TRAIN HITS BUS AT HOLMES GAP FIVE INJURED

McMinnville, Or., Sept. 13.—Five passengers on the McMinnville-Salem bus were slightly injured at 3:30 o'clock Friday afternoon when a Southern Pacific electric train crashed into the bus at Holmes Gap, 16 miles south of here. The front of the bus was wrecked and the passengers thrown out by the impact.

The bus was in charge of a new driver who had been on the run two days. He stopped his car near the tracks and then started up again without seeing the approaching train, which had slowed down. Passengers in the bus called to the driver when he started his machine and he killed his motor, with the front wheels on the track. The train was traveling about 20 miles an hour when it struck the machine.

STUBBLE BLAZE BURNS DARN NEAR MONMOUTH

Monmouth, Or., Sept. 13.—While practically all of the citizens of Monmouth and the surrounding country were at the highway celebration at Helmick park Friday afternoon, a stubble fire broke out on the farm of John H. Stump, about one mile west of Monmouth, destroying a large stock barn, 30 tons of hay, about a mile of fence and burned over 500 acres of ground.

Other farm property was threatened but the fire was prevented from spreading by volunteer fire fighters who were called in from the celebration. The loss, amounting to about \$2000, was not covered by insurance.

West Salem

West Salem, Or., Sept. 13.—It may be of interest to the friends of the Thomas Burgess Ford Memorial church to know the history of the bell that was given by the conference from the disbanded Methodist church of Lafayette. The tearing down of the old historical Methodist Episcopal church that has stood for sixty years in the town of Lafayette recalls to Mrs. James Godfrey of this city an incident which connected her mother, Mrs. W. H. Catterlin, with the church history. The church was built in 1860 and the bell for the new building was carried by boat from an Atlantic seaport around South America to the Pacific coast. At the death of President Lincoln, Mrs. Catterlin and Mrs. Abigail Dunaway, another pioneer of Oregon who was teaching at the time in Lafayette, went to the church and sang the bell of the new historic building to tell the community of the sad news. The bell has been a Methodist bell for 64 years and has a fine clear ring to it.

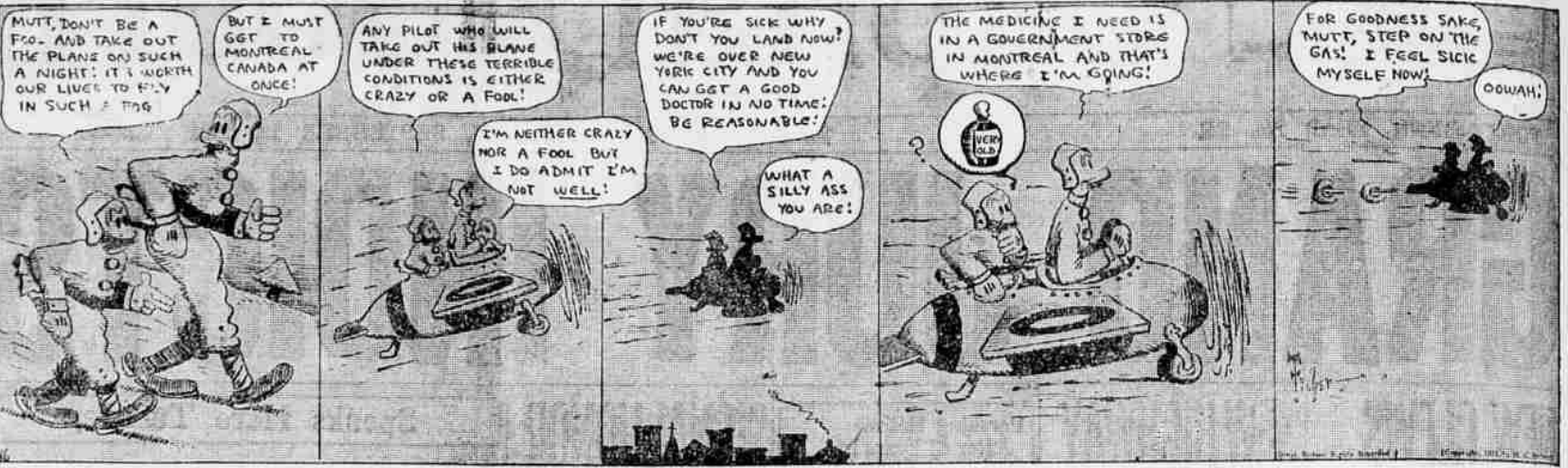

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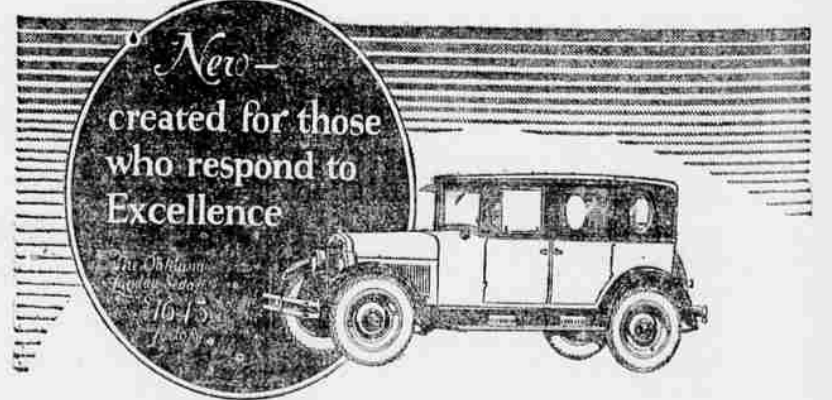
