KIMBALL PLANS NIGHT SCHOOL FOR TEACHERS

The faculty of Kimball School of Theology is arranging for an evening training school for teachers and those preparing to be teachers in the Sunday schools of Salem. Any person of senior high school age or older, regardless of denominational preferences, has been invited to enroll in the school.

The class sessions are to be held in the Kimball building Monday and Wednesday evenings beginning January 13 and closing February 25. Four classes will be held each evening. From 7:15 to 8:05 p. m. Dr. E. S. Hammond will offer a course in the study of the intermediate boy and girl. At the same hour Dr. D. W. Riddle will teach a course covering the Old Testament. At 8:10 Prof. W. H. Horvitz will lead a class in the principles of teaching, and at the same hour a general course on the New Testament will be taught by Dr. J. D. McCormick. All of these subjects will be presented with the view of practical helpfulness.

STUDENTS GET MONEY HERE BUT SEND WORK AWAY

Once more the award of the contract for printing the Willamette annual publication at Eugene, has created a small furor in business circles here. Last year after a similar contract had been given to a Eugene firm, pressure brought to bear from local men caused the contract to be rescinded and the work done here.

It is charged that this year the Willamette students secured bids from Salem and Oregon City shops, and after being armed with these figures secured a bid approximately \$250 lower than the best Salem bid.

The business men's league is prepared to take no positive action in the matter this year, however, it being decided after a conference for the league itself to remain neutral but to issue a bulletin to all of its members setting out the facts and permitting each local advertiser to use his own judgment as to whether or not to place advertising with the publication.

COURT DENIES MINTO OUSTER

Chief of Police Frank Minto is securely seated in his chair of office, according to an order issued yesterday by Circuit Judge Kelly in the proceedings to oust Minto brought by W. W. Birtchett, former chief of police, the last of the line to be elected by the people.

In the order the court declares that Minto lawfully holds the office of chief of police against all comers. The order recites that the plaintiff expressed his intention of not desiring to oust Minto further after the overruling of a demurrer to the defendant's answer and the time having passed for further pleading Birtchett's case is dismissed. Birtchett contended his right to the office on the ground that he was elected for two years and when only half of his term was up Minto was appointed by virtue of a charter amendment making the office appointive, rather than elective.

KAPLAN CHAMP FEATHERWEIGHT

New York, Jan. 3.—(By Associated Press)—The world's feather weight boxing crown rests on the head of Louis "Kid" Kaplan, Meriden, Conn., "Dooznow," today as a result of his decisive victory over Danny Kramer, Philadelphia pugilist, in a title match here last night. Kramer was battered into submission by the whirling Kaplan.

The end, in the form of a fluttering towel from Kramer's corner came after one minute and eleven seconds of fighting in the sixth round, giving the Meriden Dash a technical knockout.

The battle was one of the most spectacular title matches ever seen. Both had everything to gain and nothing to lose and with this in mind, defensive tactics were forgotten.

His face streaked with blood from a broken nose and two badly lacerated eyes, the lips cut and his body pummeled by the storm of punishment, Kramer weathered the storm only by sheer nerve.

Kaplan fought an aggressive, merciless fight, wearing down his opponent by the
