

SCHOOL BOARD TO COOPERATE IN DEMONSTRATION

The Salem school board definitely committed itself to cooperate in the Commonwealth health demonstration program, by unanimous vote taken at a meeting of the school board last night. A committee was appointed to secure the necessary rooms for the staff of workers, and to do everything else that may be of any assistance in the program.

Dr. Walter H. Brown, now in California, will arrive in Salem next week, it has been announced. He will bring with him a staff of workers, who will begin at once on the county health survey, which is expected to occupy upwards of a month's time. Two hundred thousand dollars will be spent in Marion county during the next five years in carrying out the health program.

Dr. Brown has recently completed a five year program at Mansfield, Ohio. Mansfield was the first place in the United States to secure the program—Salem is the fifth.

As the plan was presented before the school board last night, the child health committee will furnish one nurse for every thousand children, with as many more as necessary in case of an epidemic. Investigations will be given whenever and wherever needed. Medical attention will be given free upon request in all cases where parents are unable to secure proper medical attention for their children.

The expert nurses and doctors furnished by the health committee will bring their own equipment, and will be given the use of four office buildings at some convenient locality in the city. The school board committee which took the matter of rooms under advisement has not definitely decided where the rooms will be located.

Action was taken providing for a second opportunity room to be added to the public school system. The room will be located at the Lincoln school, and pupils now attending the Lincoln, Richmond and Yew Park schools will attend. The new class will begin in about two weeks. A teacher specially prepared for the work was elected to take charge of the room.

Action was taken adding one semester of mathematics to the present high school curriculum, making a full four years course. The action takes effect next semester.

Various items of minor repairs and new equipment were acted upon.

WORLD COURT BEFORE SENATE

Washington, Jan. 14.—American adherence to the world court, first proposed to congress two years ago, was up today for consideration by the senate foreign relations committee. Proponents were pressing for an early report to the senate, where one proposal already is on the calendar.

Besides this proposal, offered by Senator Pepper, republican, Pennsylvania, for the creation of a new court independent of the league of nations, two others have been advanced, one by Senator Swanson of Virginia, ranking democrat on the committee, and the other by Senator Willis, republican, Ohio.

Both of these proposals contain the reservations suggested by Secretary Hughes and approved by both President Harding and President Coolidge.

HEAVIEST SNOW IN YEARS, CRATER LAKE

Medford, Or., Jan. 14.—According to telephonic advices from Crater Lake today there will be no scarcity of storage water in southern Oregon this year. The snow at the lake rim now measures 135 inches, at Anna Spring camp, 102 inches, and the Cascade divide is covered with the heaviest snow blanket in many years. For two days snow has been falling steadily at Crater Lake and is still falling today.

Estes Park, Colo., Jan. 14.—Three searching parties, set out at dawn today to scale Long peak, one of them to hunt for the body of Herbert Sortland, employe of

All hope of finding Sortland, a member of the original rescue party that went in search of Miss Vallie, alive, was surrendered last

night when searching parties put in at timber line for the night. They reported that a human being could not live for 24 hours in the sub-zero weather while a strong gale swept clouds of snow and sleet across the jagged peaks, which, silhouetted against a leaden, winter sky, stood out like white-capped sentinels.
