

EGG VALUES RISE TWO TO THREE CENTS ON ALL SIZES

EGGS HIGHER POULTRY FIRM BITTER STEADY

Portland, Jan. 8.—Egg values are soaring in the local market. Quotations on the dairy exchange this morning are two to three cents higher throughout the lot. Extras are posted at 64 cents, firsts 52 cents, pullets 49 cents and current receipts 47 cents.

Most of the length at this time is due to the limited receipts. The lay has fallen off considerably in the past 30 days and the heavy accumulation during the cold weather are now out of the way.

Local buyers were active bidders for supplies during the past 24 hours while sellers were few and after a premium in most cases.

The market has reached an extreme level where the outlet will be narrow unless other centers continue to advance.

The poultry market is steady; fancy dressed turkeys are cleaning up at a 33 cent top; there is a good call for heavy light calves; receipts are moderate, prices unchanged.

Country dressed meat receipts along the coast were about equal to the demand; choice light calves holding at 15 1/2 cents top; choice light hogs 14 1/2.

The wool market is steady around the 40 cent level on good grades. Business has been moderate during the past few days with no big sales reported. Growers are still bullish and indifferent to current levels.

Butter is steady and unchanged. There is no surplus here. Extras 65 cents, standards 43 cents and prime firsts 41 cents. Light calves changed at 49 cents delivered Portland.

STOCK SALES IN NEW CANNERY MAKE PROGRESS

All the stock that is to be sold in the proposed new Pacific Fruit Canning & Packing company of West Salem will be sold by February 1 and the company will be ready to start operations in preparing for the coming season shortly after that, according to predictions made by W. F. Drager, president of the company.

"Sales are progressing very satisfactorily following the freezing weather," stated Drager. "While first it was thought the freeze might have done unincalculated damage, we find plenty of fruit in the plant."

"This cannery will mean a big boost for West Salem and should have the hearty support of all growers in the valley of the river."

"This is to be a growers concern and every effort will be put forth by the promoters to place the fruit industry on a paying basis. Unless we can grow a fair profit we had better quit growing it and go into something else."

"It is my opinion if growers will cooperate and ask for a fair price they will get it. There are many fruits produced in this section different from those produced elsewhere and the buyer has to come here to get it. There is no fair price if he only works for it."

PRUNES NEED HEAVY PRUNING TO SIZE CROP

From now until the harvest season it depends upon the grower as to whether or not he will have a crop of large size in prunes, or whether the crop will be made up of small sizes from which he will receive little or no profit, according to Earl Peary, who has been through the orchards considerably the past two weeks on a prune buying expedition for the Robert G. Pearys.

"Prunes buds are not as plentiful on the trees as they should be," states Peary. "The buds are not fat or healthy. The conditions are very similar to those of the season of 1919-1920 when an extremely dry summer was followed by a severe winter. The conditions then gave a fair crop in very small sizes. Growers, as far as I can determine, are doing very little pruning so far. They should prune hard in order to obtain sizes next year."

"Pruning an Advantage"

"The orchard is a semi-arid country in the summer time and fruit growers are just beginning to learn and very seldom is there sufficient moisture in the summer time to grow a good crop of prunes in the larger sizes. There is no money in the smaller sizes and it is doubtful if there ever will be. It is up to the grower to prune severely, plow early and cultivate intensively in the spring if he wants large sizes. Anyone can get large sizes with a light crop, but only the good grower gets good sizes from a normal crop."

"In the early days of prune growing on new soil it was easier to get large sizes than now. The most advanced growers have come to the conclusion that it is necessary to use cover crops every year in the past. The cover crop is a sponge in the soil the early part of the season and retains the moisture of winter which otherwise would evaporate under the early hot days and which helps leaf formation and gives a healthy green color to the foliage."

Increase the Size

"A well planned program on the part of the grower from this date on should increase sizes in the orchards from 19 to 20 points, which increases means a profit for the grower on his year's operation."

"The orchard went into the winter for short of the usual fall hold the winter moisture for a sponge of tree roots later in the spring."

Peary states that there are still quite a few prunes scattered around among growers, many more than he first thought when he started on his buying expedition.

He also stated, following a trip into the Canby and Forest Grove sections, that the Yamhill local growers, the northwest exchange received 2,500,000 pounds of prunes of which it has about a million pounds left. The local manager at Forest Grove reports the prunes on hand are of first quality and grow generally in that district are negotiating the exchange. There is some talk there of doubling the capacity of the packing plant at that point. Peary says that at Forest Grove the local manager in charge of the packing probably has a larger percentage of the growers of the community signed up than any other local under the exchange. At Forest Grove all of the prunes are packed for the change. In doing, the plant there having fine equipment and Hinde an expert carter man. BULLETIN ISSUED ON PLUM AND PRUNE CULTURE

"Plum and Prune Growing in the Pacific States" is the title of Farmers Bulletin 1372 published by the United States department of agriculture and recently put out. In its various forms the plum is more widely distributed throughout the country than any other fruit, but the value of the plum crop in the United States is exceeded by the apple, the peach, the orange and the grape. The great diversity of plum trees, however, is mainly incidental to the great diversity of species. But of the commercial industry, practically two-thirds of the plum and prune trees of the country are in the Pacific coast states of California, Oregon, Washington and Idaho says this bulletin. It is by C. F. Kinosh, entomologist of the bureau of plant industry of the department and is of sixty pages.
