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INDEPENDENCE JUSTICE IS SUED FOR FINE MONEY

Dallas, Or., Aug. 8.—A suit has been filed in the county court by Charles Gregory, county treasurer, against R. W. Baker, justice of the peace of Independence, seeking to compel Mr. Baker to pay to the treasurer fines amounting to \$209. These fines, according to the complaint, were levied in March, 1923, on various game law offenders.

The complaint states: "That the defendant has not paid said sums of money to the treasurer of Polk county, as by law provided, except the sum of \$199 was paid to the plaintiff herein by J. N. Helgeson on July 25, 1924." It asks that the balance of \$100 and interest on \$209 from March, 1923, and costs and disbursements of the suit be paid by the defendant.

The case will come before County Judge Robinson, insofar as Justice Baker is involved the suit is a technical one and concerns the manner in which he remitted the fine money to the county.

Mr. Baker is represented by Fletcher & Ellis of Independence and Mr. Gregory by Holman & Harcombe of Dallas.

BOND PROPOSAL MEETS DEFEAT

Monmouth, Or., Aug. 8.—At a special election held here today the voters of Monmouth voted the proposal for bonding the city for \$75,000 for the purpose of installing a sewer system. There were 145 votes cast, 79 for and 72 against the issue with two defective votes.

POLK COUNTY MAN, 82, TAKES BRIDE OF 62

Dallas, Aug. 8.—All marriage age records for men established this year in Polk county were beaten Wednesday by Daniel S. Adams of Salem, 82 year old youngster, who secured a license to wed Mrs. Clara Ethel Thorp, 62, of route 1, Salem. The venture was the third for each of the contracting parties.

Earlier in the season licenses were granted to a couple whose ages were 72 for the man and 76 for the woman, and 67 and 72.

PAVING PROJECT ABANDONED

Woodburn, Or., Aug. 8.—No further action will be taken to pave East Lincoln street, according to a decision reached at the meeting of the city council this week. Since the work could not be completed until fall it was decided to leave the problem until then when the new council will be installed.

The paving plant at Seclair will close in a few days having finished up work here. Third street and West Cleveland, the two final streets have been practically completed. Some repair work will be done on the Mt. Angel-Woodburn road at Stone's corner where the road will be widened at the turn. This is a very necessary piece of work since the corner has long been a hazardous one with a decided slant and narrow paving strip.

CITY COUNCIL OF SILVERTON ACTS

Silverton, Or., Aug. 8.—(Special.)—The August meeting of the city council of Silverton was longer than usual and a great deal of business was discussed and transacted. Much of this related to the reading and accepting of bills for the month of July. Some of it was the discussing of various street improvements. Of the latter the following were brought up: H. Palmeter was present and requested the council on behalf of the residents of Palmeter street, if there was any gravel not wanted by the property owners on East Oak street, to donate the surplus to be used on Palmeter street. He stated that the county promised to bear half of the cost of improving this street but that it had no funds at this time. The request was granted. Lists of streets without sidewalks were read. A petition for the repairing of McClaine street by a two-inch top asphaltic concrete was introduced. It was moved and duly seconded that a grade be established on Sheridan street.

William Hubbs petitioned the city council to grant him a permit to erect a building on the present site of the old Hubbs planing mill on South Water street. He also requested the use of 15 feet of the street for the material used in the new building's construction. The frontage of the new building is to be 130 feet. The matter was referred to the fire commissioner.

An application of Tindall & Kana for a license to open a pool hall at 207 East Main street was presented. After due consideration of the matter and of the fact that there was a strong remonstrance from the business houses on the street the council decided that the best interest of the city would be served by refusing to grant the license.

GIRL REARED BY CLEAVER FINED

Astoria, Or., Aug. 8.—Miss Marvel Robbins, 26, who testified today that she was the foster daughter of Prohibition Director Cleaver, and that she had been reared and educated in the home of the state prohibition chief since the age of 13 years, was found guilty by a jury in the municipal court today on a charge of possession of liquor, and was fined \$300.

The case was one of those developed during a series of raids conducted here recently by Burns agents and state prohibition agents.

Funeral services were held from the Jack & Eckman chapel Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock and the body was sent to Portland, where it will be cremated Friday afternoon at 1 o'clock.

ROAD THRU LAVA TO BE OPENED THIS MONTH

Beard, Or., Aug. 8.—With crews of men working night and day, the deep cut on the east side of the McKenzie pass lava fields will be virtually completed by August 25 and the pass highway can be crossed without the present difficulty, it is announced by Chas. E. Lind, contractor in charge.

Two miles of grading and a 2500 yard cut just west of the lava beds will be completed this season unless autumnal storms slow down the work. A second cut, also west of the summit, will be completed this year. This is an 8000 yard cut.

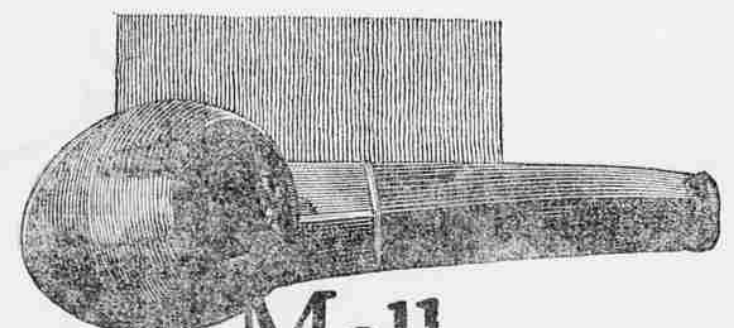
