# News from Nearby Valley Points

## NEW OFFICIALS SWORN IN AT SILVERTON

Silverton, Or., Jan. 8.—New city officials took their oath of office at the first meeting of the city council this year. G. L. Barr is now the mayor of Silverton, Lawrence Larson and E. Banks, who were both re-elected councilmen, also took their oath of office. Carl Moser, who had also been elected councilman, was present to tender his resignation. Mr. Moser stated that as he had received the appointment to state adjutant of the American Legion prior to his election as councilman he had asked that his name be removed as a candidate and was surprised when he was notified that he had been elected. As yet no one has been chosen to fill the vacancy left by Mr. Moser's resignation.

Captain Archie Thomas also resigned his position as chief of police of Silverton. W. W. Gaines, who has at one time served on the police force at Salem, was sworn in as chief of police at Silverton. The city engineer submitted a rough draft for plans for a city hall at Silverton not to exceed \$20,000. The plan was handed to a committee which will later report to the council.

The fire department reported that departmental expenses during the recent cold spell came to \$155. It is understood that these expenses occurred because the department does not have a proper place to house equipment. Chemicals were frozen.

The council also accepted the pool hall bonds and issued the license.

## CITY OFFICERS ARE INSTALLED

Dallas, Or., Jan. 8.—The new city officers were elected Monday night at the regular meeting of the council, which proved for the most part an uneventful session. Only two members of the old council retired from the body, Mayor Muir and Councilman Krasan, while four councilmen were re-installed and four held over terms.

Leif S. Finseth became the new councilman in place of Mr. Krasan, and Conrad Statrin succeeds Mayor Muir.

Mr. Statrin, in a brief message, outlined the policies of the new administration stressing the need for conservative financing in meeting the obligations assumed in recent improvements. He pointed out that county road tax money received by the city should be used in improving the entrance thoroughfares which are now in bad condition. He recommended that a small fee be placed on the use of the city auto camp, with the money utilized in the upkeep of the park.

The chief item of business disposed of was the decision that the old Grand theater building, next door to the library on Court street had become city property due to failure of the owner, H. L. Penton, to remove it after due notice. Disposition of the building was left to a committee.

Marshall C. P. Chase was re-elected to that position for the 12th consecutive time without opposition. He was also designated as chief of police, inasmuch as a day policeman and street commissioner, H. Osborn, was put on. W. G. Varnell was re-elected city treasurer, and City Attorney Bayter instructed to draw up a contract covering his services for another year.

## MAIL TRAIN ROBBED

Cedar Rapids, Iowa, Jan. 8.—Mail train No. 5 on the Northwestern was robbed in the Chicago yards Tuesday night. It was learned here today. The extent of the robbery was not made public.

## DIRECTORS FOR CLUB ARE NAMED

Dallas, Jan. 8.—The 1925 board of directors of the Dallas Commercial club were elected Wednesday night at the annual meeting and election of the club. The new board will meet January 21 to select the executive officers of the club and also to elect two more members to the board to replace those who declined to serve following their election.

The board as elected includes C. B. Sundberg, Oscar Hayter, L. D. Brown, F. J. Craven, Tracy Staats, C. S. Keller, W. G. Vassall, H. G. Black and William Harcombe. J. R. Craven asked to be allowed to withdraw following his election, as one member of his firm was already on the board. W. V. Fuller also withdrew his name.

Selection was made from a group of 24 men who received the highest nomination vote in a ballot mailed to the membership of the club.

In the business session of the club L. D. Brown reported on the work of a committee selected to see Charles K. Spaulding, relative to the milling of the La Creole timber. A letter from Mr. Spaulding was read in which he stated that no immediate activity is contemplated in the La Creole timber. The only new activity to be started this year is the building of a spur to a small body of timber south of Black Rock and this will be connected with the Southern Pacific at Black Rock. No effort will be made to reach the La Creole basin from that point, the letter stated. He also stated that when the La Creole timber is logged it is entirely possible that a part of it will be milled in Dallas.
