Chemawa, Or., Jan. 9.—The Chemawa Indians defeated the representatives of the Oregon deaf school in a hotly contested basketball game Wednesday evening on the mutes floor. The score at the end of the half stood 11 to 10 in favor of the mutes but the Indians forged ahead in the last few minutes of play and won the game by a score of 21 to 19. The mutes guarded closely and the Indians were forced to make many long shots. The passing of both teams was exceptionally good. Willie Rickett was the star of the game for the losers while Matt and Brendible played stellar ball for the Indians. The deaf school five broke through the ranks of the redskins time and again, spoiling many of their shots. The Indians won over the mutes in the first game of the season by a score of 32 to 24 after a hard fought game. The mutes leading most of the game but in the final stanza the Chemawa boys opened up and made many pretty baskets. The Indians are to meet the Washington high school of Portland tomorrow night on the Portland floor.

A boys' club room, with a kitchen adjoining, will facilitate the holding of meetings at which boys' clubs want to serve "feeds." There will be shower rooms and drying rooms near the swimming pool, and a boiler room, with fuel room adjoining, at the front of the basement.

Another kitchen will be built on the second floor. The remainder of the floor will be given over to class rooms, a ladies' room, the county secretary's office and a number of dormitory rooms. Entrance to the upper balcony of the gymnasium will be from the second floor. The balcony will surround the gymnasium room on three sides.
