

STANFORD RATED EQUALLY AS GOOD AS CALIFORNIA

Berkeley, Cal., Nov. 21.—Six years the California football team has won the annual duel with its nearest rival, Stanford. But in the battle here tomorrow, which incidentally will decide the coast championship, Stanford, for the first time in recent years, is given an even chance by most critics of the game. Betting is reported without odds.

Stanford and California began their annual competition in 1922. Since then California has won eleven times, Stanford seven and four games were tied. This accounts only for the games of American football.

The coaches were conservative in their late minute statement.

Glen Warner of Stanford said: "I believe the Stanford boys have not yet shown their full strength. Andy Smith of California commented truthfully: 'We're going in there to fight.'"

SCRUB BRUSH AS FAT ELIMINATOR, LATEST

Vienna, Nov. 21.—The scrub brush has been introduced in Vienna in a new role—that of flesh reducer. The idea was brought here by a South American doctor and he has made a considerable rub in overweight circles.

Joseph E. Widener, millionaire financier, sportsman and art collector, of Philadelphia, sued in New York by Prince Felix Youssouf, of Russia, for the recovery of two Rembrandt paintings valued at \$1,000,000, which the Prince claims he pawned to Mr. Widener for \$520,000, but which Mr. Widener claims he bought out right, jeered Youssouf from the witness stand, calling him the "joke of Europe," and adding that "any man who paints his face and blackens his eyes is a joke."

Prince Youssouf, he declared, was exiled from Russia for murdering the mysterious monk, Rasputin, who held mystical sway over the late Czar and Czarina.
