## BORAH URGES FARM RELIEF

Washington, Jan. 13.—Declaring the problem of agricultural relief is the same as it was before the election, Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, told the senate Monday there should be early action even if it entails an extra session of congress.

"It is true that there have been betterments in some localities," Senator Borah said, "but these are due to transient causes which may disappear as suddenly as they have appeared. The great fundamental question of the restoration of agriculture to a basis with the other industries of the United States has not been solved."

In 1923 the farmers' tax bill was \$624,000,000, he said, where as now it is \$1,700,000,000 annually. He added that "no system or program will restore the American farmer to his place of prosperity so long as this unconscionable exploitation continues in the name of government."

## LABOR BOARD'S RIGHTS UPHELD SECOND TIME

Chicago, Jan. 13.—(By Associated Press.)—Federal Judge Wilkeson Monday for the second time upheld the right of the United States railroad labor board to compel witnesses to appear and testify before it. Counsel for J. Maguire, the defendant, local chairman of engineers on the Chicago & North-western railway, representative of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, indicated they would appeal.

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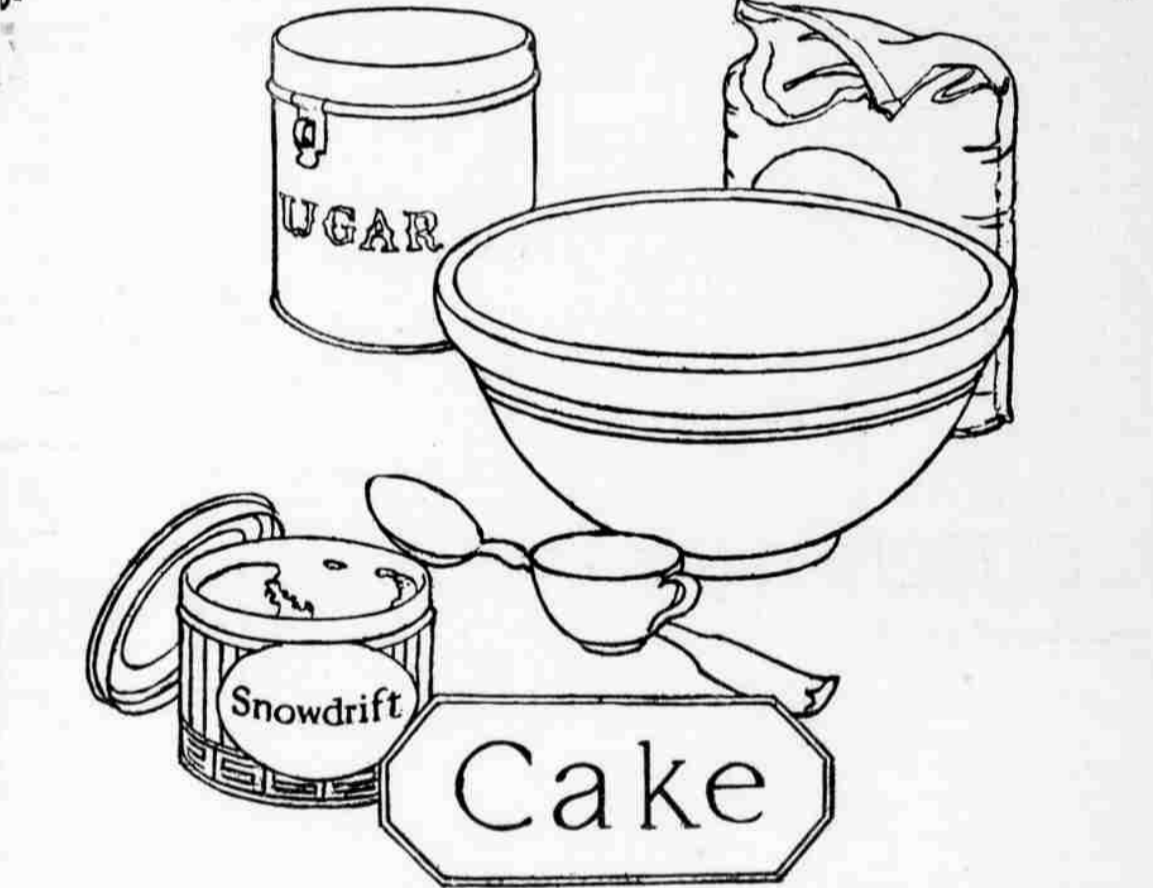
