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STREET PAVING PROTESTS FALL UPON DEAF EARS

Dallas, Aug. 6.—In the face of strong objection to a number of property owners on Jefferson and Shelton streets, the city council voted to proceed with the paving of all streets on the new project and over-ruled all remonstrances.

The stand taken by the council, as voiced by C. S. Keller, chairman of the street committee, was that the principal residential streets of Dallas should be paved, if the present paving program were to amount to anything, and that now seems the most economical time to do it.

The chief objection voiced by property owners to the paving was that the two streets in question are now in good order and paving will be an unnecessary expense.

Bids on the new paving project will be received August 18 at the next regular meeting of the council. It is expected that the work will go to J. C. Compton at about the same figure as the paving now under construction.

An ordinance designed to protect the new pavement of the city from excessive loads was introduced by Councilman Kresson. Complaint was voiced by members of the council that gravel trucks have been using more than the 12 mile speed limit on the streets, and probably overloading. The new ordinance will fix load limits under the state highway minimum on the paved streets.

Signs were taken for the sale of an house of street intersection paving bonds, and an issue of bonds under the Hancock act in the Washington street sewer district.

174 FIRES SET BY SMOKERS IN FOREST AREAS

Smokers were responsible for one hundred and seventy-four forest fires, and campers for one hundred and nineteen forest fires, in the national forest of Oregon and Washington, according to reports for the current fire season up to July 31, just compiled in the office of the district forester, Portland, Oregon.

Next in the list come brush-burning and lumbering, with a total of eighty-six fires; railroads, twenty-five fires; and incendiary twenty-three fires. A total of seven hundred and sixty fires are covered by the reports. Sixty-two percent of these are man-caused, the remainder being due to lightning. Forest officers point out that the percentage of man-caused fires is somewhat lower than usual, indicating that more people are learning the lesson of care with fire in the forest. They state, however, that the percentage is still too high, there being no reason why the man-caused fires should not be eliminated altogether.

Estimates based on the reports show that these fires covered 25,114 acres of national forest land, 8,118 acres of private land inside national forest boundaries, and 34,182 acres of private land adjacent to national forest boundaries. A total of 72 convictions for fire law violations are reported.

The figures given apply only to fires handled by forest officers on national forests and adjoining territory in Oregon and Washington.

SILVERTON LEGION TO IMPROVE CITY PARK

Silverton, Or., Aug. 6.—Delbert Reeves, post of the American Legion held a very interesting meeting Monday night at the Knights of Pythias hall. Due to illness Commander Harry Carson was unable to be present and Vice-Commander Clifford Rine presided in his stead.

At this meeting the membership committee reported that a stag party would be given this coming Saturday night and tent all ex-service men are invited to attend. The place of holding the meeting had as yet not been decided upon but will be announced later in the week.

Another thing of more importance was the vote of the Legion to build a permanent tennis court and skating rink in the city park provided the city will give its consent. The rink and court is to be made of asphalt.

It was also decided to hold a fair at Silverton about the middle of September. The Legion will take charge of this and it will be in the form of a county fair. Livestock will be particularly featured although many other exhibits will be in evidence. Charles Reynolds and Charles Johnson compose the committee in charge of the fair.
