## HEAVY SNOWS DELAY LUMBER CAMP OPENING

Mill City, Or., Jan. 22.—The opening of the logging camps of the Hammond Lumber company near Detroit, which was scheduled to have taken place this week, had to be postponed for a few days longer on account of the deep snow at the camps, more than 2 feet being reported at the works. It is intended to open the camps as quickly as conditions will permit.

A party consisting of Fred Waltsburg of Gates, road supervisor; Jim Adams of the Sautman Garage and other business men of the vicinity left for Albany, Wednesday morning to take up with the county officers the matter of purchasing for the district extending between Lyons and Gates, necessary road equipment which will make it possible for them to keep the roads in passable condition. They are figuring on a grader, scarifier, tractor and other equipment. The roads between these points are now in a miserable condition no attention having been given to them this winter. They are now in good condition for working, and with the aid of the new proposed equipment, it will be possible to keep them in first class condition all the time.

## SUBPOENA WHEELER BEFORE GRAND JURY

Washington, Jan. 22.—Steps to subpoena Senator Wheeler of Montana for appearance before a federal grand jury here have been taken by representatives of the department of justice in a further proceeding related to the case already pending against him in Montana.

Although no subpoena actually has been served on the senator, he will be given an opportunity to appear before the grand jury along with Gordon Campbell, indicted with him in Montana and others. Subpoenas for several of the prospective witnesses have been issued and the case will be placed before the grand jury here early next month. Whether the pending case in Montana will be dismissed depends on developments.

## MONMOUTH CLUB'S ANNUAL BANQUET

Monmouth, Jan. 22.—The annual Commercial club banquet was given in the Odd Fellows hall Tuesday night. More than 100 attended. Speakers included J. S. Lambert, president of the annual school; H. W.
