

MULKEY TO HEAD ASSOCIATION OF SCHOOL CHIEFS

Charles E. Mulkey, superintendent of schools in Coos county, was elected president of the state organization of superintendents which closed its session here Tuesday. Miss Pearl Miller of Lake county was elected secretary-treasurer.

Among endorsements contained in resolutions of the superintendents was one in favor of the Churchill plan of teacher training. This looks ultimately to the establishment of one normal school in southern Oregon and one in eastern Oregon in addition to the present school at Monmouth. In the meantime the plan calls for the establishment of teacher training centers at such places as may be determined by the state department of education. Legislation to put this into effect will be sought from the legislature that meets next Monday.

It was recommended that the legislature enumerate by law the different items to be included in determining the per capita cost of high school education in a district and include among these items transportation, interest on bonds, and depreciation of buildings and equipment.

The endorsement favoring the Churchill plan of teacher training was unanimous. The resolution adopted follows:

"Whereas, it is evident that the supply of trained teachers in Oregon is insufficient to meet the present demand; and

"Whereas, the present facilities for training teachers in Oregon are inadequate to meet this demand; therefore be it

"Resolved, That the county school superintendents of Oregon in convention assembled favor ample provision for the development of the present normal school at Monmouth, Or., to its capacity, which capacity is to be determined by the opportunities for practice teaching that the locality may offer; be it further

"Resolved, That we favor the establishment of one normal school in southern Oregon and one normal school in eastern Oregon; be it further

"Resolved, That we favor the establishment of teachers' training centers in such number and in such places as may be determined by the state department of education, said teachers' training centers shall be under the control of the state department of education; be it further

"Resolved, That such teachers' training centers shall automatically cease to exist, whenever, in the judgment of the state department of education, said normal school or normal schools shall be able to furnish an adequate supply of teachers for the elementary schools of Oregon."

ESPEE ORDERS 16 NEW POWER LOCOMOTIVES

Portland, Or., Jan. 8.—Sixteen new type locomotives will be built by the American Locomotive Works for the Southern Pacific railway for use on mountain grades, according to announcement by E. L. King, superintendent of the system's Oregon lines, today. These will be the most powerful of non-articulating or single type engines, known as the "4-10-2" type, the feature of which is a third cylinder placed inside the main frames above and between the two outside cylinders. They will be 101 feet in length, weigh 687,400 pounds, and a maximum power on the drivers of 55,000 pounds.

AARON SAPIRO DEMANDS FORD PAPER RETRACT

Chicago, Jan. 5.—A formal demand for retraction of certain statements alleged to have been made in Henry Ford's publication, the Dearborn Independent, has been made by Aaron Sapiro, counsel for several farmers' co-operative organizations, preliminary to a projected libel suit for \$1,000,000 against Mr. Ford.

If retraction is not made within thirty days, the suit will be filed in Detroit, Mr. Sapiro said. In the notice of intention to bring suit, the attorney named E. G. Leibold, vice-president and treasurer of the Dearborn Publication Company, W. J. Cameron, editor, and the Ford Motor company.

Mr. Sapiro alleged that his name was linked in a series of articles with those of Julius Rosenwald, Otto Kahn, Bundard Baruch, Albert D. Lasker and E. Myer Jr., in charging him with participation in an alleged Jewish conspiracy to control American agriculture "or to organize the farmers of America in the interests of communism."

Mr. Ford was accused by Mr. Sapiro of approving "an attempt to destroy my participation in the co-operative marketing movement."

The attorney has been counsel for numerous co-operative organizations, notably in California. He was for a time counsel for the American Farm Bureau federation and is attorney for co-operative associations led by Walter Pater, formerly of Texas, William Gettle of Indiana and Frank O. Lowden, former governor of Illinois.

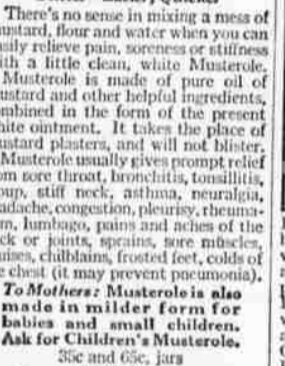

YOUTH INHERITS FORTUNE; KEEPS JOB AS DECKHAND

Wilmington, Del., Jan. 8.—Inheritance of a fortune of \$157,000 makes no difference in the life of William Tracey, a young deckhand on a Wilson line steamer plying between this city and Philadelphia. Having received a letter yesterday containing a check to his order for \$117,000 and information that the remainder of his inheritance would be sent later, he deposited the check in a local bank and reported for duty last night as usual.

The letter, from a firm of attorneys in Los Angeles, notified Tracey that his father, James J. Tracey, 97 years old, a California fruit grower, had died and left him an estate valued at \$157,000. The young man is the only survivor of the fruit grower, once having been killed in France during the war. He also was a member of the American expeditionary forces.

Tracey is unmarried and said today that he planned to continue working as a deckhand as long as he could hold his job. The position, he said, pays him \$120 a month, and he is contented and satisfied.

HAMMOND MILL REOPENED

Mill City, Jan. 8.—The large saw mill of the Hammond Lumber company is again operating at full force here, following a ten day shut down caused by the extreme cold weather. During the enforced idleness, the machinery was overhauled and numerous improvements made, among them being the enclosing of the sawdust bins and remodeling of the sawdust conveyor. The shingle mill is also operating again, but the logging camps have not as yet started operations. A railway gang is busy at Camp 17 at Larson getting the tracks in shape, and it is thought that the camp will start work next Monday. Camp 23 at Mill City will probably not start until some time in February.

St. Joseph, Mich., Jan. 8.—Charles E. Ruthenberg, communist leader, who Monday was sentenced by Circuit Judge Charles E. White to pay a fine of \$5000 and serve from 2 to 10 years in the state penitentiary at Jackson, was on his way to prison today. He was in custody of Sheriff Fred C. Franz and was escorted from the county jail before being informed of the state supreme court's action in denying his request for bail, pending his contemplated appeal to the United States supreme court.

INDIAN LIQUOR PUT UNDER VOLSTEAD BAN

Tucson, Ariz., Jan. 8.—Twin, which is Papago wine with a recoil, comes within the far reaching provisions of the Volstead act. It was declared by a jury in federal court here today. The jury found three Papago Indians guilty of manufacture of twin, otherwise an intoxicating beverage.

The Papagos and officials followed the court proceedings closely because of the threatened arrest of the Indians last summer when their right to mix and drink twin was questioned.

The decision quashes one of the oldest traditions of the Papagos for it was always with twin that they toasted the rain god at tribal rites when moisture was needed for crops.
