

CONSERVATIVES WILL REIMPOSE M'KENNA DUTIES

London, Oct. 21.—(By Associated Press)—The conservative party, if it is returned to power in the general election next week, will re-impose the McKenna duties if trades union leaders ask for such action. Sir William Joseph Hicks, conservative, declared in a campaign speech last night.

"We shall re-impose the McKenna duties," he said, "in order to give some fairness between our people and the Belgian and German nations."

He added, however, that the protective duties would not be re-imposed until trades union leaders ask for such a step to protect them against underpaid continental labor.

The election campaigning is warming up considerably everywhere. The conservatives are making the most of the Anglo-Irish pact and Campbell controversy issues, the labor leaders are holding out promises of better things to come if they are returned with a majority, while the liberals are advocating, among other things, state control of minerals with the operation to be carried on by private enterprise.

The conservatives have a new ally in Sir Auckland Geddes, former British ambassador at Washington, who made an address at Blackburn, a Lancashire cotton town, today. This was the first active part Sir Auckland has taken in public affairs since his retirement from the Washington post.

ART COLLECTION TO BE GIVEN AS MEMORIAL

New York, Oct. 21.—The Widener art collection valued at \$5,000,000 considered one of the largest collections in the United States will come today become the property of the American public, Joseph E. Widener of Philadelphia, financier and art collector declared yesterday. The collection will be a memorial to his father, who founded it more than forty years ago, he said.

Mr. Widener's assertion was made in the course of his testimony in an action brought by Prince Felix Youssouff of Russia, who seeks to repurchase from the financier two Rembrandt, which Mr. Widener bought from him in 1921 for 100,000 pounds sterling. Prince Youssouff contends the sale was made only on condition that he be permitted to repurchase the paintings within a stipulated time. Mr. Widener, however, maintains the stipulations have not been lived up to.

"Nothing to it! Do I look that foolish?" is the way he responded to a query as to his alleged confession.

Moore, with his wife, was indicted here by a Lane county grand jury for the alleged theft of an automobile. He was brought here yesterday in custody of Svarverud.

According to the Denver police, Moore confessed to them that he killed a man near Portland some 18 months ago.

Other than a denial of the alleged confession, he had little to say.

ALBERT LANDER, CIVIL WAR VETERAN DEAD

Albert Lander, a veteran of the Civil war and resident of Marion county for the past 36 years, died Sunday at the home nine miles north of Salem on the river road at the age of 81 years. He was a private in company D, 17th regu-
