GIBBONS ASKING FOR MORE MONEY

London, Aug. 13.—Lawyers representing Tom Gibbons, American boxer, have written Major Arnold Wilson, promoter of the Gibbons-Bloomfield fight last Saturday, claiming that \$861 pounds (about \$36,000) is due their client, this being the difference in earnings between \$50,000 and the \$30,000 pounds which Gibbons received.

Major Wilson has gone to the country under physicians' orders, suffering from a nervous breakdown brought on by the strain of managing the fight.

The Daily Sketch says the fight resulted roundly in a loss of 12,000 pounds to its backers, the receipts amounting to 15,000 pounds against expenditures of 27,000 pounds.

KLAMATH TO RESUME DRILLING FOR OIL

Klamath Falls, Or., Aug. 13.—Within two weeks drilling for oil will be resumed on the property of the West Coast Oil & Gas company, according to announcement here today by officials of the company. All improvements on the property, located 20 miles north-east of here, were burned to the ground recently. Drilling had proceeded to a depth of nearly 1500 feet when the fire stopped operations. All stock in the company is held locally and the funds to rebuild were subscribed by Klamath county residents.

THE RENDEZVOUS POWERFUL FILM

Marshall Neilan's new picture for Goldwyn "The Rendezvous," from the original story by Madeleine Ruthven, was screened last night at the Liberty theater, and proved to be one of the best productions made by this master of film technique.

The film is an exceedingly dramatic one; its characters are picturesque and the settings exotic. Prince Sergei Tamiroff has been exiled to Siberia for marrying against the czar's wishes. The wife dies at the birth of their daughter, Vera, and court plotting forces the prince to flee for his life. The child, Vera, is brought up by the prince's friend, Vasily Leonidoff, Juan Godunoff, Tartar brigand, becomes soviet governor and is attracted by the beauty of the 16 year old Vera. She is saved from his advances by Walter Stanford, an American army officer, but upon the latter's return to America, Godunoff forces Vera to marry him in order to save the man she thinks is her father. But the same day Godunoff is imprisoned by agents of the soviet, just before Stanford returns.

The brigand escapes and hides in the shrine which the prince had erected to the memory of his wife, and which had been used as a rendezvous by Stanford and Vera, intending to kill both when they should next visit the spot. But the lovers escape.

From a dramatic point of view the picture is one of the best that Neilan has made; in technique and in photoplay and in lighting it is unusual and compelling. The cast contains players of world wide prominence. Conrad Nagel in the role of the American officer, plays his first part in Goldwyn pictures and has one that exactly suits him. Emmett Corrigan plays the part of Vasily Leonidoff; Elmo Lincoln is the Tartar chieftain, Godunoff; Sydney Chaplin plays the part of a British Tommy, with a refreshing sense of humor; Lucille Ricksen has in "The Rendezvous" her first grown up role and makes it very appealing. Others in the cast are Richard Travers, Kathleen Key, Kate Lester, Cecil Holland, Lucien Littlefield, Eugene Besseler and R. O. Pennington.

EUGENE PLANS WATER SYSTEM

Eugene, Or., Aug. 13.—That the city of Eugene will launch a good-sized water project of its own whether or not the Clear Lake project is constructed and put in operation, and avail itself of the cool mountain waters flowing down the McKenzie river, appeared quite certain at the meeting of the Eugene water board Monday night. The city engineer was authorized the feasibility of the project and report at once.

If the Clear Lake project becomes a reality the Eugene system would be so constructed as to readily link up with the other. Already Eugene has nearly completed a canal 16 miles long, paralleling the McKenzie river in the Cascades as far as Walterville, carrying about 1,000 cubic feet per second and which will develop about 4,000 horsepower in the city's turbines now being installed. Any larger power demand will be met later by installing larger turbines to develop 5,000 horse power.

LOUISIANA GIRLS FINED FOR WEARING KNICKERS

Hammond, La., Aug. 13.—The newly ordained law of the county commissioners of Livingston parish prohibiting the one piece bathing suits, knicker, "petting" parties, and the wearing of trousers by women, had its first tryout yesterday, when two pretty nudes of Mississippi, were arrested at Denham Springs, charged with wearing "knicker." They were taken before a justice of peace, entered pleas of guilty and were assessed fines of \$5 each. The justice let it be known that the law in Livingston parish is supreme and must be respected, the nudes paid their fines.

RADICALS PLAN CAMPAIGN TOUR

Chicago, Aug. 13.—National campaign tours have been arranged for William Z. Foster and Benjamin Gitlow, candidates for president and vice-president of the Workers' party. It was announced today. Foster is scheduled to make two eastern and two western trips, and Gitlow is to make a circuit of the country, starting at Paterson, N. J., Aug. 20 and ending at Chicago November 2.

The first western trip of Foster embraces Minneapolis, Duluth, St. Paul, Milwaukee and Chicago, from August 21 to August 24, after the opening of the campaign by Foster and Gitlow at Youngstown, on August 17. Foster starts for Butte for a tour of the Pacific coast, returning to Detroit for his last eastern trip October 14.

GENERAL HINES TO SUCCEED PERSHING

Washington, Aug. 13.—Secretary Weeks has announced that on retirement of General Pershing, September 13 next, Major General L. Hines, now deputy chief of staff, would be appointed chief of staff by the president.

General Hines will be succeeded as deputy chief by Brigadier General Dennis E. Dolan, now assistant chief of staff in charge of the supply section of the general staff.

USE OF HORSES INCREASING

St. Louis City, Ia., Aug. 13.—The use of the horse in many fields of work has increased noticeably since the swing toward the tractor in 1918 to 1920, according to Wayne Dinsmore, secretary of the National Horse association in an address before the National Horse Manufacturers and Leather Goods Dealers' association here yesterday.

"The farmer is realizing that the horse can be used more economically in field work than can

any other form of power," Mr. Dinsmore declared. "Merchants also are realizing that the horse is the cheapest motive power for short hauls than is the motor truck although the truck will hold its place because of its value in longer hauls," the speaker asserted.

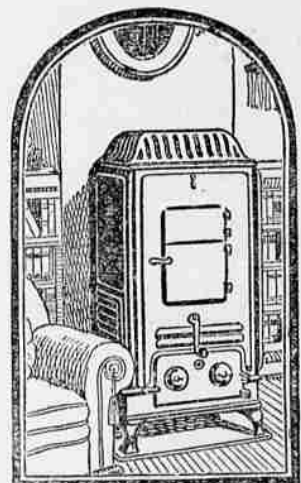
