for the construction of highways within or adjacent to the national forests in Oregon have been approved by the secretary of agriculture, announces the forest service.

One of the projects is the building of four and a half miles along the Alsea river highway which serves the Siuslaw national forest in Lincoln county. The federal government has allotted \$18,000 to this work and the state and county authorities have allotted \$50,000.

Dangerous Hill Eliminated.
To eliminate a dangerous section of the Applegate highway in the Mule hill district of the Crater national forest the sum of \$22,000 has been set aside to construct one mile of road that forms part of an important county highway.

In the Deschutes national forest the Dallas-California highway is to be extended about 20 miles, the federal government expending \$120,000 for surfacing and grading and the state of Oregon an additional \$120,000. In this same forest the McKenzie road will be extended eight miles, the sum of \$25,000 having been allotted for this work with the state furnishing a like sum.

To complete the surfacing of the entire Mt. Hood loop highway in the Mt. Hood national forest the sum of \$12,500 has been set aside, with the state of Oregon expending an additional \$12,500.

Work on Roosevelt Highway.

FOREST AREAS CLOSED TO PUBLIC BY FIRE HAZARD

Portland, July 29.—The well known Larch Mountain Trail, on the Mt. Hood national forest, is closed to travelers, according to a statement just issued by the district office, U. S. forest service, Portland. The area closed embraces nine sections of land, and takes in practically all of the mountain, and the upper portion of the trail. This action was taken by the district office at the request of Forest Supervisor Sherrard, who stated that the strip of deadfall and broken limbs along the trail as the result of the ice storm of 1921-22, constituted a serious fire menace, especially in conjunction with the great number of pleasure seekers who climb the mountain. While some of these visitors are said to be careful, reports indicate that others are irresponsible, careless and thoughtless, and it is therefore necessary to keep everyone out in order to remove the fire hazard. The fact that this region is adjacent to the famous Bull Run watershed of the Mt. Hood national forest, which furnishes the city of Portland with drinking water, makes it of utmost importance to protect the region from forest fires.

Other Areas Closed.
Three watersheds on the Whitman national forest, in eastern Oregon have also just closed, according to the report. These are: Ald E. Long, all of Portland. Publicity committee—Ward Irvine, R. T. Jacob of Portland, E. B. Aldrich of Pendleton, R. R. Cronk of Albany, Paul R. Kingston of Milton.

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The Baker watershed, the Mill Creek watershed and the Black Pines watershed—an area of 17,000 acres.

In addition to these regions, the following areas have been reported closed to camping, smoking and use of matches in the national forests of Oregon and Washington:

Mt. Baker national forest: The portion of the Skagit river valley lying within one half mile of the city of Seattle railroad, from the point where it crosses the national forest boundary, to the end of the railroad near George creek.

Colville national forest: Boulder creek, Deadman creek and Sherman Creek watersheds. Chelan national forest: All of the forest is closed to campers except under permit, and on designated camp grounds. Cascade national forest: Fall creek and Salt creek watersheds. The forest service contemplates the closing of other national forest areas, should the high fire danger continue. In particular, certain important areas on the Wallowa national forest will probably be closed in the near future, according to the report.

**KLAMATH TIMBER SOLD
TO MINNEAPOLIS FIRM**

Washington, July 29.—Contract for the cutting of 300,000,000 feet of pine timber on the north marsh unit of the Klamath Indian reservation in Oregon was awarded by the interior department today to

the Fremont Land company of Minneapolis.

The prices to be paid are \$5.50 per thousand feet for yellow and sugar pine; \$2.50 for Douglas fir and incense cedar; and \$2 for other species. For a period beginning April 1, 1925, the price will be advanced 12 per cent and later other increases will be made.

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
