OLD SILVERTON LANDMARK TORN DOWN THIS WEEK

Silverton, Jan. 9.—Silverton is losing another old landmark in the blacksmith shop on the corner of First and Oak streets which has been torn down during the past week. This is the third old building to go down at Silverton during the past few months. The first was the old Hubbs Planting mill, part of which was built in 1839; the second was the Emerson school building, built in 1852. The question of when the old blacksmith shop was built seems to be unsettled at Silverton. Over its ruins during the past few days many disputes have been held as to whether it was built in the "sixties" or the "seventies." Among the old settlers at Silverton there are some who remember it was in the "sixties" and others who are equally sure it was not until 1879. At all events it seems that it was some years ago since "Doc" Davis first used it for his livery. It has been since used for other things, best remembered of which was the time it served as "Daddy" Steelhammer's blacksmith shop. A. G. Steelhammer was for years the proprietor of Longfellow's "Village Blacksmith" to Silverton school children.

During more recent years, since Mr. Steelhammer's retirement, the old building has housed the Hubbs blacksmith shop. It is now giving way to the new L. E. Inman building, which will be under way in a short time.

Silverton Legion Wins

The basketball team sponsored by the Delbert Reeves Post of the American Legion defeated Oregon national guard team from Woodburn on the Silverton floor Wednesday night. The score was 14 to 52 in Silverton's favor. Hugh Latham, former Oregon star center, was high point man on the Silverton team with 15 points to his credit. At the end of the first half the score stood 10 to 33 for Silverton. A preliminary game between the Lightening Pys, a high school second team, and the Legion second team resulted in a 1 to 24 victory for the Legion team.

Trinity church held its annual luncheon and business meeting at the church Wednesday of this week. The meeting began at 10 o'clock and lasted until shortly after three. The ladies aid society served lunch at noon.

Two new members were elected to the board of trustees, the two outgoing members being O. T. Bratstad and Helge Rue. Those newly elected were John Fuhr and Dan Dybesetter. Otto Legner was chosen as secretary and Nick Langroy as assistant. It is understood that plans are to be considered for the re-laying out of the Evan's Valley cemetery as the plots are not laid out after any form. This matter will be taken up at a meeting of the board of trustees. Uehers and other needed officials will also be appointed by the board.

The financial committee reported a very successful year, \$1381.35 having been taken in during 1924 and little over \$600 remaining in the treasury. Of this \$290 went to educational work; \$335.20 to home mission; \$292.16 to foreign mission; and \$144.28 to charity, making a total of \$1062.65 being used for benevolence fund during 1924.

DALLAS WOMAN STRUCK BY AUTO

Dallas, Or., Jan. 9.—Mrs. William Collins was struck by an automobile shortly after six o'clock Wednesday night while crossing Main street near the Dallas National bank. She was severely shocked and may have received injuries to her spine but no bones were broken.

Simon Grindheim, driver of the car which struck Mrs. Collins was driving south on Main street and she was walking west on Court street, crossing the intersection. Apparently neither saw the other until the impact. A headlight of the car struck Mrs. Collins and she fell toward the car, lodging between the fender and the hood and grasping the motorist on the car. The car went 15 or 20 feet before it could be stopped. Mr. Grindheim ran out and took hold of Mrs. Collins as she fainted.

No blame is placed upon Mr. Grindheim for the accident as apparently neither he nor Mrs. Collins were aware of the other was in the street. He has the reputation of being a careful driver and his speed was moderate at the time. Mrs. Collins was taken to the office of Drs. Hollman and Straute and X-rayed, but as no bones were broken she was taken home. She spent a very restless night but this was attributed to the nervous shock. Her spine and hip have been causing her considerable pain.

JUDGE RAMSEY TO OPEN COURT IN POLK MONDAY

Dallas, Jan. 9.—Judge William Ramsey of McMinnville will hold his first term of court as judge of the 12th judicial district commencing Monday, January 12. Judge Ramsey will be in Dallas the remainder of this week preparing for the court term and handling other duties of his office.

The court docket promises to be a light one, except for civil cases. There are only three hold over criminal cases and probably two of these, state vs. Frank B. Ford and state vs. E. M. Benz, will not come to trial. They are indicted on larceny charges involving grain. J. McKeon, aged Monmouth man, is scheduled to be tried on a statutory charge. It is possible he will be examined as to his sanity before the case comes to court.

The grand jury will convene Monday but unless last minute cases appear it promises little of a startling nature, according to District Attorney Helgeson. There are three cases involving delinquency of minors to be heard by the grand jury, and one charge of violation of the prohibition law. In the delinquency cases it is reported that the principals in one case have left the state. Of the others, one is out on bail and one is in jail.

Fourteen civil cases are on the tentative docket prepared by County Clerk Black, but it is probable that these are not all ready for trial.

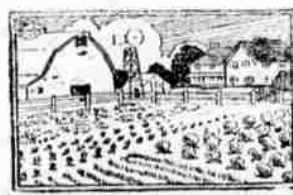
A new grand jury will be selected when court convenes Monday.

The record was made by Operator Durkes of the Estevan station.



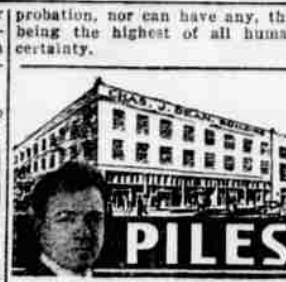
