

OREGON PRIMED FOR CLASH WITH COUGAR ELEVEN

University of Oregon, Eugene, Nov. 13.—(Special.)—When Oregon meets Washington State college on Multnomah field in Portland, Saturday, the Cougars will face a fighting eleven still smarting from its defeat by Idaho. Following a brilliant victory over the University of Washington Oregon lost to the Gem State at Moscow, and does not propose to suffer a second defeat next Saturday.

In Washington State, Oregon meets a team which has suffered three conference setbacks. Exendine is a good coach despite the poor results. He knows football and has a team of big fast men. The Cougar-Oregon game is likely, therefore, to bring out a lot of hidden qualities in both teams. The game in Portland will be the only big-league squabble in the northwest as the Oregon Aztecs are idle Saturday and the University of Washington will have a good workout against the College of Puget Sound, a non-conference team. Idaho is idle and Montana travels to Palo Alto for a game with the Cardinals.

Big plans are being made for the student invasion of Portland. A special train is being chartered to leave Eugene, Friday afternoon. It will arrive in Portland in time for a monster serpentine and a rally at the Multnomah club, followed by a dance.

The ticket sale is being handled through sporting stores in Portland, the Multnomah club and in Eugene by the graduate manager's office and a local cigar store.

The Oregon routers will serpentine through the Portland streets prior to the game and will put on some special stunts between halves. The band and glee club will also accompany the routers.

TESTIMONY CLOSED IN NAVAL LEASE SUIT

Los Angeles, Cal., Nov. 12.—Testimony was closed here today in the government suit to cancel the \$100,000,000 Elk Hills naval reserve oil contracts and leases with the Pan-American Petroleum & Transport company on charges of conspiracy to defraud. Arguments in the case will start tomorrow morning.

Printed briefs will be filed by attorneys for the government and defense in addition to oral arguments. It was announced when the government rested and the federal judge overruled motions by the defense that certain testimony be stricken from the records. Owen J. Roberts, government prosecutor, will open the arguments at 9:30 o'clock tomorrow. Alton Pomereoy, a former senator, will also present government arguments, while the defense will be argued by Frank J. Hogan, Frederic R. Kellogg and Walter K. Taiter.

CONTESTS TO DEVELOP AND AID MUSICIANS

San Francisco, Cal., Nov. 13.—A series of three contests to develop young singers, pianists and violinists has been arranged by the National Federation of Music Clubs, preliminary to the biennial convention of the federation in Portland, Or., in June, 1925. It was announced here today by the California Federation of Music Clubs. The contests are open to both sexes.

The first trial will be a state contest next April. A district contest will follow this, and the national contest will be a feature of the Portland convention. Each winner will be given a prize of \$500 or a scholarship for one year, including all expenses in a music school of national repute.

GOULD ESTATE AFFAIRS PROBED

New York, Nov. 13.—The late Andrew Carnegie influenced the Goulds to become interested in the Wabash, Pittsburgh Terminal company. In opposition to the Pennsylvania railroad, to which he was bitterly opposed, it was testified today by Edwin Gould at the referee's hearing of the \$82,000,000 accounting involving the estate of the late Jay Gould.

In addition to the Carnegie-Pennsylvania railroad industrial feud, the historic railroad fight between E. H. Harriman and George Gould in the early part of the present century also entered into today's testimony. Edwin Gould testified that at the time of the fight 80 per cent of the Gould lines were single tracked, unballasted and subject to great damage in times of storm and flood.

Reverting to personal affairs of the Gould family, the witness declared that the trustees of the estate had given their consent to the second marriage of Anna Gould, now the Duchess DeTallyrand, in accordance with the terms of Jay Gould's will.

NEW PLANET FOUND MOVING NEAR EARTH

Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 13.—Preliminary calculations just completed under the direction of Professor A. O. Besscher of the astronomical department of the University of California and his assistants reveal that the fast moving object discovered October 23 last by Professor Baade at Bergedorf, Germany, is a minor planet moving in a highly eccentric ellipse at a high inclination to the ecliptic, close to the earth and near its perihelion, said an announcement by Professor Besscher Wednesday.

The calculations, the announcement said, were attended by great difficulties, due to the discovery of errors in earlier observations.
