SHEVLIN TURNS DOWN PURCHASE

Minneapolis, Minn., Jan. 2.—Headquarters here of the Shevlin-Hixon Lumber company stated in reply to an inquiry that an option on the Shaw-Bertram lumber plant at Klamath Falls, Oregon, had not been exercised. The option expired today.

Klamath Falls, Ore., Jan. 2.—Announcement by The Associated Press from Minneapolis today to the effect that the Shevlin-Hixon Lumber interests failed to exercise their option on the Shaw-Bertram lumber plant here, leaves in doubt the exact location of their projected operations in Klamath Falls.

During the past few days engineers have been surveying a 20 acre site on Lake Ewauna, and local belief prevails that this is to be used for their local mill and plant. Confirmation of the purchase or contemplated purchase of this property, however, cannot be procured here.

POSTAL BILL IS NOW SATISFACTORY

Washington, Jan. 2.—The postal rate increase bill, as revised by the senate postoffice committee is satisfactory to President Coolidge, Chairman Moses of the sub-committee that redrafted the measure announced today after a conference with the president.

The bill presented yesterday to the senate represents a sharp revision of the rates proposed by the postoffice department, particularly on second class mail.

The position of Mr. Coolidge as represented by Senator Moses, is that so long as the measure provides in scientific manner for raising funds necessary to meet the proposed postal employees' pay increase the desired end will be accomplished.

LEGAL PROBLEMS OF DRY ENFORCEMENT SOLVED BY DECISION

dressed only to the legislature, and there being no law of the state authorizing unconstitutional searches, the officers, at most, were trespassers, and the remedy is against them." Here the court says:

"But the constitution is addressed to not only the legislature, but to every officer of the state, including the judiciary." The opinion of the United States supreme court in the case of Weeks vs. United States is as follows:

"The fourth amendment was intended to secure the citizen in person and property against unlawful invasion of the sanctity of his home by officers of the law acting under the legislature or judicial sanction. This protection is equally extended to the action of the government, and officers of the law acting under it. The sanction such proceedings would be to affirm by judicial decision a manifest neglect if not an open defiance of the prohibitions of the constitution."

Concerning the reasonableness of searches without warrants, the opinion reads:

"It is said that a search with a warrant may be unreasonable, and a search without a warrant may be reasonable and lawful, if reasonable. The first proposition is a legal impossibility. An officer with a warrant issued which follows its commands cannot make an unreasonable search. It is reasonable because it is lawful. He may exceed his authority and the search be unreasonable, but in that case he is no longer with a warrant."

"Nor is the second proposition any sounder. If he makes a search without a warrant, however polite, gentle, or considerate he may be, the search is unreasonable, because it is unlawful."

The opinion held in regard to the substitution of seized liquor for evidence, that the liquor itself need not be exhibited if the information of the witnesses establishes the fact that the evidence was seized, saying:

"The whiskey bottle and contents are what is termed 'real' evidence. It was not at all essential, in any case, to put it in evidence. The information of the witnesses, obtained from the bottle of liquor, was just as effective."

In deciding the McDaniel case the court was split four to three, Justice Coshov writing the dissenting minority opinion, which is based on the assertion that the constitutional prohibitions are directed to the legislature and not to individual officers, and that "no law is assailed in this appeal."

"There is no claim that the search and seizure complained of were made by virtue of any unconstitutional statute or law of the state," reads the minority opinion. "There is no claim by the state that the officers were authorized by any order of any kind in conflict with said section 9 of article 1 of our state constitution. If the officers exceeded their authority, they were subject to civil and criminal liability. If the search was unlawful, they were guilty of assault and battery. . . . If the search and seizure were unlawful, it was the duty of the district attorney to have caused the arrest of the offending officers, and prosecuted them for their grave offenses. The violation of said section 1 is a very serious offense and is so recognized by all authorities. Its enforcement is not secured by ignoring violations thereof, or by refusing to enforce the law against offenders of other statutes."

Another point of conflict of the minority opinion concerns the legality of the search and the necessity of officers having a person under lawful arrest before they may search him. Here the minority opinion says:

"... It must be conceded that the search, seizure and arrest were all parts of the same act. . . . The arrest should always be made first and the search and seizure made afterward, but incidental thereto. The search and seizure were not less incidental to the arrest, because the officers did not inform the defendant that he was under arrest until after he was searched, but directly in the same connection and at the same time."

SELF-EXILED SENATORS TO RETURN HOME

The hotel became the focal point of the town. The party organized a fourth of July celebration which dwarfed anything previously in the town. They provided the orchestra, composed half of the parade and outdoors every one in fireworks. The local storekeepers adapted their stocks to the senators' tastes, the moving picture shows, dances and sporting events swelled their audiences with visitors from Rhode Island.

And yet, the hotel was almost a community in itself. Twice death visited it and once a marriage was performed when a daughter of one of the senators transferred her ceremony to Rutland so that her father might attend. Thanksgiving a gigantic dinner was served the senatorial family; a Christmas tree bore gifts for all; and on New Year's eve the four story building waked lights from every window until the clock in the village church nearby boomed its announcement of the new year.

Several Reheated

Meanwhile, in Rhode Island, the affair in which the senators had been leaders went on without them. Elections were waged at long range. Thirteen of the twenty-two, several had not run again, were returned to office in the republican landslide, which swept the town. Now with the stamp of approval placed on their course by the voters, they enter Tuesday upon a new legislative year.

have taken advantage of the privilege and are given one tablet every week. More than 20,000 tablets have been distributed and a recent order has placed for an additional 25,000 which, it is estimated will furnish the necessary supply for the remainder of the school year.

Extensive psychology tests throughout the grades have made possible readjustment of courses and the selection of pupils needing special training in "Opportunity Classes." One of these classes has been established at Grant and another will be put in a school in the southern part of the city in the near future.

Compulsory physical education for boys, the re-establishment of the cafeteria which now serves a balanced lunch for twenty cents, additions in equipment to several of the departments, are changes at the senior high school during the year.

An increase in attendance of 276 and an increase of nine teachers to the faculty staff over last year are shown by the reports made at the beginning of the Christmas vacation.

Purchase of a 5-acre tract adjoining the school property of the Parrish junior high at a cost of \$7,000 has provided the school system with a site for the erection of a new building in the future which will be centrally located and will otherwise offer unusual advantages for expansion by grouping the buildings around the Parrish school.
