Senator and Mrs. Gus C. Moser have taken an apartment in the Court apartments for the duration of the coming legislative session. They will arrive tomorrow.

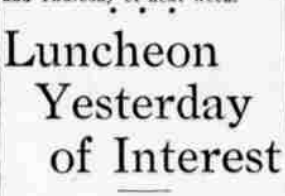
