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INDIAN SCHOOL
WILL OPEN FALL
TERM TUESDAY

Chenawah, Or., Aug. 29.—Preparations are being made for the opening of the Chenawah Indian school next Tuesday. School was to start the first of the month but owing to Monday being Labor day the opening will be postponed until Tuesday. Nearly all of the employees are back from their vacations and children are arriving on nearly every train.

The first week will be spent in classifying the students says Harold Wood, superintendent of the school. The new girls' building completed this summer for the smaller girls will be ready for occupation. Mr. Hall is looking forward to a large registration despite the fact that a bill was passed last year barring the children from Alaska the privilege of attending the school here after the first of January, 1925. The bill originally barred the Alaskan children after the school year but was advanced until the first of January. Fully one-third of the students attending the school are Alaskan. The students who are attending the school at present will be allowed to finish the course at Chenawah and will also be allowed to go through the high school and Willamette, the bill only barring the registration of new students.

Last year the school had an enrollment that surpassed the record of former years, the school having nearly nine hundred students. The children were all carried along on an appropriation allowed for six hundred students. The Indian school is the biggest Indian school in the United States having children registered from Alaska, California, Washington and Idaho. A few students come from Oklahoma, Montana and the Dakotas.

HONDURAS GENERAL
KILLED BY REVOLUTIONISTS

Managua, Nic., Aug. 29.—The Honduras general, Camillo Irujo, was killed after being made prisoner by the revolutionists under General Fonseca, according to advice received here. The rebels were said to have occupied the provinces of Interoeste, Lapaz, Copan, Goetepique and Gracias, northern frontier.

Government forces are reported to be pursuing the rebels, but are short of arms, as the rebel general, Gregorio Fuentes, took the government's arms which he left Tegucigalpa. President Tosta is said to be trying to obtain arms from Nicaragua.

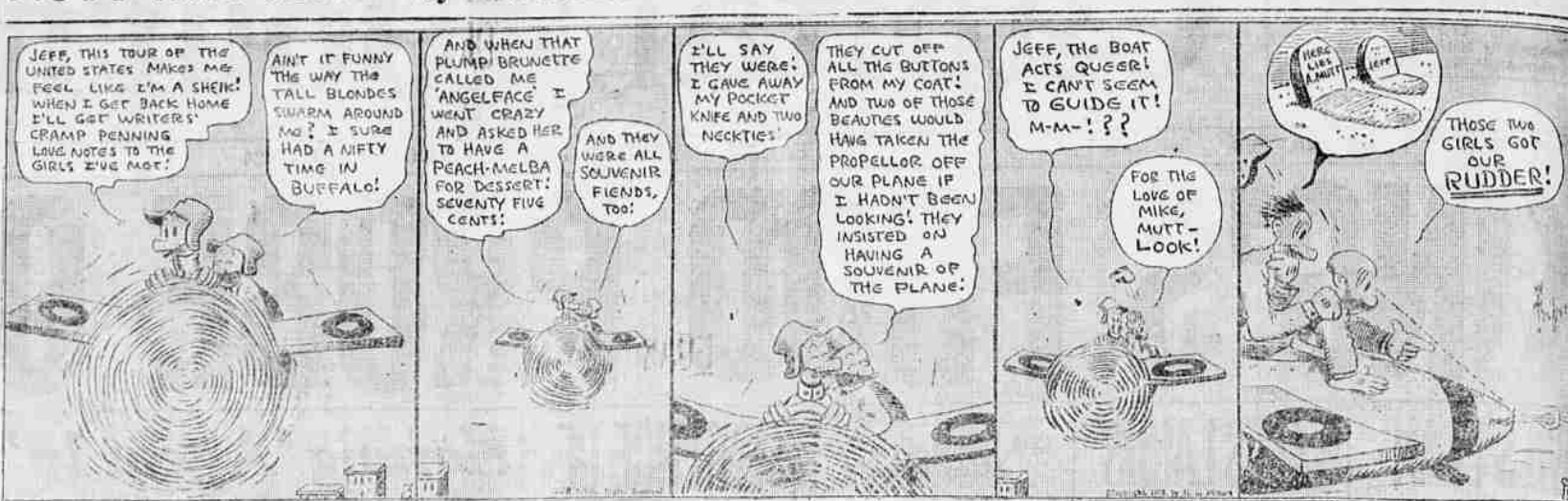

POLK BOYS AND
GIRLS WILL GET
\$150 IN PRIZES

Dallas, Or., Aug. 29.—Prizes amounting to \$150 in cash will be distributed among the Polk county boys and girls of the thoroughbred Jersey calf club on September 13 when their calves will be judged. The exhibit of Jersey calves is to take place at the W. O. Morrison place near Rickreall at 10 a. m.

There are 20 calves enrolled in the club. Six of these are yearlings and for this class \$50 has been apportioned for prizes. This will be distributed \$10 to the best calf, \$8 for second, \$6 for third, \$3 for fourth, \$2 for fifth and \$1 for sixth.

The remaining 24 calves are under one year. The remainder of the prize money, or \$120, will be awarded these. The first prize in this division will be \$14, second \$13, and so on down with a drop of \$1 after each place until the \$2 prize is reached. There will be six \$2 awards and six \$1 awards.

The prizes which are offered to encourage the members of the calf club to continue their interest in pure blood stock are furnished by the Jersey breeders' association.

A representative from the Oregon Agricultural college will be present to pick two stock judging teams from the Polk county calf club members. A team of three will be sent to the state fair at Salem, which opens right after the exhibition, and another team of three will be sent to the Pacific International Livestock show in Portland in November. Josiah Wilke, county school superintendent, is working with the Polk county Jersey breeders in staging the exhibition.

The public is invited to attend the showing and inspect the calves and stock on display.
