## CHURCH REPORTS FOR YEAR GOOD

The Court street Christian church held the annual dinner and meeting Monday evening. The meeting was held in the old auditorium while those present were still seated about the tables.

## RADIO TESTS TO BE MADE DURING ECLIPSE OF SUN

Washington, Jan. 10.—Radio as a means of communication between entombed miners and surface rescue parties has proved impracticable, the interior department announced today in describing bureau of mines experiments extending over several years.

High power equipment necessary for communication over distances of 1000 to 2000 feet through strata the bureau said, would be too bulky, heavy and complicated and at the same time too fragile and delicate, for practical requirements.

It was stated, however, that there is some promise in the application of "wired wireless" or line radio, which consists of transmission along metallic conductors, such as water pipes, compressed air pipes, power and lighting circuits and mine car tracks.
