"Jamestown" Is Sponsored By A.A.U.W.

Because one of their national and local aims is the sponsoring of a better class of films in moving picture theaters, the Salem branch of the American Association of University Women has been untiring in its efforts to secure better films for local showing.

The second step has also been achieved. "Jamestown," the second of the chronicles of America, produced by the Yale university press will be shown at the Liberty on Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week. This is said to be a picture as full of dramatic intensity, romantic honesty, pictorial beauty, and historical accuracy, as was "Columbus," the first of the series.

The university women do not cease their efforts in the booking of these feature films. They also exercise censorship of the films which are shown with the chronicles. Only those films are shown in the same performance which are approved and have the approbation of the national picture league. This league is not strictly a censoring board but is a board of moral psychologists who weigh the moral effect of every motion picture and of every situation in every picture.

Club Women Interested In League

Through the work of Miss Hester Hollingshead, regional secretary, who is spending a number of days in the city, Salem women are becoming interested in the formation of a branch of the National League of Women Voters.

This organization, formed five years with the granting of national suffrage to women, has as its primary object the political education of the millions of newly enfranchised women. It is strictly non-partisan, it is not a woman's party, and in its constitution names four great aims—education and citizenship, efficiency in government, needed legislation, and international cooperation to prevent war.

In 1920 Carrie Chapman Catt, Julia Lathrop and other leaders whose names are by words in homes from one end of the country to the other, first became intensely interested in the necessity of educating the large new body of voters to vote intelligently as well as conscientiously. It was through their efforts that the league was formed and since that time the organization has had a phenomenal growth in all parts of the country. Miss Belle Sherwin of Washington, D. C., is president at this time.

Portland and Corvallis are the only places in this part of the state where permanent branches of the league have been formed. Miss Hollingshead is at present interested in the organization of branches in Salem and Eugene.
