

PETITIONS FOR PAVING THREE STREETS FILED

Petitions were received by the city council last night for the paving of three streets. These were 17th street, from Chemeketa to Center; Erixon, from Capitol to McCoy avenue; and South street, from High to Church; Mar- ton, from 23rd to 24th; Ferry, from 15th to 19th.

A resolution approving plans and specifications for the following streets: Fairmount avenue; Cross street, from High to Church; Mar- ton, from 23rd to 24th; Ferry, from 15th to 19th.

A resolution approving plans and specifications for the covering of the mill race on Division street from Front to High was referred to the street committee to report at the next meeting.

City Engineer Rogers reported that a remonstrance against the improvement of Ferry from 15th to 19th was not sufficient to defeat the improvement.

The engineer filed plans for the improvement of E street. A recommendation of the street committee favoring the improvement of Howard street, from Church to High, and instructing the engineer to prepare plans and specifications was adopted.

The street committee reported unfavorably on a claim of V. C. McDonald for damage done to his trucks by manholes and the report was adopted.

City Attorney Smith reported that he had filed suit to quiet title to lots 2 and 3 in block 10.

The city's share of the cost for paving Mission street between Commercial and Saginaw was reported to be \$125.00 and the city recorder was instructed to bond for the amount.

The city recorder was instructed to purchase a one-ton Ford truck with dump body for the use of the street department.

L. R. Hawse was given an extension of time for the removal of an old building on lot 6, block 16.

Shapely Ankles Return With Smart Kid Boots



NO more will milady be seen on the winter street in slippers cut down to the sole, and cobweb hose! Her ankles, if she is truly smart, are now to be encased for the winter and spring in high topped kid shoes, for this is the flair which has apparently intoxicated the leading shoe designers of Paris.

After an absence of five years, trim snugly fitting high shoes that look so much like silky spats and accentuate the shapely ankle are once more making their appearance in the Paris shops and on the boulevards. This would seem to confirm the American vogue for kid footwear by leading it to new heights. The model shown above

seems particularly popular with the better dressed set. The tops are of silky gray kid and the vamp and heel of black patent kid leather. The new French lacing goes up the inside, giving the ankle a trim shapeliness and support, correcting the tendency toward awkward ankles caused by the continual wearing of low shoes. The same style was seen and admired on the boulevards in a combination of tan and black kid and in all tan, worn with a black costume. Some demand is already felt in New York, but only in the more exclusive shops. The vogue seems to be starting as bobbed hair did—among the "four hundred," and its rapid spread is predicted.

It is expected that a community house will be constructed early this year which will contribute much to the proper entertainment of the tourists who visit our city and which will also afford an excellent place for the display of the agricultural and other resources of Salem and the Willamette valley. In addition to the construction of a community house it is also hoped that the income from the camp ground during the next two years will be sufficient to permit of repayment of the amount which the camp ground owes to the general fund of the city.

"Another subject which I specially commend to you for your consideration is that of the creation of a city planning commission, the object of which will be to develop plans for the regulation of the future growth, development and beautification of our city and to establish zones or districts regulating the construction and use of building within such zones. This is a matter which is of vital interest to every citizen, and in my opinion is imperatively necessary to the proper growth and development of Salem.

Urrea Through Street— "Another important matter is that of extending North Seventeenth street to the state fair grounds, and if possible also establish direct connection with the Silverton road. North Seventeenth street is the only street in the eastern section of the city which, if opened, would extend entirely through from the state fair grounds to the Turner road. If North Seventeenth street were opened it would divert much of the traffic which now congests Capitol street during state fair week. This subject is worthy of your careful consideration.

"I wish again to call attention to the need for the renumbering of the houses in our city. Much confusion is caused, not only to strangers but to our own citizens as well, on account of the haphazard numbering of houses. Much inconvenience also results to the postoffice department and numerous complaints have been made by the city carriers. This, too, should be carefully studied and a plan devised for correcting our present defective numbering system.

City Water Needed— "There is nothing so essential to the growth and development of a city as its water supply and water distributing system. We could render no greater service to Salem than the accomplishment of this one object. I believe that Salem should have a municipally owned water system with an adequate supply of pure mountain water, and while appreciating thoroughly the magnitude of such an undertaking, I feel that we should exert every possible effort for the accomplishment of this most worthy enterprise.

"I cannot refrain from again commenting upon the market increase in the efficiency of our police department since the change was made in the charter vesting in the mayor and council the authority to appoint the marshal. During the past year entire harmony has prevailed in the police department, with the result that the highest degree of efficiency has at all times been maintained. The amendment of the charter at the

last election increasing the fine and imprisonment limit has also had a very salutary effect upon would-be violators of the law, and I am pleased to say that in my five years of service as a member of this body, the moral tone of this city has never been so strong as it is today.

Fire Department Efficient— "The efficiency of our fire department has been further increased by the addition of a first class aerial ladder equipment which, with the triple combination pumper, previously purchased, brings this department to a maximum of efficiency. The needs of this department should be given constant study to the end that the lives and property of our citizens may be assured of the great possible protection.

"The street improvement department has just closed the most active year of its existence. Seventy-eight blocks of hard surface pavement were constructed during the past year at a total cost of \$186,807.10, bringing the total number of miles of pavement within the city limits to approximately forty miles. This is a record of which we may well be proud. There are already petitions filed which call for a total of 42 blocks of pavement to be laid during the present year, and the indications are that the present year will be another record year for this department. This is the most important department of our city and should be maintained to the highest degree of efficiency.

"The street department is charged with the duty of maintaining and cleaning the streets of our city. The acquisition of the new street flusher by this department was an important event in its history. Upon the arrival of the new flusher the obsolete and inefficient street sweeping equipment was discarded and a modern and sanitary method of cleaning our streets was substituted in its place. We now have the equipment for keeping our streets clean and sanitary which will, I am sure, be appreciated by all of our citizens. I also wish again to emphasize the statement which I

THOMPSON AND VANDEVORT OUT

Prior to the meeting of the city council under the new administration last night the old council met to wind up its business, which was the formal retirement of Ralph Thompson and H. H. Vandevort as members of the council and acceptance of the resignation of Alderman A. F. Marcus. Both Thompson and Vandevort spoke briefly. Both have served six years.

Thompson thanked the mayor, the other members of the body, and the city officers for the treatment accorded him while he has been a member of the council, and declared that one of the things he had learned was that "if you want co-operation you have to cooperate."

"I have had a lot of fun with you and you have had a lot of fun with me," said Vandevort. "I have had a pretty good time here and I will miss you boys. I have had a square deal from the mayor and the councilmen, and also from the press. The newspaper boys have been fair to me. I have never misquoted me, 'ut have told what I said. Sometimes I have said things I shouldn't have said, but I always have been quoted correctly."

Mayor Giesey responded warmly to the farewell speeches of the two members.

Thompson moved that the old council adjourn sine die, and Vandevort seconded the motion. The vote was called and they left, yielding their seats to the successors. Eugene B. Grabenhorst, Thompson's successor, took his seat at once, but Carl O. Engstrom, Vandevort's successor, was not present.

As soon as the new council met, Paul V. Johnson was elected to succeed Alderman Marcus. Alderman Van Patten later resigned, effective at the end of the meeting, but his successor has not yet been named. It probably will be Damon Fleener.

DRY WEATHER IS PREDICTED

London—The year 1925 will be the driest the universe has experienced this century, an official of the British meteorological department told the Associated Press in explaining a new discovery which departmental experts have made and which, it is declared, enables them to pick out the wet and dry years to come.

This statement was made after much study on the part of weather scientists and as the result of the discovery that a close connection exists between rainfall, particularly in Great Britain, and the frequency of solar prominences. The latter are explained to be the tongues of flaming gas that dart out from the sun's surface, sometimes to a height of 250,000 miles and at a speed of more than 150 miles an hour.

Experts have spent three years studying the relation of this phenomenon with the fall of rain and have learned that the interval between the dates when these giant firestorms are most active has grown progressively shorter and shorter during the last half century, while the periodicity of wet years in England has shown a corresponding change. The mathematical curves indicate a relationship that is too definite to be overlooked, say the department chiefs.

It has been clearly demonstrated that this enterprise can be conducted by the city and made self-supporting. A considerable amount of movement work has been done during the past year, thus making the grounds more attractive and serviceable for the campers.

Chicago, Ill.—Hope expressed by many radio fans that the United States weather bureau would be able to forecast reception conditions as it does the weather, has been given new impetus by indications from bureau officials that such predictions may be practicable. These officials point out, however, that the weather bureau has not made any official investigations due to the fact that it has no funds available to provide the facilities and the personnel.

The weather bureau has received many requests and suggestions from radio enthusiasts urging that it undertake to forecast static conditions.
