UNION SCHOOL AT WOODBURN AGAIN LOSES

Woodburn, Or., Aug. 7.—The proposal for the formation of a new Woodburn union high school district was turned down yesterday when four of the nine districts from which petitions had been filed voted against the proposition, one tied in its vote and four voted for it. In each district sentiment was rather strongly centralized either for or against the formation.

Nineteen districts near Woodburn formed a union high school in 1923 and for about six months of the past year the organization of the school continued, the union later being dissolved by a ruling of the supreme court that the law under which it was formed was unlawful. Immediately work was started to reorganize the district, petitions being filed with the county court from nine districts, supposedly favorable. The election called for yesterday in these districts settled the question and does away with the union high school.

The high school here to be operated now by district 103 will still attract students from outlying districts, although the system of transportation in effect during the past year will be done away with and thus bar some students from taking advantage of the high school.

Woodburn, Butteville, Donald and Hubbard districts voted for the formation of the union school; Union tied in its vote and Aurora, Hall, Belle Pamel and White voted against it. The vote was as follows: Woodburn—For 102, against 6; Butteville—For 50, against 10; Donald—For 19, against 10; Hubbard—For 83, against 33; White—For 7, against 21; Aurora—For 9, against 55; Union—For 15, against 15; Hall—For 4, against 15; Belle Pamel—For 15, against 15.

At an earlier election Aurora voted not to join the Oakley Hill district, the excuse given being that the city expects to build its own high school in the near future. The election of directors for the proposed district was automatically declared void.

Silverton News

The Silverton Odd Fellows and Rebekahs enjoyed a treat Saturday night when the Master of the Star Lodge No. 214 of Portland entertained down and put on an entertainment at the Silverton I. O. O. F. hall. Those present reported an excellent time and many remarked that it was the best program they had ever heard. It consisted of music, skits and readings. The Portlanders camped at Dufur's park Saturday night and spent Sunday in giving their own entertainment at the Silverton I. O. O. F. hall.

A committee of the Silverton high school alumni association is at work on the preparation of a play which the association hopes to put on a little later in the season. The play which is at present being considered is "The Irresistible Marmaduke." The cast has as yet not been selected but several are being considered. The alumni association has a promising group to select from, many of them having been members of the Playmakers, a dramatic organization which has proved very popular at Silverton.

Mrs. M. J. Naden went to Spring Valley, Tuesday evening, to spend a few days with her son, Victor, who is in charge of his brother, Alvin's farm during the latter's encampment at Camp Lewis, where he is a member of the officers' reserve corps. Mrs. Naden expects to return to her Silverton home the early part of next week.

REVIVAL OF POLK COUNTY FAIR IS URGED UPON CLUB

Dallas, Or., Aug. 7.—The 1925 Polk county fair, hard surfaced roads, and beautification of the court house lawn and city parking strips all came in for a round of discussion at a rather prolonged meeting of the commercial club directors Tuesday night.

Sentiment was voiced strongly in favor of a fair for next year and the matter was left in the hands of Mrs. Winnie Braden, secretary, for the present to take whatever action might seem necessary to further the interests of the fair.

Discussion was directed to the construction of hard surfaced roads by Robert Kresson. Mr. Kresson mentioned the Marion county plan, whereby many miles of permanent roads have been built through the adoption of a plan of paying a few miles of road each year. The Marion county court maintains its own plant and paves at a cost of \$10,000 a mile as compared with a state cost of approximately \$27,100.

The proposition of purchase of the present Compton plant when the Dallas contract is completed was mentioned as a deal that might be advantageously located. The suggestion met with approval in the discussion but no action was taken.

A report of Professor Peck's suggestions for beautifying the court house lawn was made. He had advised the planting of trees as a part of the major scheme for the square and the utilization of the front semi-circle for a band location, without the erection of a stand. The suggestion of trees rather than shrubs and lawn were opposed by some.

The question of a public comfort station was given consideration and Mrs. Braden reported that county court members had expressed a willingness to co-operate if some suitable place could be found available in the basement of the building. The matter of a public comfort station and rest room is something which should be provided without fail.

Preliminary plans were taken up for entertaining the older boys' conference here in November. A committee is now working upon this and others will be assigned later.

SEATTLE LAYS PLANS FOR 1925 CONVENTION

Seattle, Wash.—Preliminary arrangements already have been made by Bethlehem Commandery of Seattle for an impressive ceremony to take place during the triennial convocation of the Knights Templar of the United States here in July, 1925.

The International Traveling Beausant of the order will be formally presented to the commandery in the University of Washington stadium for the Western Gate Precinct of Victoria, B. C. At the close of a living passion cross formed by more than 2500 Knights Templar, the beausant, a reproduction of the battle guidon carried by the ancient Templars, will be presented as 100 characters sing age-old songs of the order.

The beausant was started on a world journey by the Grand Priory of Canada in March, 1921, to carry a message of universal peace.

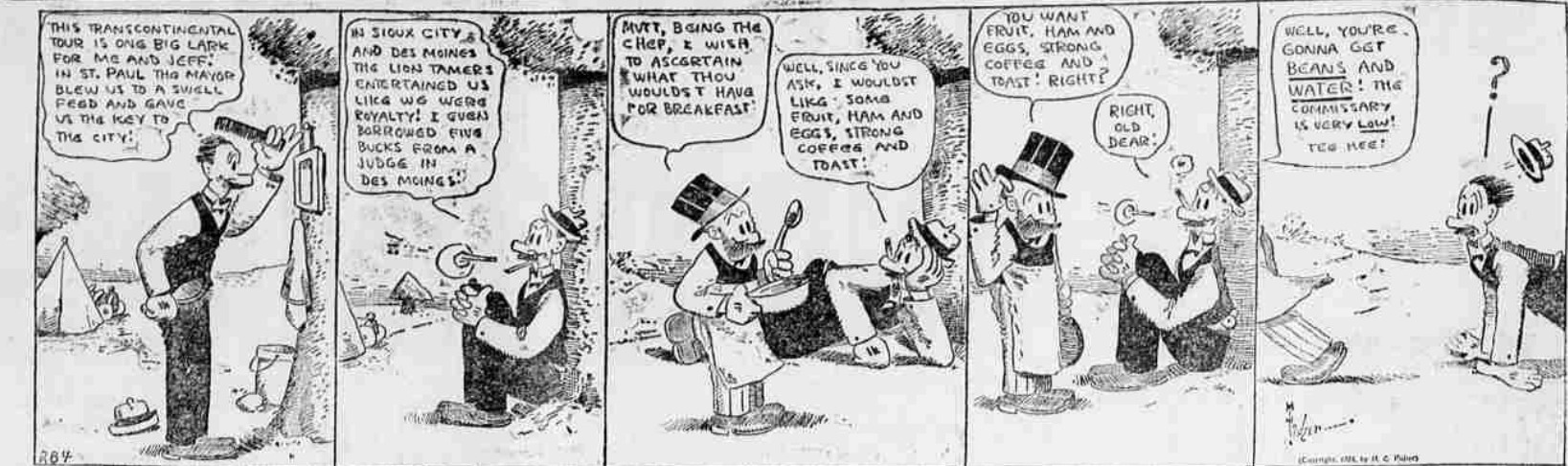

WILDCAT CHOKED TO DEATH BY MOTORIST

Grand Junction, Colo.—Victor Douglas, a miner, was driving with a companion in an automobile near here recently when a wildcat crossed the road in front of them and climbed to a ledge on the cliff above the road. Douglas snared the beast with a long stick and baling wire.

The enraged cat sprang, but Douglas dodged and was able to keep it from closing in on him by whirling it around him at the end of the wire. Finally Douglas began to grow dizzy, and giving the wire a final shove, he let it against the cliff and dashed for his car. But the beast did not move. The men found it had been choked to death.

BRITISH RULERS MEET DOMINION LEGISLATORS

London—Among the many events in which King George and Queen Mary have participated during this busy season, that at Westminster Hall adjoining the House of Commons recently was probably the most interesting to them. Here they met, informally, virtually all the leading members of the Dominion Parliaments who are visiting the other country.

The gathering was the first meeting between the king and his empire legislators. There were no formal speeches, just a homely chat between king and empire rulers.

The king and queen were received at the entrance by the Lord Chancellor, the speaker of the House of Commons, Labor Cabinet members and other high officials, after which they were presented individually to the various overseas representatives.

SPEED OF 1200 MILES AN HOUR PREDICTED

Stockholm—Flights between Europe and America in two hours at an altitude of 10 miles and with 2000 horsepower motors, are forecast by S. Lindequist, a well-known Swedish airplane constructor, in a statement published by a leading Stockholm paper.

One of the greatest aims in aviation in the immediate future should be to cut down the flying time between continents, says Mr. Lindequist, and this probably can be done by flying at extremely high altitudes. The effect of gravitation decreases with the increase in altitude, and it has been estimated, he says, that a plane which has a speed of 100 miles an hour near the surface of the earth can attain a speed of 1200 miles an hour at an altitude of about 10 miles.

As a whole the grain crop in these two districts was reported as being very good, the fields averaging from 30 to 50 bushels per acre.

One grower reported that on a small grain field, about three acres, he harvested an average of 71 bushels of wheat.

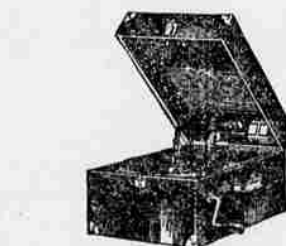

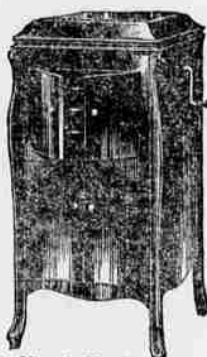
