RADIO USED TO JAIL SUSPECTED POLICE SLAYER

Omaha, Neb., Jan. 13.—Omaha police are leading Norman Taylor, several times an Omaha burglar suspect, in connection with the slaying Saturday of a policeman at Marietta, Ohio, pending a radio query from station WOAW.

Taylor was taken from a local hospital last night, where he sought treatment from a gunshot wound in the left arm. Suspecting he might have been wounded in some affray with police, local officials broadcast his description. The description was heard by Chief of Police Putnam of Marietta, who immediately called Omaha police by long distance shortly after midnight.

According to Night Captain Troby, Putnam said Taylor fitted the description of one of the robbers who was shot in the arm as he ran from the scene of the fatal shooting.

Taylor's wife and his brother, Ed, were also taken into custody. Taylor insists he was accidentally shot by his wife while driving from St. Paul, which he said is his home, to Mankato, Minn. He said she was firing at a fence post when she accidentally shot him. He said, according to police, that he received first aid treatment at Mankato and proceeded to Omaha by rail. Dr. John H. Thomson, attending physician, said the nature of Taylor's wound shows he had received first aid treatment at some well equipped hospital.

According to Omaha police records, Taylor has served in seven penitentiaries since 1905 on burglary charges.

COOPERATION IN CHARITY WORK

At a meeting of the Associated Charities, held last night in the rooms of the Salem Chamber of Commerce, decisions were made to work for closer cooperation between the various charitable organizations of Salem. A list is to be prepared of all those being helped, with the idea of preventing any overlapping of work.

Judges Hunt and McMahon and Rev. Martin Feroshetian were appointed to explain plans of the Associated Charities at a meeting to be held in the near future. Exact date of the meeting will be announced by Mrs. Carson, president of the organization, and the general public will be invited to be present.

Reports given last night indicated that during December, 1924, and the first 10 days of January, 1925, help was given to 433 individuals, comprising 109 families. Among the things distributed were 1426 articles of clothing and 13 loads of wood.

PLAN REVISION OF CALENDAR

Calendar revision has just been advocated in resolutions adopted by the American Association for Advancement of Science. The league of nations has had a committee working on this subject for several years. Business and scientific men in a number of different cities of America have recently formed organizations for bringing about definite action by the government. It is claimed that fifty million dollars a year will be saved in America alone by simplification of the calendar.

J. M. Clifford of Salem will give a free lecture on this timely subject Wednesday evening January 14 at 8:15 o'clock in the auditorium of the Women's club house, North Cottage street, near Chemeketa. Mr. Clifford has been a student of this subject for more than 15 years. He was the first to publish in this country the plan

which is most actively advocated abroad. The calendar vitally affects everyone and as the government will soon be called upon to take definite action toward its revision all public spirited persons should be interested in this lecture. Mr. Clifford will fully discuss the two proposed systems and will summarize the matter in a clear and interesting way. A general discussion will follow the lecture. SHANGHAI AGAIN IN WU'S CONTROL

Shanghai, Jan. 13.—(By Associated Press)—Control of Shanghai the gateway port of China, over which the Peking government of Wu Pei Fu, since deposed, started an aggressive war some months ago, passed back to the adherents of General Wu today when more than 7000 vanquished troops of General Chang Yuan-Min, rival leader, were disarmed and admitted to interment in the French and international settlements.

General Chang represented the new Peking government named under the direction of Chang Tso-Lin, the Manchurian leader, after he swept down with his armies from Mukden and overthrew the government of which General Wu was the military head. The new successful offensive against Shanghai was led by General Chi-Hsieh-yuan, tuchun of Kiangsu province.

The 7000 defeated troops interned today present a new difficult problem for the foreign authorities whose settlements are crowded. The foreign authorities propose to arrange with the responsible Chinese officials here to transport the interned soldiers from Shanghai.

SILVER TROPHY FOR CUNNINGHAM

Silverton, Ore., Jan. 13.—(Special)—W. L. Cunningham, owner of the Cozy, was presented with a silver football trophy by the Silverton high school football squad of '24, in appreciation of his service to the high school football team. W. Long, in his presentation speech, stated that Mr. Cunningham had "been guilty of attending all the games played by the team, and had for years served in the capacity of referee without a cent in remuneration."

In thanking for the trophy, Mr. Cunningham said that football was his ideal sport, and that his services and efforts would always be directed toward the school. Mr. Cunningham is chairman of the Silverton school board at present. The trophy is a regulation size silver football, mounted on an ebony pedestal and is now on display in the window of the Cozy.

Governor Pierce has, on recommendation of the state parole board, granted a conditional pardon to Victor B. Reed, who was sent up from Tillamook county to serve two years for assault with a dangerous weapon.

Reed was 20 years old and his wife 16. In a quarrel it was charged that he spanked her with the flat side of a carving knife. She recently appeared before the parole board and asserted that the spanking was the result of a "kid quarrel" and that had it not been for their landlady she would not have prosecuted her husband. Since Reed's incarceration a child has been born.

The governor also commuted from 20 to 8 years the sentence of George Miles, also of Tillamook county, who was convicted of forging a \$10 check.
