It is the Republic of Georgia, able leaders, drafted from the ranks of the disaffected in the Soviet regime, are making of this new State a potent factor in government. Mamien Orakhelashvili is President of Georgia. M. Stalin, one of the ablest of Russia's leaders, has joined in the formation of the new government. Sirgo Ordshekenidze is commander of the Georgian army.

Henry E. Smith is named as executor of the will of his sister, Mrs. Lucinda B. Miller.

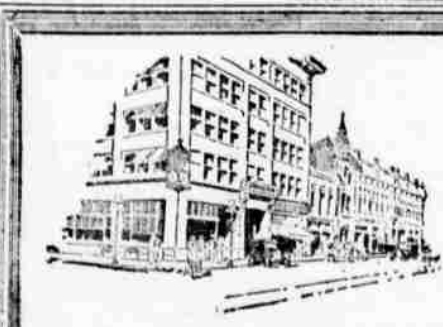
