CLEAVER SLEUTH FLEES; WARRANT FOR ARREST HELD

Portland, Aug. 28.—A statewide search for Abraham Wineberg, formerly employed as a prohibition agent by State Prohibition Commissioner Cleaver, is now being conducted by Sheriff Hurlburt and other Oregon peace officers. Wineberg, being badly wanted at Mincola, Nassau county, New York on charges of fraud in connection with law enforcement work which he did in that state. Wineberg suddenly left Mr. Cleaver's employ and the city late Friday night when he learned through some mysterious source that the New York authorities had located him here and had telegraphed a copy of the warrant for his arrest to Sheriff Hurlburt for service. Before Deputy Christopher could reach the Sovereign hotel, where Wineberg was registered, the man called an expressman, paid his trunk to some undetermined destination whether he is in hiding in the city or has fled this section of the country has not been learned. A determined effort is being made by Sheriff Hurlburt and his deputies to locate the man.

According to the information received from Mincola by Mr. Hurlburt, Wineberg was charged there, on June 11, with fraud in presenting a false claim for payment for services to a state officer. The warrant issued on June 11 was signed by Carl Sherman, attorney-general.

Wineberg, according to local advice, is a professional "confidence-puller" and private detective. He had been connected with various New York detective agencies, then branched out for himself, wormed himself into the good graces of various reform organizations and had been employed by them in investigating vice conditions and the conduct of local peace officers.

**BANDIT KILLS
HARNEY SHERIFF**

Vale, Ore., Aug. 28.—Four posse today were combing the southern part of Malheur and Harney counties in a search for Fred Yardlow, of Elko, Nev., who, according to reports received here, shot and fatally wounded Sheriff Austin Goodman, of Harney county, when the sheriff attempted to arrest him yesterday at Polly farm near the Harney-Malheur county line on a charge of passing worthless checks.

The fugitive, who is heavily armed and traveling on horseback is believed to have headed for the Owyhee breaks, which is a barren, rocky country just north of the Nevada line. Officers in charge of the hunt hope to capture Yardlow before he can reach this district where it is said he could stand off the officers for an indefinite length of time.

Sheriff Goodman died several hours after being shot. He had been sheriff of Harney county for more than ten years.

GOVERNMENT EXPENSES**

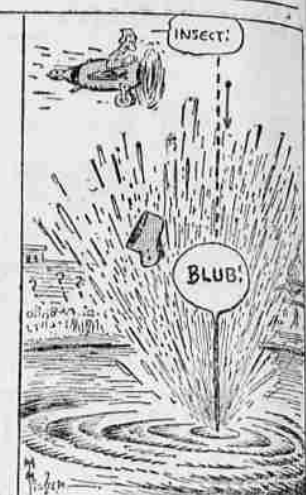

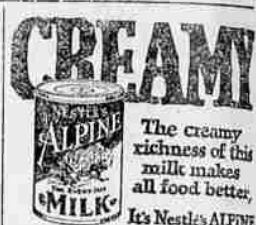
GLOBE FLIERS HALTED BY VIOLENT STORM
