(Continued from Page One) ceived from Ireland in connection with the machinery and when the floor plan is definitely known the directors will select the definite site for the plant and determine just how much of a building is needed for the first unit. The first building will be a factory building according to present plans. Operations will all be by electric power.

Location Ideal The new site is considered an ideal location for an industrial proposition of this kind. It backs onto the Southern Pacific railroad tracks with plenty of room for any spur that are needed and a large number of switch tracks handy already installed. In addition it faces on the Pacific Highway which will give it direct connection with all freight truck lines operating between here and Portland.

The factory is also ideally located, it is thought, so far as the labor market is concerned. There will be no intention of attempting to use anything like the full eight acre one-half acre of property at first, the large tract being purchased for purposes of expansion. As that end of the city is growing rapidly, and property is constantly increasing in value, purchase of the large tract is considered an economical move as in a few years land in the north end will be materially enhanced in value according to all real estate prophets and considerable difficulty might be had in securing additional land when expansion was desired.

HOLD GOVERNOR EXCEEDS POWERS WITH REPRIEVES

Decision of Circuit Judge Skipworth of Lane county that the governor has not authority to grant reprieves, save only in capital cases, if upheld by the supreme court would invalidate a number of actions taken by the present executive in Marion county.

The most outstanding case under the present administration would be that of Knute Anderson, who was convicted on February 21 of this year of the manufacture of liquor and possession of a still and sentence to serve three months in jail and pay a \$500 fine. He was relieved on May 19, his reprieve was not further record in connection with his case, indicating that the time for his reprieve to expire is past due and he has served no more of his sentence. Under Judge Skipworth's decision on the governor's more lenient him a reprieve is without legal authority.
