

12 HOME GAMES OF BASKETBALL FOR WILLAMETTE

A formidable basketball schedule for Willamette university that will bring to Salem during the coming season teams from the University of Oregon, University of Washington, University of Idaho, Washington State college, Oregon Agricultural college, the University of Southern California, is announced in a letter from Coach Guy L. Rathbun, who is in Portland attending the annual meeting of the north-west conference. Twelve home games are on the schedule for the coming season.

Home games with the University of Oregon, Whitman college, are on the football schedule of the 1925 season also announced today.

The basketball schedule promises the best season ever held on the local floor. Practically every team of prominence in the north-west conference will be brought to Salem and the spotlight of intense interest is now turned upon the material at work building the nearest varsity quintet.

The home schedule of basketball games follows: Jan. 24, University of Oregon; Jan. 28, Whitman; Jan. 29, University of Washington; Feb. 10, Idaho; Feb. 12, Washington State college; Feb. 14, Gonzaga; Feb. 19, College of Puget Sound; Feb. 23, Oregon Aggies; Feb. 26, Pacific; March 2, University of Southern California. In addition the College of the Pacific of Stockton, Cal., and Linfield college and possibly Montana will appear here at dates to be arranged later.

The football schedule for the local institution for 1925 follows: Sept. 26, University of Washington at Seattle; Oct. 3, Oregon Agricultural college at Corvallis; Oct. 10, University of Southern California at Los Angeles; Oct. 17, open; Oct. 24, College of Puget Sound at Tacoma; Oct. 31, Whitman at Salem; Nov. 7, University of Oregon at Salem; Nov. 13, open; Nov. 20, Pacific at Salem; Thanksgiving, College of Pacific at Stockton, California. The games with the University of Southern California and the College of Pacific are tentative.

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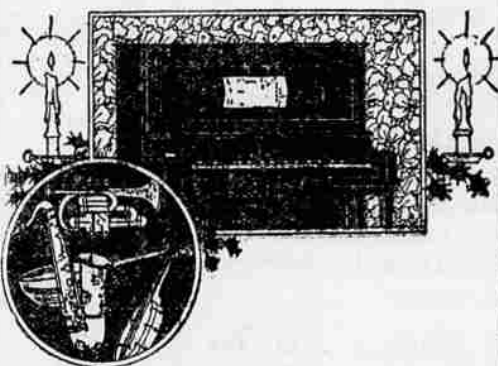
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
