

PIERCE PARDON ROILS DOUGLAS COURT OFFICIALS

Rosburg, Or., Jan. 17.—Officials of the Douglas county circuit court are greatly aroused over the pardoning by Governor Pierce of Eli Wainovich, alias Big Mike Zealock, leader of the robber gang which on June 16, 1919, held up the rock quarry crew at the Scottsburg rock quarry and took \$1300 from an Austrian laborer who was carrying his savings of years on his person.

Wainovich received a life sentence on a charge of assault and robbery, armed with a dangerous weapon and served less than five years.

The fact that he had received his liberty and that he had been pardoned was entirely unknown to the court officials until the list of pardons referred to the legislature by Governor Pierce was called to their attention.

"It is a farce—nothing but a farce—having such a dangerous man released from confinement after the seriousness of his crime has been so well established," Circuit Judge Hamilton, who sentenced Wainovich, declared.

"The governor did not ask the court for any recommendation or statement of the facts, and we were not even informed of the leniency extended. At the time the life sentence was imposed a recommendation was given that this man should be shown no clemency and that would still be the recommendation of the court."

TWO ADDED TO BOXING BOARD
