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THREATEN TO HOLD UP ALBANY BRIDGE CONTRACT

Portland, July 30.—An injunction is threatened as soon as the contractor starts work on the new Albany bridge. The threat was made yesterday after the highway commission refused to change the location of the bridge at the request of a few business men.

If the injunction is issued, then, say Commissioners William Duby, W. H. Malone and H. B. VanDuzer, the commission will take it for granted that Albany does not want the bridge and so the highway department will let the matter drop.

The Albany bridge has been a source of trouble of late. The Linn county court balked at signing the agreement for the bridge for a time, and then a complaint came over the site selected. Yesterday three or four business men of Albany appeared with their lawyer and wanted the location changed. The commission saw no reason for doing so, and the contractor, who was present, stated that the contract has been signed and his bond filed.

Finding the commission prepared to build on the site intended, the delegation announced that the moment the contractor starts digging the first hole for the bridge construction an injunction will be served and the work tied up. In so far as the state highway commission is concerned, this threat caused no worry, for the commission is not vitally interested in the bridge, as are the people of Albany, and if Albany doesn't want the bridge built the commission has no intention of fighting the proposed restraining order.

REPAIR SCHOOLS AT MILL CITY

Mill City, July 30.—During the summer vacation, considerable repair work is being done on the Mill City schools. One more room is being fitted for use in the new high school building, and both schools are being given a fresh coat of paint on the inside. The gymnasium building is being celled in, which will make the building easier to heat and improve the looks. Additional desks are also being installed.

Ten more fire fighters have been sent to Detroit to patrol the burned over district in that vicinity, and to help in the final extinguishing of the fire, which burned so fiercely there last week.

The Santiam garage, which was started here by C. M. Cline and Sam House about one year ago, has been sold to Adams Brothers of Mill City, the active management of the business to be handled by George Adams. The Santiam garage is the authorized Ford dealer for this section, and is a thriving concern. Since the initial building was erected, owing to the expansion of business, it was found necessary to erect an addition to their original building, which is now being used for storing cars.

SUMMER STUDENTS GIVE \$15,220 TO UNIVERSITY

University of Oregon, Eugene, July 30.—Students of the summer session have pledged a total amount of \$15,220 to the gift campaign of the University of Oregon. Of this amount \$12,000 had been pledged by students and alumni previous to the two day campaign put on by the summer session students. \$3220 was pledged during the two day campaign.

Students and alumni have now subscribed nearly half a million dollars to the \$1,000,000 building fund. Another half million is represented by a bond issue authorized by Eugene for an auditorium.

Hadley Arrested. Dallas, Or., July 30.—Charged with a statutory offense, John Hadley was arrested by deputy sheriffs at West Salem, Tuesday, and lodged in jail here. He will have a preliminary hearing here Thursday. Hadley is said to be an ex-convict.

LONGVIEW HOLDS GREAT PAGEANT DURING WEEK

Longview, Wash., July 30.—(Special).—A four-day "Pageant of Progress" designed of a magnitude to make it one of the notable celebrations ever held in the Pacific northwest, has been arranged by business men and townpeople of the new city of Longview, to take place on July 31, August 1, 2 and 3.

The pageant is to celebrate the opening of the lumber manufacturing plants of the Long-Bell Lumber company at Longview on July 31 and the first anniversary of the dedication of Longview, which occurred in July one year ago.

Many Attractions. Committees composed of more than 100 local citizens have arranged a program replete with major attractions. A water regatta will be held on the Columbia river in which a score of the fastest power boats on the coast, including the Adcox 1 and Vogler Boy V, will vie for awards which total \$2500. In addition there will be surf board riding, a cruiser race from Portland to Longview and inspection of a United States warship riding in the Longview harbor.

A roundup in which more than 60 of the best known riders of the northwest and 200 head of stock will participate, will be an afternoon event on the first three days of the pageant. Prizes total \$2000. A program of loggers' sports will include a tree-topping exhibition, never before seen at a celebration program, jousting events, log sawing exhibitions and log rolling contests for the northwest and world's championships. Matt Dillon, present world champion, will defend his title against more than 50 of the best log rollers in the northwest.

Nightly Fireworks. A nightly program of fireworks staged by the same company which was responsible for the fireworks displays at the Panama-Pacific International exposition in San Francisco in 1915, will be a feature. This program together with daylight fireworks, will be one of the most elaborate fireworks displays ever held in the Pacific northwest, according to the company.

An industrial parade on Saturday afternoon will be participated in by civic, social and fraternal organizations and big industrial concerns from a score or more cities of the Pacific northwest. Responses to invitations indicate that more than 150 floats will be entered in this event. The parade will be divided into eight classifications for the purpose of awarding \$1500 in prizes.

Among noted speakers who will deliver addresses at the celebration are William A. "Billy" Sunday, noted evangelist; Admiral H. E. Coontz, of the Pacific fleet, and Senator Frank Willis of Ohio. Services of Mr. Sunday will be attended by music from a choir representing the united choirs of all churches in Longview and surrounding cities.

Coronation of Miss Longview will be one of the features of a nighty Mardi Gras, which will include outdoor dancing on a Japanese garden pavilion. Carnival attractions and commercial airplanes will be in Longview during the celebration.

BOOK TO DESCRIBE OREGON WILD FLOWERS

University of Oregon, Eugene, July 30.—"Who's Who in the Oregon Flowerland" is the probable title of the book now being prepared by Albert R. Sweetser, professor of botany in the University of Oregon. The book will describe 150 common wild flowers of Oregon and will be profusely illustrated with photographs from nature.

"It will be written in popular language," Professor Sweetser stated, "so anybody with the slightest knowledge of botany can identify the flowers he sees, and it will also contain more scientific information for the better informed."

A scientific key to the flowers described, and allusions to them in literature will be included in the volume, which will be of pocket size.

Mr. Coolidge, they point out, has been under heavy pressure during his year of office, being forced to assume the duties suddenly upon the death of President Harding. He has been almost constantly at his desk and has suffered an additional strain by the recent death of his son, Calvin Jr. Mr. Coolidge has gained some relaxation in his week-end trips with his family aboard the Mayflower but the work of routine duties of the office last week took him even from this.

Secretary Weeks has invited Mr. Coolidge to his summer home in New England and it is thought if the president leaves the capital he probably will go to New England.
