

### LABOR FIRM FOR EXCLUSION OF JAPANESE

El Paso, Texas, Nov. 21.—(By Associated Press.)—The American Federation of Labor expressed today its opposition to any attempt to alter the Japanese exclusion clause of the immigration law. The resolutions were offered by R. W. Robinson of the California Federation of Labor.

"We are unalterably opposed to exclusion by treaty in the place of exclusion by law," the resolution said. It was approved without debate.

The convention reaffirmed its approval of proposals to convene congress immediately after the election and to abolish the short session for "lame ducks."

The convention unanimously approved a report of the committee on legislation pledging support of the proposed constitutional amendment of Senator Norris of Nebraska under which newly elected senators and representatives would take their seats in January following the November elections, instead of in December of the next year.

The Norris amendment already has been approved by the senate and is before the house in the form of a resolution by Representative White of Kansas.

Reclassification of federal employees along the lines proposed in the bill of Senator Stanfield of Oregon, now on the senate calendar, was approved.

### WALL STREET BOOM CONTINUES

New York, Nov. 20.—Excited trading continued in today's stock market with speculative interest shifting to the oil and eastern railroad shares, which were in brisk demand throughout the session. Total sales crossed the two million share mark for the eighth time since election day with more than 50 stocks attaining new peak prices for the year.

The swiftly rising tide of stock prices which was temporarily checked yesterday by an enormous volume of profit-taking, gained momentum today when a tremendous demand developed for the low priced southern and western railroad shares, a dozen of which attained new peak prices for the year on gains ranging from fractions to nearly five points.

Germans Use Motorcycles Berlin.—While the automobile in Germany falls very far short of the per capita of population number registered in the United States, the motorcycle is popular and increasing numerically rapidly. The total doubled between 1921 and 1923. There are now more than 50,000 such machines of 2 1/2 horse power, and 100,000 equipped with lower powered engines.
