DALLAS SCHOOLS OPEN WITH GAIN OF 20 PERCENT

Dallas, Or., Oct. 1.—The Dallas schools started Monday with a registration showing a 20 per cent increase over the opening day of 1923, according to R. R. Turner, city superintendent. The grades registered 99 more pupils than the previous year and the high school 59 more, or a total increase of 158.

The high school registration is now 192, compared with 162 last year, and the grades 531, compared with 432. With the new high school building available some of the congestion of former years is removed, but even the new building is comfortably filled.

The freshman class is the largest in the school with 66, while the juniors are second with 50. The senior class drops to 22 with six post graduates. The sophomore class has a registration of 48.

The enrollment this year shows the wisdom of providing a new high school for with the increase the classes would be swamped and no hope of relief.

Plumbing touches are being put on the new building and in a few instances equipment has not arrived for installation. But it will be finished in a short time and with little interruption of work.

Included in the new building is a gymnasium suitable for a basketball court. This will also serve for physical education work for both boys and girls and this branch of development will be given more emphasis than in the past. The floor is large enough for a full sized court and will have seating capacity for about 500. Games formerly played in the armory will be held in the school gym hereafter. Showers and dressing rooms for both boys and girls are provided in connection with the gym.

Recreation and class assembly rooms are arranged on the north and west sides of the building and are well lighted. A portion of the old La Creole academy adjacent to the new building has been incorporated with it and is used as a library and study room. The main assembly hall was not completed, owing to lack of funds at the time the contract was let.

The building is steam heated throughout.

THOMAS AND ALTA WOOD DIVORCED AT DALLAS

Dallas, Or., Oct. 1.—A decree of divorce has been granted Thomas C. Wood from Alta C. Wood by Circuit Judge H. H. Belt. The couple were married at Salem, September 18, 1919, and have no children. In his complaint Wood charged his wife with desertion on June 24, 1923, and that she had continued to desert him and refuse to live with him since that time. No other allegation was made.

Mrs. Wood, in her answer to the complaint asked for the return of her maiden name, Alta E. Johnson, and this was granted by the court. No property settlement was involved and the judge denied either the right to costs and disbursements.

Congressman Pleads Not Guilty to Charge Of Liquor Violation

Congressman John Philip ("Farmer") Hill, of Baltimore, Md., a decided "wet," is shown dispensing 2.75 per cent cider to some of the 1500 guests who recently visited him in his "back yard farm," where he raised the apples which produced the cider. The cider was dispensed to test the dry laws, but dry agents didn't disturb the party. However, as a result, Congressman Hill has been indicted by a Federal Grand Jury for possessing wine and cider, manufacturing wine and cider, and maintaining a nuisance through the manufacture of the beverages.

Baltimore, Md., Oct. 1.—Representative John Philip Hill yesterday pleaded not guilty to an indictment returned by the federal grand jury last week charging him with manufacturing and possessing wine and cider in violation of law. He was released on \$1000 bail pending trial some time after November 10.

In asking an earlier trial, counsel for Mr. Hill argued that the case was one of national importance and should be decided before election day. Denying this request, Judge Soper said:

"The very reason you give for asking an early trial is the very reason I refuse it. This court cannot be used for campaign purposes."

Mr. Hill's indictment followed closely upon a "cider party" given at his home.

The cider, he said, had an alcoholic content of 2.75 per cent. His purpose, the congressman says, is to obtain an interpretation of the phrase "non-intoxicating liquors" in section 29 of the Volstead act. He has declared that he will carry the case to the United States supreme court.

FARMING BASIS OF ALL BUSINESS SAYS MEREDITH

Chicago, Oct. 1.—(By Associated Press.)—The need of better realization on the part of the business men of the fact that agriculture is absolutely controlling in all business, was stressed by former Secretary of Agriculture E. T. Meredith in an address to members of the American Bankers' association here.

"The opportunity to go into banking, the publishing, to market groceries, to establish a drug store, all these," said Mr. Meredith, in the final analysis, have been given to us because of agriculture. The conditions in agriculture from year to year affect every one of these institutions most vitally.

"The income from agriculture and consequently its support of business is regular, not hit and miss or spotted throughout the year, and not largely all in one season of the year, as many business men seem to believe. When one single source of farm income takes a slump, the calamity howlers make so much of it that some are led to over-estimate its effect upon general business, as was the case with wheat. One would think that the farmer received his entire income from wheat and yet 1923 production figures show that the farmer received less for his wheat than he did for his corn, hay, cotton, or vegetables, as well as from several sources of animal product income."

PIERCE TO SPEAK AT DALLAS

FARMER-LABOR LEAGUE FORMED

Eugene, Oct. 1.—A state farmer-labor legislative league was formed here last night at a meeting of representatives of the Oregon State Federation of Labor, the state farmers' union, and the farmers' union.

The league will immediately begin a campaign favoring the compulsory workmen's compensation bill, the oleomargarine bill and opposing the repeal of the state income tax.

George Palmer, master of the state grange, was selected as chairman of the new league, and R. M. Ryerson, editor of the Oregon Labor Press, was chosen secretary.

One of the leaders in the organization of the group was Governor Walter M. Pierce.

The league will be permanent, according to plans. Pamphlets will be distributed, and speakers sent throughout the state.

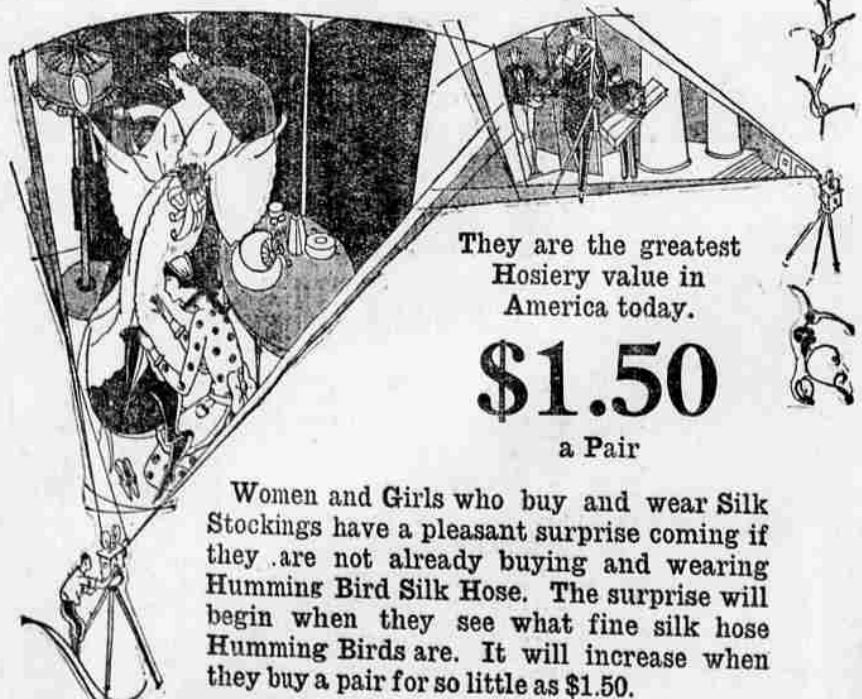
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
